EPC's Annual Emergency Drill is October 17

The rumble of an earthquake. The glow of a wildfire. The shutdown of a police action. We'd rather deny our exposure to these emergencies. We know—it is easier that way. Easier, but not a good idea. Because if it *does* happen, you need to be ready.

So each October, the Emergency Preparedness Committee conducts its annual drill so that *it* will be ready. So that all EPC volunteers know what is expected of them and how to fulfill their responsibilities. And you have a very small, but very important role in these drills. Just display your OK sign in a prominent place that can be seen from the street or sidewalk in front of your home. EPC volunteers will be inspecting every residence for the OK sign and responding to specific health and building scenarios as they would in an actual emergency.

This year's drill is Monday, October 17. Your sign must be up at 4 p.m.

If you cannot locate your OK sign, pick one up in Building B Monday through Friday between 8:30 a.m. and 4 p.m. (It is closed from noon to 1 p.m. for lunch.) Or you can print one from the EPC website at thevillagesepc.com. You can also help by alerting Public Safety



of your absences from home on the day of the drill (and always a good idea anyway), and by letting your Area Representative know if your neighbor is away during the drill.

Thanks in advance for doing your part, and please remember to take down your OK sign after the drill—and put it in a safe place! To volunteer with EPC, contact Vera Buescher at 408-531-9758.

Why your vote is needed to ratify the CC&Rs Amendment

According to state law, any amendment to the CC&Rs must be ratified by you, the members. A majority of households must vote in favor of approving an amendment. That means, to approve the CC&R amendment we need 1155 yes votes (a simple majority of the 2309 households in the Association). As of September 27, we had received only 1146 ballots back from villa owners. The Board decided to extend the election for another month, ending October 31, 2022, at 8:00 a.m. and to make extra efforts to get out the vote.

Please vote. If you have not voted yet, please do so.

If you don't vote, it is the same as voting no.

If you misplaced your ballot, please contact Susan Schubert to acquire a new ballot. (Susan Schubert: 408-223-4430, sschubert@the-villages.com)

You need the CC&R amendment ratified. The amendment eliminates inconsistencies between state law and the CC&Rs; it eliminates confusion due to inconsistencies within the CC&Rs, and it changes some insurance threshold values to ones that are realistic in today's economy.

Additionally, if we are unable to ratify the CC&R amendment with your vote, we will have to repeat the election. It has already cost you over \$10,000 and 60+ hours of Staff time. A new election will cost an additional \$10,000 and additional Staff time. The dollars come out of your pocket, and the Staff time applied to the election is Staff time that is not working for your other needs.



There has been a lot of misinformation written on social

media about this amendment. In truth, the CC&R amendment will not increase your assessments; it will not make you responsible for sewer lines: it will not make you responsible for doorjambs, and it will not change the power of attorney that already exists. (Note: You signed an acknowledgement during your escrow or rental process that grants the Association Board power of attorney to carry out the provisions of the CC&Rs. This does not change in the CC&R amendment. The words, "Power of Attorney", are simply part of the title of the CC&Rs, and, consequently, part of the title of the amendment.)

Update on California Middle Class tax refund

In the July 21 edition of *The Villager*, SRS explained the details of eligibility for the California Middle Class tax refund for economic relief. In general, if you filed a 2020 California return by October 15, 2021, are still a California resident, and your CA adjusted gross incomes was less than \$500,000 (joint) or \$250,000 (single), you will receive a payment of \$200 to \$700.

Owners responsible for cleaning up after pets

The Villages Rules and CC&Rs state that it is the owner's/ handler's responsibility for immediately cleaning and disposing of pet excrements in a sealed container. We are finding and hearing that some owners are not immediately cleaning up after their pets and assume that it is the responsibility of the landscaping crew, which it is not.

The pet poop should be picked up immediately and placed into the dumpsters in the trash enclosure near your home or in the designated pet poop stations in the center parking lots. Please do not place any pet poop in any restrooms or other containers at any of the various centers.

Leash rule for pets

Residents are reminded, as per Club Rule 1.51, that pets must be kept on a leash, under control, and attended to at all times. This also applies to the Hill Lands.

An increase in coyote aggression has created problems with small dogs, especially those that are unleashed. *Please always leash your pets. And keep leashes short; the Division of Wildlife recommends a leash no longer than 6 feet.*

Furthermore, accompany your leashed pet at all times while outside. Do not let go of the leash or tie your animal to trees or other objects. An unattended leash not only attracts the attention

of coyotes, but is also a tripping hazard to other walkers.

Change in criteria to hold a Bring-Your-Own-Bottle event

The Community Activities office assists organizations and private events with the use of Club facilities. We also work closely with local and state regulatory agencies that impact use of Club facilities. The State Alcoholic Beverage Control Board (ABC) is one of the agencies we do ongoing business with. The Villages Golf and Country Club holds a liquor license that applies to all Club facilities. The Food and Beverage operation relies on this license for a significant part of its revenue and would be adversely and financially affected by any liquor law violation. We were recently made aware of a change in how Bring-Your-Own-Bottle events are to be handled.

After a series of discussions with an Alcoholic Beverage Control Board supervisor—it is now determined that any event that charges any fee or asks for a donation is no longer eligible to have a BYOB event without supervision from a Clubhouse employee representing The Villages liquor license or getting a one-day permit if they are a 501c3 organization.

The Community Activities office was informed that any event charging any fee whatsoever or asking for a donation is no longer eligible to request The Villages liquor license be lifted for a BYOB event. Fund raising along with a charging a fee for meals, requesting donations for decorations and the like prompted the inquiries from our office. It was verified that even having an optional donation takes away the possibility of having a BYOB event.

As of today, events may continue to hold BYOB events if there is no fee/money involved at all in attending the event—examples of fees include but are not limited to food, entertainment, decorations, charitable donations, and refreshments. Many events will continue to be eligible to have participants bring their own alcohol. For those who may need to change their plans, please feel free to contact Mary Tatum. This is effective October 6, 2022.

Pictures of the rooms can be found on the Resident Portal under the Amenities menu option. Where are the Guest Rooms?



They were searching specifically for a gated community. It seems that the security gates have great value in today's market. In the last 10 years it has never been the issue that it is now. There is volatility in the world but the RE market is stable at this time. If you are thinking of selling, I would suggest taking advantage of it now.



'Disobedient Doctor'

By The Very Rev. Julia McCray-Goldsmith

A 16th century papal legate once described her as a "restless wanderer, disobedient, and stubborn feminist who, under the title of devotion, invented bad doctrines, moving outside the cloister against the rules of the Council of Trent and her prelates; teaching as a master against Paul's orders that women should not teach.' This didn't prevent Teresa of Avila from teaching, reforming the abuses of monasticism of her day, and advocating to kings and popes. Neither did it prevent the Roman Catholic Church from eventually recognizing her as a saint, and as the first female Doctor of the Church. The Episcopal Church remembers her on our calendar sanctorum this week.

What kept this daughter of Spanish nobility faithful to her call, despite the limitations imposed by her time and gender (and at times, by the leaders of her church)? I like to believe that it was no more (and certainly no less) than her deep devotion to God in prayer. And her trust in the visions that emerged from her contemplative practices. Teresa, from her girlhood, sought to serve God with a singular passion (far surpassing the disciplines of the convent she joined as a young woman). As she emerged from her long periods of religious ecstasy, she was confident enough to write of her experiences and share them with encouraging friends. So sure was she of God's passionate love for humankind, nothing could dissuade her from the mission of making the church a worthier vessel of the same grace that transformed her. Thank you, Teresa, for being disobedient enough to follow your own heart for God!

Each morning, I read a meditation by Sarah Young in "Jesus Today." On one particular day in May, I read her account of Jesus' parable in Luke 18 of an old woman who pestered a judge for a favor. Over and over, the man refused to grant it. Finally, he lost patience with the number of times she kept asking. In the end, she wore him down until he finally granted her request, fearing she would worry him to death if he didn't.

If a mere mortal can give in to constant pleading, how do we think Jesus, who loves us, will act in a similar circumstance? In St. Luke's Gospel this Sunday, he reminds us to take seriously Jesus' words, "Ask and you shall receive, seek and you shall find, knock and it shall be opened unto you."

On the afternoon of that same day in May when I read about the persistent woman, I was told I had 4th stage ovarian cancer. My husband and I were numb with shock as we drove home. That morning's reading came back to me, so when we got home, we re-read it. I made many copies of Young's reflection on Luke 18 to share with others, and from that day onward constantly asked Jesus to remove "This awful Squatter" who had taken up uninvited residence inside of me. Those of you who know me know that Jesus listened to my constant pleading, like the woman's in the story, and I am now seven years in remission. To this day my gratitude knows no bounds, and I know that God's plan for me is to constantly remind others of Jesus's promise, "Ask and you shall receive, seek and you shall find, knock and it shall be opened unto you." Just remember Jesus loves our constant petitions and wants us to keep asking Him for His help over and over again.

When I was reminded that this piece reflecting on Luke 18 for the Villager was due, I didn't remember having promised to write about this particular Gospel. Then, our son called this weekend, and said the lump he thought was a hernia is instead a growth on his kidney. Is Jesus again telling me something? I told my son I was having a Mass said for him, (whose Gospel turns out to be Luke 18), and to read that scripture as our family first read it seven years ago when I was diagnosed with cancer.

Ner Tamid 10-13

*NER TAMID (Heb. דִימָת רֵנ; "eternal lamp") Is a light which burns perpetually in front or above the ark in synagogues. The Ner Tamid is important to the Jews because it shows that G-D is always with us. Originally the Ner Tamid, had a wick burning in olive oil. Today, it is usually an electric bulb. The Ner Tamid has also been interpreted as being a symbol of G-d's presence amid Israel (B'nai Yisrael children of Israel).

In the story of Chanukah, when the Jews wanted to light the Ner Tamid, they found only enough oil for one night. But through a miracle, it lasted eight nights.

The Villages Jewish Community (VJC) has an Ark that is only used during the High Holidays. Rosh Hashanah. and Yom Kippur, due to logistic issues. This year, a new member, Diane Ruben, made a cover for our Ner Tamid, originally just a light bulb. The picture not only shows our new Ner Tamid, but it also shows our opened ark with the Torah, dressed for the High Holidays.





Tips from the Pro— Are you "plugged in"? One feature of The Villages golf course is that we have many greenside sand bunkers to challenge not only your approach accuracy, but also your short game skills around the greens. One reality of a well bunkered golf course such as ours is that eventually you will run into a buried lie in a greenside bunker. So how does one play a buried lie from a greenside bunker? The answer is NOT the same as a good lie in the sand. First realize that the bounce on the sole that helps the club glide and bounce instead of dig into the sand no longer helps us in a buried lie. When our ball is buried, we want the sand wedge to dig into the sand so we can get the ball out; therefore keep the clubface square or even a bit closed at address

The swing must be long and speedy as it takes more speed to excavate a buried ball than one on top of the sand; so make a long, firm swing. Focus on a spot in the sand directly behind the ball as the standard 2-4 inches behind the ball for a flat bunker shot no longer applies when the ball is buried. Lastly most balls bury in the face of the bunker, not the bottom, so be sure on the uphill lie that you dig in and get balanced so you can deliver the club with speed...also realize that swinging into the face of the bunker will prohibit a long follow through, so focus on accelerating into the ball and "sticking" the wedge into the sand behind the ball. More COMMUNITY NOTICES and BOARDS & COMMITTEES Association Annual Statements of Compliance

Arriving in October for residents of The Villages Association (condos) are the annual Association Smoke, CO Detectors and Insurance Statements of Compliance.

Association (Condos Only) Smoke, CO Detectors, and Insurance Statements of Compliance: In order to fulfill the requirements of The Villages Association Policies APo 408 Smoke Detectors Installation, Maintenance, Repair and Replacement, and APo 410 Carbon Monoxide (CO) Detectors, each owner is required to inspect (or have inspected by a third party) his/her villa on an annual basis to ensure their detector(s) are in working order and in addition, all Association residents (renters and owners) must provide a certification of insurance that complies with the Association CC&Rs and Association Policy APo 409 Home Owner & Resident Insurance Requirements and Verification.

State and local laws require a smoke detector in each sleeping room and in the hallway and a carbon monoxide detector be installed outside of each separate dwelling unit sleeping area. Per the policies, the replacement of smoke detectors is required every ten years and replacement of CO detectors is required every five years. In addition, a statement of compliance shall be demonstrated annually.

All Association condo owners must maintain property and liability coverage (commonly referred to as HO6) plus loss assessment coverage. Renters must maintain liability coverage (commonly referred to as HO4) and property coverage in an amount deemed appropriate by the renter. Both parties are required to provide a certificate of insurance that complies with the CC&Rs.

Coyote reminder and tips

Coyotes may try to escort walkers out of an area to protect their pups or food sources when encountered on a trail or street. Humans may perceive this behavior as stalking, which is usually not the case. They may also view your pet as prey. To allow coyotes to be wild while keeping yourself and pets safe, please follow these pointers:

• Never feed coyotes—it is illegal to feed coyotes in most places. Feeding endangers your family and neighbors because it lures coyotes into neighborhoods.

• Keep unattended cats and dogs indoors or in completely enclosed runs, especially at night, and do not assume that a fence will keep a coyote out of your backyard.

 Accompany your leashed pet outside. Make sure you turn on lights if it is dark to check your backyard for unexpected wildlife.

• Keep dogs on short leashes while walking outside; the Division of Wildlife recommends a leash no longer than 6 feet.

• Keep noisemakers on hand to scare away coyotes that may enter your yard. Some examples of noise makers are whistles, horns or metal cans with small rocks or coins that rattle.

Never run away or turn your back on a coyote.

• Do not allow a coyote to get between you and your pet or child-keep children close to you.

• Yell, clap hands, blow a whistle or rattle a can and try to make yourself look larger if you have a close encounter with a coyote.

• An empty soda can with pennies sealed with duct tape makes a very good noise maker when shaken. **Reminder to all small pet owners:** A recent rise in coyote aggression has been seen with small

dogs, most unleashed. *Please always leash your pets. Keep leashes short.* Coyotes will try to get between you and your pet if the leash is extended far enough. Coyotes are known to attack leashed dogs when the owner gets distracted. Please stay cautious and aware of your surround-ings when cleaning up after your pet, talking to a neighbor, checking the mail, etc. Coyotes are opportunists and may make their attacks when you are not paying attention.

Carry a noise maker and always be alert. Use caution when walking past wooded areas, hiding spots between homes, and the golf course. They are widespread in The Villages and can truly be anywhere.

There is no way to completely eliminate coyotes from The Villages, so always use caution when walking, especially with pets. Also, coyotes tend to be most active around sunrise and sunset. Pick different times for walks.



Planning an estate, moving or garage sale?

Residents, or those working on the behalf of residents, are advised to call the Public Safety Administration office at 239-5246 before planning or opening a sale at the Villages. All sales on Villages property are subject to Association Rule 2.02 Residence Use and Occupancy Restrictions.

Homeowner Rule 3.2.10, Estate and Garage Sales states: 3.2.10 Estate and garage sales are permitted subject to the following:

A. A permit for the sale shall be obtained from the Public Safety Office prior to holding the sale and placement of advertising.

Also, effective July 1, 2012, all estate and garage sales in the Association will require a permit. The owner of the property must request the permit from Public Safety Administration in Building C.

The Villages Association Rule 2.02. 5., Residence Use and Occupancy Restrictions applies:

5. Estate and garage sales are permitted subject to the following:

A. Public Safety will not allow entry to anyone who is not authorized by name in advance (Club Rule 1.01, Access to the Villages).

B. All sales activity and sale items must be contained within the residence or garage.

C. Sales maybe held only between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m.

D. Sales period may not exceed two days.

E. Only one sale per resident household per year will be permitted. In the event of the death of a resident of the unit, a subsequent estate sale will be permitted. A permit is required and can be obtained from Public Safety.

F. Residents may not use public media to invite members of the general public to attend estate or garage sales at The Villages.

In this context, "public media" includes the internet, social media such as Facebook and Twitter which will be seen by nonresidents, and publications which circulate outside The Villages such as the Evergreen Times and Spotlight. Residents may post activities and notices on Next Door but must use the "Choose Neighbors: The Villages [only]" option.

Note: When placing classified ads for estate or garage sales in The Villager, you will need to attach proof of the permit to your Classified Advertising form.
