Operating Financial Commentary for the Month of September 2022

Club Operating Statement Review

For the month of September 2022

Total revenue was \$11,800 (1 percent) unfavorable to the budget of \$1,171,700. The most significant unfavorable to budget revenue category was directory income (actual \$0 vs. budget of \$12,000), due to timing. Other notable unfavorable to budget revenue categories were guest room rentals (actual \$0 vs. budget of \$6,600 - not open yet), green fees (5 percent less than budget) and resident activities (61 percent less than budget, offset in expenses). The most significant favorable to budget revenue category was food sales, with a positive variance of \$11,700, or 6.9 percent (actual \$181,700 vs. budget of \$170,000). Other noteworthy favorable to budget revenue categories were other income (\$14,100 actual vs. budget of \$10,000), partially due to timing of T-Mobile rental income, golf cart rentals (\$11,900 actual vs. budget of \$9,000), and interest/late fee income (actual \$6,000 vs. budget of \$3,200).

Total expenses were \$77,300 favorable to budget, or 6.6 percent less than the budget of \$1,174,300. The most significant favorable to budget expense category was employee expense, with a positive variance of \$107,300, or 14.2 percent (actual \$645,700 vs. budget of \$753,000) with continued job openings in the Restaurant, Community Activities, Janitorial, Public Safety, Facilities, as well as the General Manager position. Other notable favorable to budget expense categories for the month were as follows: 1) tree trimming (actual \$3,200 vs. budget of \$9,700) due to timing on the golf course, 2) resident activities expense (actual \$6,900 vs. budget of \$12,600) offset with lower revenue, and 3) Comcast expense (actual \$83,700 vs. budget of \$92,400) due to new contract less than budget. Highlights of unfavorable to budget expense categories were the following: 1) food cost of sales (actual \$63,300 vs. budget of \$51,900) due to higher food sales volume, 2) electricity expense (actual \$29,900 vs. budget of \$18,700) due to increased rates, 3) professional fees (actual \$18,000 vs. budget of \$10,300) due to HR consultant (offset in salaries), and 4) pest control (actual \$5,000 vs. budget of \$900) with increased goose control expenses on the golf course.

The net positive operating budget variance for the month of September was \$65,500. See table below.

I submitted a Pulse letter about a month ago pertaining to the proposed CC&R changes. I had an issue with Section 9.1.4 exclusion of door jambs.

I was informed the Villages Association would address this concern in a section of *The Villager* titled "The Association" and a future town hall meeting to clarify the changes would be held.

So far, no meeting and the CC&R measure proposed has not passed.

I propose the CC&R be resubmitted with changes required by state law separated as Part (A) and those changes submitted by the Association as part (B). Hold an in-person Villages Town Hall meeting to discuss part (B).

Beginning 2023, California (AB1410) will allow all members of the Association to comment on social media even if its critical of the Association.

With the current cancel culture phenomenon, the addition of (AB1410) will help protect everyone view.

Welcome to the October 2022 Villages Association Board Regular Monthly meeting.

It is my pleasure today to welcome The Villages' new General Manager, Theresa Ostrander. After a comprehensive, nation-wide search, the GM Search Committee was very pleased to select an outstanding leader, and for her to accept the job. She just started on the job yesterday. As Theresa gets to know us over the next few weeks, let's all give her a warm welcome, and give her the time to meet with Staff and the Boards before inundating her with requests. She will quickly be visible and communicating with Villagers in many venues, so please be patient.

As we are at the start of our Association Budgeting process, I want to encourage the Ad Hoc Water and Fire Safety Committees to bring forward their initial proposals for landscaping and structure changes. The Association Board will want to include funds in next year's Budget for the first steps for each Village - such as fire safety surveys, and mitigation and landscape alterations in response to the damage caused by the drought and resulting water usage restrictions as well as fire safety concerns. Unfortunately, these projects are not currently funded in the Reserves Plan, so the Board will need to be prudent about how much and how quickly the projects can be undertaken and impacts on member assessments.

The CC&Rs vote is quite important for all condo owners to bring our governing documents up to date. If you have questions or concerns, please ask me or any other Association director for clarifications. Unfortunately, there is a significant amount of misinformation on social media. You can rest assured that voting for the amendment will NOT increase your HOA assessments, will NOT make you responsible for the city water or sewage pipelines, nor make you responsible for doorjambs. The CC&R amendment is needed and benefits all Association members, so please vote!

Our Villages Management team, staff, and landscape partner BrightView, continue to perform at an outstanding level in dealing with these unprecedented challenges due to the drought, water conservation regulations, and fire safety concerns. Please give them your continued support.

Year-to-date (three months), revenue is \$60,000 favorable to budget, 1.7 percent higher than the budget of \$3,512,000. Year-to-date, expenses are \$250,000 favorable to budget, 6.9 percent less than the budget of \$3,646,000. **The year-to-date net positive** operating budget variance is \$310,000. See table below for detail by department. The monthly solar lease payments and contribution to the balloon payment fund (to be paid in September 2023) are being funded from a portion of the FY22 Operating surplus. The year-to-date total for these two items is \$62,000.

G&A has posted a \$102,000 net positive variance mostly due to reduced employee expense with the vacancy in the General Manager position, as well as higher than planned income. Clubhouse/Restaurant shows an \$87,000 net positive variance due to favorable food and bar sales. All Other shows an \$82,000 net positive variance due to favorable water expense, Comcast expense, and repair and maintenance. Public Safety has posted a \$20,000 net positive variance due to less than planned employee expense with two open positions. Community Activities shows a \$12,000 net positive variance from favorable employee expense, offset by less than planned income. Golf Course/Pro Shop shows an \$8,000 net positive variance from savings in employee expense and tree trimming (timing), offset by more than planned water and electricity expenses. Community Centers have a \$5,000 net negative variance from higher than planned electricity expense, offset by less than planned intra-company cost transfers.

Association Operating Statement Review

For the month of September 2022

Revenue was \$100 (0.01 percent) unfavorable to the budget of \$1,014,200 due to less than planned laundry concession fees, offset by more than planned third party assessments.

Expenses for the month were \$27,200 (2.6 percent) unfavorable to the budget of \$1,060,400.

Notable **favorable** to budget expense categories for the month were the following:

- Planting Expense, \$5,900 (50.9 percent) less than budget (actual \$5,700 vs. budget of \$11,600)
 - Repair & Maintenance, \$3,300 (15.1 percent) less than budget (actual \$18,600 vs. budget of \$21,900)

Significant **unfavorable** to budget expense categories for the month were the following:

- Insurance Expense, \$37,800 (15 percent) more than budget (actual \$290,300 vs. budget of \$252,500) due to impact of 2022 property insurance renewal effective May 30, 2022
- Electricity Expense, \$1,400 (9.6 percent) more than budget (actual \$16,000 vs. budget of \$14,600)

The net <u>negative</u> operating budget variance for the month of September was \$27,300. See table below.

Year-to-date (three months of operations), total revenue is \$3,043,800, or .04 percent (\$1,200) more than the budget of \$3,042,600. Year-to-date, operating expenses are \$3,250,000, or 4.3 percent (\$147,600) less than the budget of \$3,397,600. The positive budget variance is attributed to savings in water expense, repair and maintenance, planting expense and irrigation maintenance, offset by more than planned insurance and electricity expenses. **The year-to-date net positive operating budget variance is \$148,800.**

Non-Estates revenue was short of budget by \$2 (rounding) at \$3,900 for the month. September expenses were \$238 favorable to budget, 6 percent less than the budget of \$3,961, due to less than planned legal fees (\$112) and insurance expense (\$126). The net positive operating budget variance for the month of September was \$236.

Year-to-date (three months of operations), total revenue is \$11,701, short of budget by \$5 (rounding). Year-to-date, operating expenses total \$11,169, less than budget by \$714 (6 percent). The positive budget variance is attributed to savings in insurance expense and legal fees. The year-to-date net positive operating budget variance is \$709.

Why your vote is needed to ratify the CC&Rs Amendment

According to state law, any amendment to the CC&Rs must be ratified by you, the members. A majority of households must vote in favor of approving an amendment. That means, to approve the CC&R amendment we need 1,155 yes votes (a simple majority of the 2,309 households in the Association). As of September 27, we had received only 1,146 ballots back from villa owners. The Board decided to extend the election for another month, ending December 12, 2022, at 8:00 a.m. and to make extra efforts to get out the vote.

Please vote. If you have not voted yet, please do so.

If you don't vote, it is the same as voting no.

If you misplaced your ballot, please contact Susan Schubert to acquire a new ballot. (Susan Schubert: 408-223-4430, sschubert@the-villages.com)

You need the CC&R amendment ratified. The amendment eliminates inconsistencies between state law and the CC&Rs; it eliminates confusion due to inconsistencies within the CC&Rs, and it changes some insurance threshold values to ones that are realistic in today's economy.



Additionally, if we are unable to ratify the CC&R amendment with your vote, we will have

to repeat the election. It has already cost you over \$10,000 and 60+ hours of Staff time. A new election will cost an additional \$10,000 and additional Staff time. The dollars come out of your pocket, and the Staff time applied to the election is Staff time that is not working for your other needs.

There has been a lot of misinformation written on social media about this amendment. In truth, the CC&R amendment will not increase your assessments; it will not make you responsible for sewer lines: it will not make you responsible for doorjambs, and it will not change the power of attorney that already exists. (Note: You signed an acknowledgement during your escrow or rental process that grants the Association Board power of attorney to carry out the provisions of the CC&Rs. This does not change in the CC&R amendment. The words, "Power of Attorney", are simply part of the title of the CC&Rs, and, consequently, part of the title of the amendment.)

years, and was even more pleased in the performance of the amazing team of volunteers who collectively make EPC's existence possible. While not everything ran perfectly, some training opportunities were clearly identified and will be addressed.



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
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Pickleballers shed tears of joy for latest EVF donation



Senior Academy: More High Court insight with Barbara Creed

Attorney Barbara Creed believes the Supreme Court is not well understood. She therefore engages audiences in interactive lectures about cases that are before the Court and this year is returning to Senior Academy with three fascinating Supreme Court cases from the 2022-23 court calendar. On Monday, November 14 at 2 p.m., she will discuss the merits of cases that touch on:

• California Proposition 12, passed by voters in 2018, which makes it a criminal and civil violation to sell pork in California unless the pig it comes from was born to a sow that was housed with 24 square feet of usable space and in conditions that allow the sow to turn around freely without touching the enclosure.

• What should we make of Andy Warhol's art? In this case, the justices will consider whether Warhol violated the federal Copyright Act by basing a portrait of the musician Prince on a prominent photographer's work. In the process, they will have to decide whether Warhol's alterations of the photograph transformed it into something different.

 And whether a private citizen who holds no elected office or government employment, but has informal political or other influence over governmental decision-making, owes a fiduciary duty to the general public such that he can be convicted of honestservices fraud. (Honest-services fraud is closely linked to bribery.)

During the session, Barbara will brief the group on the facts/ issues involved in each case and after discussion, participants vote on how they believe the Court should rule. Once the case is ultimately ruled upon, Barbara notifies participants of the outcome.

Barbara Creed has been leading these Supreme Court decisions for more than 10 years. Through these lectures, she hopes to help participants gain an understanding of how the Court does its work and an appreciation for the complexities of the cases the Court handles.

'Universal Call to Holiness'

November 1 marks the annual Catholic celebration of the Feast of All Saints when the church presents its stunning vision of the "great multitude" throughout history "that no one can number" who have completed their journey to Heaven, as well as the saints on earth who are now consciously striving to know, love, and serve God so as to be united with Him forever.

Saints are not a spiritual elite, a superior class of homo sapiens different from run-of-the-mill humanity. To the contrary, saints both in Heaven and on earth come from the same range of abilities, education, personalities, etc. that constitute the human race. They are folks just like us. God intends everyone, without exception, to enjoy eternal happiness with Him in Heaven, and provides them the means for doing so. However, despite God's desire for our eternal bliss, Heaven is not the default position of the human race; we humans do not die and automatically enter Heaven without our willingness to get there. Whether or not we choose to accept God's invitation and apply the means He provides is a matter of personal choice. The Lord doesn't drag the unwilling into Paradise.

Despite the equality of opportunity for all to become saints, there is no guaranteed equality of outcome. The saints in Heaven experience eternal happiness in different degrees depending on the state of their souls at death. The depth of their love for God and neighbor at that moment determines not only the duration of their purification process in Purgatory (if any), but also the degree to which they will experience God in Heaven. St. Paul compares their differences thus: "There is one glory of the sun, another glory of the moon, and another glory of the stars; for one star differs from another star in glory." (1 Cor 15:41)

Catholics ask the saints in Heaven to pray for them just like we ask our friends on earth for prayers when the going gets rough. One church Father advised his flock to picture the saints in

Heaven as being seated around a vast stadium like fans, shouting out, gesturing, urging on the saints below them on earth who race for the prize of eternal life. As I—as all of us—consider what it is to live a life of faith, hope and love, there's no better place to turn than to the lives of those whom the church calls holy ones (which is what "saint" means). Contemporary psychology supports the ancient understanding that we learn by mimicking the actions and even the emotions of those we admire. So just do it! 


PICKLEBALL

Fall Aeration & Inter-seeding – October/November

Fairway Aeration - Friday 10/28/22 - Friday 11/18/22

Fairway Inter-seed - Monday 10/31/22 - Wednesday 11/23/22

Daylight Savings ends Sunday, November 6—On November 6 we will set our clocks back one hour so the first tee times will be earlier again as we move into the winter months.

Winter Golf Schedule Starts November 7—Once DST ends on November 6th and the days become shorter – the golf schedule will shift to the Winter Schedule:

Mondays - Shotgun Starts at Noon - Range closed at 2 p.m.

Tuesdays – Swingers Shotgun starts at 9am – Open Play 11:30 a.m – Par-3 Course Shonis start at 10:30 a.m

The last tee time each day will be 4 p.m. – The Pro Shop will close at 4 p.m. Daily (3 p.m. Mondays) Golf Course Inter-Seeding Process — Starting in November we will be aggressively interseeding the golf course with rye grass. This year we will be focusing on areas of Poa grass in the fairways that tend to stress out over the hot summer months and become sparce or bare. The long-term benefits of inter-seeding are to rid the golf course of these bare spots and to create a more uniform turf condition throughout the fairways. Once the seed is spread, it takes a lot of watering and about one week for the seed to germinate. Because of this, we are irrigating the fairways and seeded areas more than normal. You might find our current playing conditions somewhat inconsistent, as necessarily some areas will be dry, and other areas will be wet. Please understand that we need to heavily irrigate all inter-seeded areas during this process so you might encounter some wet areas on the golf course. We will also rope off areas that we do not want carts to drive on. We apologize for any inconvenience. During this process, please try to avoid any wet and roped off areas with your golf carts. Thank you!

Golf Cart Safety – With the recent thick morning fog and resultant lack of visibility; and with the upcoming wet winter conditions pending, it is very important to always pay attention when driving your golf carts to avoid potential accidents and possible injuries. Always remember to drive carefully and keep both eyes clearly focused ahead to avoid any potential cart accidents. Driving slowly and cautiously is the rule of thumb. And if you see a wet spot, please avoid driving your cart through it. Always stay safe and have fun when playing golf!

Tee It Forward—Golf is a game that is meant to be fun and played at a reasonable pace for the enjoyment of all. Tee it Forward is a joint initiative between the USGA, NCGA and the PGA of America that encourages players to play from a set of tees best suited to their actual skill level. In addition to providing more enjoyment for golfers, teeing it forward can also be one of the most important steps that golfers can take to improve pace of play. A recent survey of Tee It Forward participants found that: 56% Played Faster / 83% hit more lofted clubs into greens / 85% had more fun / 93% will Tee It Forward again...This is a guideline to help golfers align their handicap with the course length at The Villages that is best suited to their abilities:

Handicap 9-14 #4 Tees or #4/3 Combo Tees
Handicap 15-18 #4/3 Combo Tees or #3 Tees

Tips from the Pro — More Bounce to the Ounce

Take a look at your sand wedge compared to all of your other clubs. You will see that it looks different in several ways.

- 1. It's shorter than all of your other clubs Why? Because it's designed to play shorter shots also a shorter shaft brings your hands closer to the clubhead making it easier to control the clubface
- 2. It has much more loft than all of your other clubs Why? Because it's designed to get the ball in the air quickly also added loft allows the golfer to swing hard and excavate the ball from deep rough and bad lies without the ball going too far

3. The sole of the sand wedge is much wider and has bounce than all of your other clubs – Why? A wide sole and greater bounce allows the club to slide trough sand and firm tight lies without digging – to active the sole and bounce spin the clubface to the right or open the clubface – the clubface will point to the sky – learn to deliver the sand wedge to the ball while maintaining an open clubface through impact and your bunker game and tight lies pitching game will improve – feel like your right hand stays "under" the grip at impact to maintain an open clubface and use the bounce to your advantage.



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

Woodshop safety orientation now offered monthly

The Community Activities Department is offering monthly woodshop safety orientations on the second Tuesday of the month to residents wishing to have access to use the woodshop.

When: Tuesday, November 8 from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m.

Where: Cribari Center Woodshop

Cost: \$140 per person includes safety orientation and keys to power equipment

Registration and cancellation deadline: One week prior to date of each class.

Orientation Prerequisite: Review of online safety videos and Club Rule 1.20 and review of Material in Woodshop packet provided at registration. **No walk ins will be admitted.**

The in-person orientation will include a basic review of the major woodshop equipment and tools, shop policies and procedures, and Club Rule 1.20. Prior to attending the class, participants are required to review a series of online woodshop safety videos on the resident portal and review Club Rule 1.20. Registration for the in-person orientation must be completed in person at Building B; exceptions will be considered on a case-by-case basis.

Upon registration a packet of materials will be provided to you. Please review your schedule carefully; any cancellations must be made by the above deadline. Any no-shows or late cancellations will still be billed for the cost of the class.

After you have completed the orientation, you will bring your signed forms and proof of PPE (safety glasses, hearing protection and dust mask) to Building B to obtain the machine keys and begin processing. Electronic processing for access by Resident ID card may take up to two business days to complete.

Protecting Your Credit Score

We all know that payment history is the most important ingredient in credit scoring, and even one missed payment can have a negative impact on your score. Medical bills, which are the responsibility of insurance companies, can remain "unpaid" for six months to a year and more, resulting in negative items on credit reports producing lower credit scores, higher borrowing costs and sometimes even sink a mortgage application.

For instance, a Villager flies to Wisconsin to visit her first great grandbaby. While there, she is rushed to a hospital for an emergency appendectomy. She remains in the hospital for a week, receiving IV antibiotics for sepsis, before returning home to The Villages. She has Medicare plus a supplemental medical insurance policy.

A year following this hospitalization, our Villager has decided to seek a reverse mortgage and is told that her credit score, which in the past was in the upper range, is now too low to qualify for the reverse mortgage. When checking her score, she sees unpaid bills from her out-of-network hospitalization the previous year which her insurance still has not paid.

This year, the three big credit reporting agencies announced steps that they expect will remove nearly 70 percent of medical collection debt from consumer credit reports. Effective July 1, 2022, paid medical collection debt will no longer be included on consumer credit reports and the time period before unpaid medical collection debt would appear on a consumer's report will be increased from 6 months to one year. This allows consumers more time to work with insurance and/or health care providers to address their debt before it is reported to their credit file.

It is still up to you to check your credit reports for unpaid medical bills, to contact the credit reporting agencies for information on removing paid medical bills from your credit report, and to stay in touch with insurance programs to ensure they make required payments on a timely basis. Hold on to monthly insurance statements so you have a record of what has been paid, and what hasn't


