Operating Financial Commentary for the Month of June 2022

Club Operating Statement Review

For the month of June 2022

Total revenue was \$6,900 (0.6 percent) favorable to the budget of \$1,228,700. The most significant favorable to budget revenue category was green fees with a positive variance of \$22,400 or 18 percent (actual \$146,700 vs. budget of \$124,300). Additionally, advertising income was \$10,200 (63.8 percent) favorable to the budget of \$16,000. Finally, the pledged EVF donation for the new Clubhouse rotisserie oven was accrued in the amount of \$17,291. Notable unfavorable to budget revenues were food and bar sales, short of budget by \$44,600 (16.3 percent). With the guest rooms not yet open, rentals were \$3,700 less than planned (actual \$0 vs. budget of \$3,700). The budget assumed guest room rentals would have resumed operations by this time.

Total expenditures were \$83,300 favorable to budget, or 6.7 percent less than the budget of \$1,245,100. The most significant favorable to budget expense category was employee expense with a positive variance of \$69,100 or 9.4 percent (actual \$667,700 vs. budget of \$736,800) with ongoing open positions in the Restaurant, Community Activities and Janitorial Department. Another notable favorable to budget category for the month of June was Comcast expense with a positive variance of \$40,600 (actual \$65,800 vs. budget of \$106,400) due to the new bulk contract which commenced in May. June Comcast expense is lower than what it will be going forward because of a credit adjustment from May. Highlights of unfavorable to budget expense categories were the following: 1) planting expense (actual \$15,400 vs. budget of \$2,700) due to timing, 2) electricity expense (actual \$18,300 vs. budget of \$12,400) mostly at the Golf Course, Cribari Center and Fitness Center, 3) EPC expense (actual \$9,400 vs. budget of \$2,100) due to timing of purchase of two-way radios, and 4) repair & maintenance (actual \$33,500 vs. budget of \$27,800) from expenses on the golf course exceeding maximum amount GMS pays, per contract.

The net positive operating budget variance for the month of June was \$90,200. See table below.

Lately we see many non-golfing walkers on the course, which is very dangerous. Golf rounds have exploded to over 54K rounds resulting in numerous tee times throughout the day. I would like to suggest that non-golfing walkers no longer be allowed on the course. Non-golfing walkers are in danger of getting injured by a golf ball, interrupts and delays the game for those of us to play, creates more work for the Pro Shop by their having to announce changes to a walking schedule and to chase walkers off the course during play, and interferes with golf course maintenance. Golfers pay greens fees, cart trail fees, and their respective clubs' dues (I belong to two) in order to play golf. I have said it before, and I'll say it again, non-golfing walkers should not be on the course ever.

While the recent SRS article entitled "Running Low on Funds" is well written, it saddened me to read we are now to a point of recommending people take out reverse mortgages or sell their unit due to our increase in living expenses. The article neglected to mention a cost much greater than gas or groceries — our HOA fees. I am saddened that some residents need to resort to reverse mortgages or take in renters or sell and move elsewhere as they subsidize the golf course at \$29 per month, the newspaper at \$12 per month, the Clubhouse at \$23 per month and Public Safety at \$41 per month.

It is the Boards' fiduciary responsibility to identify cost cutting opportunities for their residents (who are on fixed incomes). It is unjust to put these large subsidizing burdens on residents who do not play golf (the majority) and the residents who do not use the Clubhouse (the majority).

Shame on us; we are better than this.

Association President's Report—July 26, 2022

Welcome to the July 2022 Villages Association Board Regular Monthly Meeting.

As the first meeting of FY22/23, the Board will be determining our objectives for the coming year, and we will publish them on the Villages Resident Portal website. Top priorities will be increasing our focus on fire safety and water conservation through two new Ad Hoc Committees. The Ad Hoc Fire Safety Committee is staffed by directors Dianna Hallock, Richard Holmboe, and Mike Schwerin. The Ad Hoc Water Conservation Committee is staffed by directors Julie Wash, Steven Gilbert, and George Paris. Association Committee meetings are open to all members, and the committees will publish minutes of their meetings.

At this meeting the Board will review the financial results for the last fiscal year that just concluded. The numbers are outstanding—reflecting excellent performance by our management team—income is over budget by 0.06 percent of budget, and expenses are under budget by 1.8 percent for a budget of over \$10 million dollars! While we've had several significant unexpected expenses in landscaping and insurance, efforts made by the community for water conservation including delayed and reduced planting have created large savings. Such results are never an accident, and represent the outstanding work of Julia Meadows, our interim GM, the senior staff at The Villages, and our landscaping contractor. Julia has kept The Villages running smoothly while doing her regular job and the GM position as well. Just exceptional!

I like to bring your attention to three very important dates coming up. The first is the Association ballot coming out this Friday, July 29. Our governing documents need occasional tune-ups to meet current state laws, improve clarity, and make incremental enhancements like lowering the hurdles to approve member requests. We only do these amendments about once a decade due to their expense and the effort involved. It is important that everyone vote to meet our needed participation levels, so please return your ballot promptly. The Board strongly encourages your YES vote!

The second is the All-DAC Orientation meeting coming up next week on August 2 at 9:30 a.m. on Zoom. This will be a chance to review and discuss the new Association DAC Policy and the DAC Handbook. They contain everything you ever wanted to know about District Advisory Committees and should be especially helpful to new DAC chairs.

The third is the EPC Emergency Preparedness Fair, coming up on August 27. Be sure and mark your calendar and drop in sometime between 1 and 4 p.m. at the Cribari Auditorium. In the land of earthquakes and historic drought, "Be Prepared" is not just the Boy Scout motto, it is the smart thing to do. I hope to see you there!

We will distribute links to the position profile and video both via the FastLane and the Resident Portal. Check it out!

Coming up on August 27, from 1 to 4 p.m., in the Cribari Auditorium, please participate in the FREE Emergency Preparedness Fair sponsored by the EPC Team. More than a dozen service organizations will be present and available to answer your questions. They will also be offering appropriate handouts and lots of suggestions about how you can effectively respond to an emergency during the first 72 hours. Remember, the first 72 are on you!

As always, the Club Board appreciates hearing the views and ideas of Villagers and we commit to continue to listen to you and address your questions with our "Ask the CBOD" communications channel. We encourage you to write to us!

Finally, we are very happy to continue our positive engagement with the hard-working Villages Senior Staff, and most importantly with our Interim General Manager, Julia Meadows. The Club Board recognizes the heavy workload you're all carrying and appreciates the extra efforts and highest levels of professionalism exhibited by the entire staff. Year-to-date, revenue is \$291,000 favorable to budget, 2.1 percent higher than the budget of \$13,702,000. Year-to-date, expenditures are \$1,018,000 favorable to budget, 7.4 percent less than the budget of \$13,774,000. The year-to-date net positive operating budget variance is \$1,309,000. See table below for detail by department.

The bottom of the table below shows the financial impact of the monthly solar lease payments and contribution to the balloon payment fund (to be paid in 2023) captured on the Club's balance sheet. The year-to-date total for these two items is \$248,000.

Golf Course/Pro Shop has posted a \$460,000 net positive variance due to favorable green fee revenue, driving range income, golf cart rentals, golf lessons and Pro Shop merchandise sales, as well as favorable employee expense, tree trimming expense and water expense. Clubhouse/Restaurant shows a \$288,000 net positive variance due to favorable employee expense. All Other shows a net positive variance of \$211,000 due to favorable water expense, Comcast and planting expenses. Public Safety has a \$159,000 net positive variance mostly from less than planned employee expense. Community Activities shows a \$99,000 net

positive variance from favorable employee expense, advertising/directory income and resident activities income. G&A has posted a \$95,000 net positive variance due to more than planned income from resale administration fees, other income and interest income/late fees, as well as less than planned employee expense, legal fees and data processing fees. Maintenance Admin/Streets has a \$9,000 net positive variance from favorable employee expense, offset by less than planned intra-company transfers out to other cost centers. Community Centers show a \$5,000 net positive variance from less than planned repair and maintenance, water, professional fees and operating supplies expense, offset by more than planned electricity, natural gas and landscape contract expenses. Pools have a \$17,000 net negative variance due to higher than planned natural gas expense, offset by favorable water expense.

Association Operating Statement Review

For the month of June 2022

Revenue was \$1,900 (0.02 percent) favorable to the budget of \$859,000 due to higher than planned third party assessments and laundry concession fees.

Expenditures for the month were \$14,600 (1.5 percent) unfavorable to the budget of \$980,900.

Notable **unfavorable** to budget expense categories for the month were the following:

- BrightView Landscape Contract including tree maintenance, 18.8% (\$42,800) more than budget (actual \$270,200 vs. budget of \$227,400)
- Contract price increase due to rising labor, fuel and materials costs effective January 1, 2022
- Insurance Expense, \$92,300 more than budget (actual \$290,300 vs. budget of \$198,000) due to impact of 2022 property insurance renewal effective May 30, 2022
- Irrigation Maintenance, \$7,300 more than budget (actual \$18,100 vs. budget of \$10,800)
- Legal Fees, \$8,100 more than budget (actual \$9,000 vs. budget of \$900)

Prior month's invoices related to Valle Vista vote, CC&R amendments and other issues.

Significant **favorable** to budget expense categories for the month were the following:

- Water Expense, \$117,000 (39.4%) less than budget (actual \$180,200 vs. budget of \$297,200)
- Results from two-month water bill for May/June
- Irrigation water usage restrictions continue
- Pest Control Expense, \$15,400 less than budget (actual \$10,800 vs. budget of \$26,200)

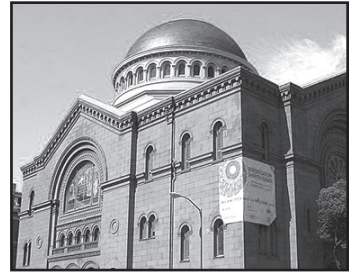

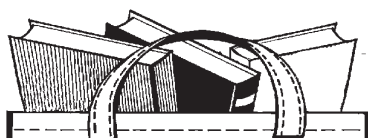

The Declaration (CC&Rs) is one of the fundamental governance documents for the Villages Association and it defines the roles of the Association and Owners for use, restrictions, and maintenance of our Common Interest Development. The CC&Rs are tied to the land and apply to all current and future owners. Every owner is affected by the CC&Rs and changing them requires a majority of the Total Voting Power of the Association to vote in favor. What is being changed and why should I care?

The CC&Rs are being updated to:

- conform with current state laws that have changed over the last eight years
- improve and clean up the wording
- better define the responsibilities for our condo maintenance
- make it less burdensome for getting common area changes approved
- align earthquake recovery procedures with current repair costs

While there are no fundamental changes proposed, it is important to keep governance documents current and relevant to state law and inflation.

The Association Board unanimously approved these changes and recommends your YES vote. Every vote counts!

Global Village to present therapeutic music session *Flu Shot Clinic Time at The Villages*

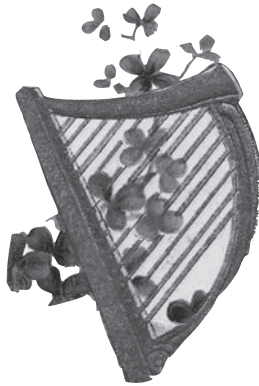

Kellen is a multi-talented musician who began playing the piano at age 3. In addition to playing the piano, she plays guitar, harp, and other stringed instruments. Kellen also sings. Her voice and her music has brought joy to many: Under the auspices of the USO, she performed for the US Airforce in Michigan during the Vietnam War; Kellen opened The Higher Powered Vocal Studio in Los Gatos where she offered voice, piano, and guitar lessons to children ages 7 to 21 who came to her from all over the Bay Area; She was the choir director at the Center for Spiritual Enlightenment; Kellen trained in the use and practice of therapeutic music; She was a member of Village Voices here in The Villages; and as part of the trio, Trillium, along with Dan Kato and Connie Hendrickson, she has performed for Villagers. Kellen will speak about the things in her life that brought her to therapeutic music, her history with therapeutic music, and the peace she has brought to those who were fortunate to be on the receiving end of that live music.

For your information, **therapeutic music**, is music that is used to ease a physical, emotional, or mental concern. The term is usually used when one talks of acoustic music played or sung live in a variety of healthcare venues, to enhance the healing atmosphere. Some of the benefits of therapeutic music are distracting and disassociating from the present situation, refocusing attention, altering the sense of time, relieving anxiety, relieving body and mental tension, accelerating physical healing, easing the dying during transition, and more.

The evening will conclude with Kellen leading us in a half hour of meditation as she plays her harp. Hope to see you at 7 p.m. on August 3 at the Conference Room in Village Cribari across from the auditorium.

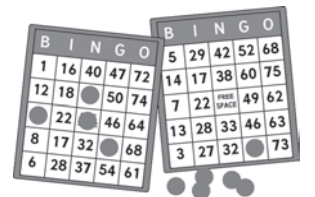

The Hard Truth about Recycling Part 1

The unfortunate truth about recycling is that only a small proportion of recyclable plastics actually get recycled.*



The universal symbol for recycling, known as the "chasing arrows" logo is stamped on many things but that doesn't mean that it's recyclable.

Items marked 1 and 2 are widely recyclable in the United States. Some type 5 are also accepted by a growing number of curbside recycling programs. The other numbers are almost never recycled.

A general rule of thumb: Rigid plastic packaging goes in the recycling, anything that isn't rigid doesn't.

Overall, only an estimated 9 percent of all plastics ever manufactured has been recycled, according to the United Nations Environmental Program.

The rest? Nearly 80 percent has ended up in landfills or dumps! *According to an April 21, 2022 NYTimes article by Winston Choi-Schagrin & Hiroko Tabuchi.

“Against All Odds” by Alex Kershaw: This is the story of four of the most decorated soldiers of WWII. As the Allies raced to defeat Hitler, four men, all in the same unit, earned medal after medal for battlefield heroism. Maurice “Footsie” Britt, a former professional football player, became the very first American to receive every award for valor in a single war. Michael Daly was a West Point dropout who risked his neck over and over to keep his men alive. Keith Ware would one day become the first and only draftee in history to attain the rank of general before serving in Vietnam. In WWII, Ware owed his life to the finest soldier he ever commanded, a baby-faced Texan name Audie Murphy. In the campaign to liberate Europe, each soldier would gain the ultimate accolade, the Congressional Medal of Honor. Tapping into personal interviews and a wealth of primary source material, Alex Kershaw has delivered his most gripping account yet of American courage, spanning more than six hundred days of increasingly merciless combat, from the deserts of North Africa to the dark heart of Nazi Germany. Once the guns fell silent, these four exceptional warriors would discover just how heavy the Medal of Honor could be—and how great the expectations associated with it. “One Night on the Island” by Josie Silver: Spending her thirtieth birthday alone is not what dating columnist Cleo Wilder wanted, but she plans a solo retreat—at the insistence of her boss—in the name of re-energizing herself and adding a new perspective to her column. The remote Irish island she’s booked is a far cry from London, but at least it’s a chance to hunker down in a luxury cabin and indulge in some self-care while she figures out the next steps in her love life and her career. Mack Sullivan is also looking forward to some time to himself. With his life in Boston deteriorating in ways he can’t bring himself to acknowledge, his soul searching has brought him to the same island to explore his Irish roots and find some clarity. Unfortunately, a mix-up with the bookings means both have reserved the same hideaway on exactly the same dates. Instantly at odds, Cleo and Mack don’t know how they are going to manage until the next weekly ferry arrives. But as the days go by, they no longer seem to mind the other’s company quite as much as they thought they would. One Night on the Island explores the meaning of home, the joys of escape, and how the things we think we want are never the things we really need. FIC 2022

“What the Fireflies Knew” by Kai Harris: An ode to Black girlhood and adolescence as seen through KB’s eyes, What the Fireflies Knew follows KB after her father dies of an overdose and the debts incurred from his addiction cause a loss of the family home in Detroit. Soon thereafter, KB and her teenage sister, Nia, are sent by their overwhelmed mother to live with their estranged grandfather in Lansing, Michigan. Over the course of a single sweltering summer, KB attempts to navigate a world that has turned upside down. Her father has been labeled a fiend. Her mother’s smile no longer reaches her eyes. Her sister, once her best friend, feels like a stranger. Her grandfather is grumpy and silent. The white kids that live across the street are friendly, but only sometimes. As KB vacillates between resentment, abandonment, and loneliness, she is forced to carve out a different identity for herself and find her own voice. This is a dazzling and moving novel about family, identity and race that reveals the heartbreaking but necessary component of growing up—the realization that loved ones can be flawed and that the perfect family we all dream of looks different up-close. “The Berlin Exchange” by Joseph Kanon: Berlin 1963: The height of the Cold War. A early morning spy swap at a discreet border crossing. The Communists are trading two English students caught helping friends over the wall and an aging M16 operative. 

As a teenager, I learned through my brokenness that the world is filled with other broken people. My mother and father were broken people which ultimately caused conflicts in their relationship and his decision to leave her with seven children in the early 1950s. I was told that my father worked in the U.S. Steel Mills in Gary, Indiana, along with different people, all of whom had been vying for manual labor jobs. Even though the economy began to thrive, life for many recovering from World War II was extremely challenging, especially among minority groups.

My parents’ separation and brokenness forced children in our family to experience a deep sense of rejection that carried over to the following generations. It caused some of us to be very sensitive and live in our feelings, rather than the truth without prejudice. To survive the different types of rejection that many of us dealt with each waking day, required a faith that seemed larger than life. The brokenness caused feelings of distrust, abandonment, indifference, aggressiveness and an insensitivity which brought hardship and heartache to some. Thankfully, some gave their lives to Christ before they passed from this life.

Today, I see that same brokenness in the lives of other people, who struggle with feelings of rejection, especially when things don’t go their way. They can become easily offended at the drop of a hat and retaliatory. This attitude is happening across all people groups, more than ever before. An unguarded heart becomes the dumping ground for other people’s discarded rubbish and will damage your relationship with others.

With the Knowledge that this world is filled with broken people... shouldn’t we live with our hearts guarded by God’s Spirit to be kind? The twin of brokenness is bitterness but grace is the ointment that heals deep wounds.

“Forgiveness is the antidote that cures the slave of resentment and revenge.” WLH.

‘The Lord and His Prayer’

For those who worship at churches that follow a common lectionary (that is, the Sunday Bible readings shared by most Roman Catholics and mainline Protestant denominations) last Sunday featured the Lord’s Prayer in the version recounted by the Gospel of Luke. It’s slightly different from the versions we’ve all learned in church, and it lacks the concluding doxology (something like “For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever,” depending on the translation). But those familiar words nevertheless convey great power and disruption! Take a moment to meditate the prayer you probably know well, and consider them phrase by countercultural phrase.

What if we really were all children of a common parent (“Our Father...”) ? Would we treat each other any differently? And what might it mean if God’s kingdom really did come on earth exactly as in heaven? What if we trusted that our daily bread really did come from God, and shared it as generously as God does? Or even more boldly, if we committed ourselves to forgive as we are forgiven? I don’t always pause long enough to let this prayer sink into my consciousness enough to change me. But when I do that—when we do that (after all, it’s Our Father)—my patterns do indeed change. At least for a day! But the good news is that this is actually a daily prayer, with the power to shape us in the ways that our Lord shows us, with each heartfelt repetition.

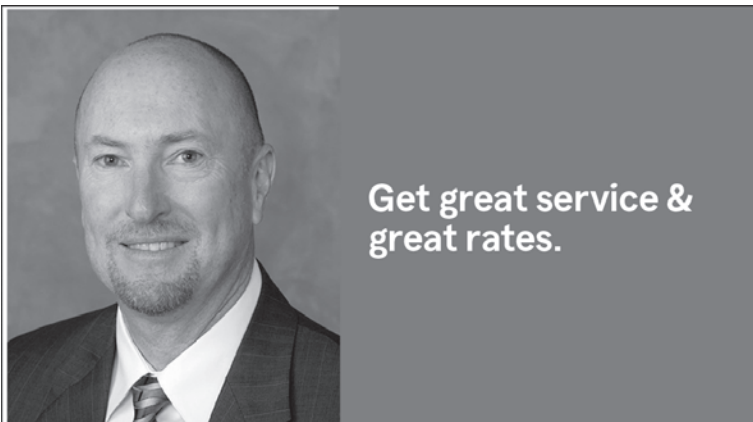

Golf Cart Enter & Exit Gates—For those golfers that enter the fairway early just after the tee box, we stress that you should please use the Cart Enter Gates located at the start of each fairway. Then proceed down the fairway from shot to shot avoiding driving in the rough as much as possible. If you exit the hole late, please use the Exit Gates located at the end of each hole and stay on the cart path until you reach the next tee box.

For those who do not enter the fairway early, remember that it is always Ok to use the cart paths and enter and exit the fairway using the 90-degree rule staying on the cart path for the majority of the hole being played. Again, please avoid driving in the rough from shot to shot as much as possible. Using the cart paths and the 90-degree rule is always a good option! Let us know if you have any questions. Thank you for your cooperation!

Tips from the Pro—The Pressure Principle...

How often do you focus on your grip pressure, or pressure points? My guess is probably not often. But the fact of the matter is, grip pressure and how the fingers and hands hold the club are extremely important.

Here are a few scenarios to think about:

Grip pressure...in golf, a softer grip pressure is preferable to a tight grip which inhibits wrist action and the resultant club lag needed to create whip action and club speed.

Pressure points...feel the last 3 fingers of you left hand and the right thumb and forefinger as the pressure points...do not squeeze the grip with all of your fingers or your palm.

Deep Rough...to keep the club stable and avoid face twisting in the rough, grip the handle tighter when playing out of deep rough.

High-soft pitch...in order to create a soft landing approach, reduce your grip pressure by 20% when hitting a high, soft pitch shot around the green.

Anti-Slice...If you tend to slice the ball, think about relaxing your left hand, and increasing the pressure on your right thumb and forefinger.

Anti-Hook...If you tend to hook the ball, try relaxing your right hand and increasing the pressure on the last three fingers of your left hand.

SRS SENIOR RESOURCE SERVICES

You may qualify for monthly discount on your PG&E bill

Budget stretched? Have low income? Save 30 to 35 percent on your electric bill and 20 percent on your natural gas bill by using the PG&E CARE program (California Alternate Rates for Energy). This program provides a monthly discount on energy bills for income-qualified households.

Qualification is based on two things: 1) the number of persons living in your home and 2) your total annual household income. The total gross annual income (based on the number of household members) must be at or below the amount shown below:

Size of Household	Income
1 or 2	\$36,620
3	\$46,060

This income limit is about \$2,000 higher than last year so you may now qualify even if you did not qualify in prior years. Or you may qualify this year because your work hours have been reduced or you are unemployed.

Be aware that PG&E defines income as money from all household members and from any source including non-taxable as well as taxable income sources. Pensions, 100 percent of your Social Security benefits, disability payments, alimony and unemployment benefits are some examples of income even if they are not taxable for income tax purposes.

You may also qualify for the CARE program if you participate in a public assistance program (welfare) such as Supplemental Security Income (SSI) or Medicaid/Medi-Cal. As you know, traditional Social Security is a retirement program not a public assistance program. Medicare is a health insurance program for seniors, not a welfare program.

You may apply for this program online at pge.com/care or you may stop by the SRS office for a paper application. The application is short; you give your PG&E account number, name, address, check a box to show you qualify by income or by a public assistance program and sign to certify that your information is correct. No documentation is required with the application.

After enrollment, some applicants are contacted by PG&E to provide verification of qualifying household income. You will then need to provide documents.

PG&E will ask you to renew your eligibility every two years; four years if a senior on a fixed income. If you qualify for this program, act now. The sooner you apply, the sooner you will start to save. Call the SRS office at 408-239-5253 if you have questions for a volunteer.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional advisor about your individual situation.

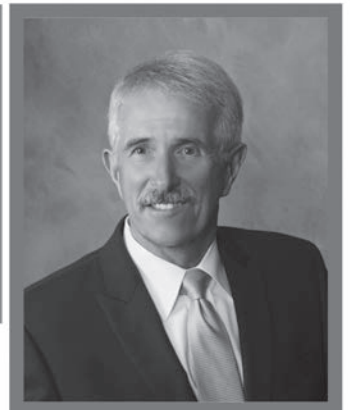

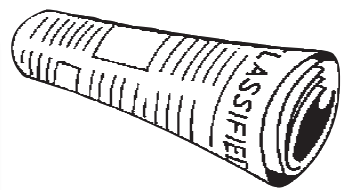
