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Senior Academy to welcome Mayor Matt Mahan

When Matt Mahan won November's election for mayor, outgoing mayor Sam Liccardo had sage advice for him: "Tag. You're it. Don't screw up." Mahan is putting forth his level best to do just that in the two years he has to prove himself worthy of re-election in 2024.

He's got an ambitious agenda and not a lot of time; hence he's hit the ground running, maintaining an aggressive schedule. His first two weeks were filled with meetings, community events and media interviews on atmospheric rivers—even on the weekends, according to his daily calendar.

Mahan said the busy schedule during his first two weeks is just the beginning, adding it's his mission to meet with as many stakeholders and community leaders as he can. "During the campaign I promised to hit the ground running—but these days, I'd call it more of a sprint," Mahan told San José Spotlight. "Community engagement in government is a hallmark of a functioning democracy. I was elected to serve the people, and anyone who has a stake in how our city is run deserves my time."

Operating Financial Commentary for the Month of December 2022

Club Operating Statement Review

For the month of December 2022

Total revenue was \$36,400 (3.2 percent) unfavorable to the budget of \$1,140,700. The most significant unfavorable to budget revenue category was food/bar sales with a combined negative budget variance of \$24,800, or 9.5 percent (actual \$236,200 vs. budget of \$261,000). Other notable unfavorable to budget revenue categories were resident activities (actual \$100 vs. budget of \$10,000) and green fees coming in 10 percent less than budget at \$68,500 for the month. Notable favorable to budget revenue categories were advertising income, with a positive variance of \$5,800 (42.4 percent) and billable services with a positive variance of \$6,300 (170 percent), offset in expenses.

Total expenses were \$17,100 favorable to budget, or 1.5 percent less than the budget of \$1,153,100. The most significant favorable to budget expense category was water expense, with a positive variance of \$28,100, or 87 percent (actual \$4,100 vs. budget of \$32,300) with heavy December rainfall. Other notable favorable to budget expense categories for the month were as follows: 1) printing expense (actual \$8,100 vs. budget of \$26,300) due to timing of directory printing, 2) Comcast expense (actual \$83,900 vs. budget of \$92,400) due to new contract less than budget, and 3) tree trimming (actual \$3,300 vs. budget of \$10,700) due to timing of golf course work. Highlights of unfavorable to budget expense categories were the following: 1) employee expenses (actual \$782,500 vs. budget of \$759,500) due to out-of-class pay adjustments, 2) professional fees (actual \$22,400 vs. budget of \$10,500) due to HR consultant (offset in salaries), and 3) advertising/promotion (actual \$8,600 vs. budget of \$2,100) for New Year's Eve at the Clubhouse.

The net negative operating budget variance for the month of December was \$19,300. See table below.

Experience is a very sobering teacher. Last week my wallet was stolen from my purse while I was grocery shopping. A "slick pair" pulled off the caper—he asked which squash was best for soup, while his female partner quietly zipped open my purse located in the cart behind me. I only realized the crime when I arrived at the checkout counter. I later learned that another shopper had the same experience with the pair. I contacted Life-lock; they immediately placed a fraud alert with the three credit bureaus and stopped my credit card payments. They worked with me to identify all the organizations involved and actions to be taken. I filed a police report. Unfortunately with no actual evidence, it will be difficult to find the culprits. I told the store manager I would spread the word for shoppers to be careful; he finds purses in carts frequently and he always calls for the owner. I was stunned to learn that the crooks had attempted using my credit cards within 15 minutes of when they were stolen. I spent most of the week on the phone or computer, trying to rebuild my life again. Please be vigilant.

Year-to-date (six months), revenue is \$28,000 favorable to budget, 0.4 percent higher than the budget of \$6,960,000. Year-to-date, expenses are \$370,000 favorable to budget, 5.2 percent less than the budget of \$7,059,000. The year-to-date net positive operating budget variance is \$398,000. See table below for results by department. The monthly solar lease payments and contribution to the balloon payment fund (to be paid in September 2023) are being funded from a portion of the FY22 Operating surplus. The year-to-date total for these two items is \$127,000.

All Other shows a \$147,000 net positive variance due to favorable water expense, Comcast expense, and planting expense. Golf Course/Pro Shop shows a \$72,000 net positive variance from savings in employee expenses, water expense and tree trimming (timing), offset by more than planned electricity, chemical supplies and pest control expenses. Clubhouse/Restaurant shows a \$65,000 net positive variance due to favorable food sales. Community Activities shows a \$65,000 net positive variance from favorable employee expenses and advertising income. G&A has posted a \$39,000 net positive variance due to reduced employee expenses with the vacancy in the General Manager position for most of the first four months of the fiscal year. Public Safety has posted a \$32,000 net positive variance due to less than planned employee expenses. Pools have a \$15,000 net negative variance from higher than planned repair and maintenance, gas, and electricity expenses. Community centers show a \$10,000 net negative variance from higher than planned electricity expense, offset by more than planned rental income.

Association Operating Statement Review

For the month of December 2022

Revenue was on budget for the month at \$1,014,200. Expenses for the month were \$34,200 (3.7 percent) favorable to the budget of \$934,300.

Notable **favorable** to budget expense categories for the month were the following:

- Water Expense, \$66,300 (45 percent) less than budget (actual \$81,100 vs. budget of \$147,400)
-Results from two-month water bill for November/December
-Irrigation water usage restrictions in force and significant rainfall
- Planting Expense, \$14,300 (74.5 percent) less than budget (actual \$4,900 vs. budget of \$19,200)

Significant **unfavorable** to budget expense category for the month was the following:

- Insurance Expense, \$37,800 (15 percent) more than budget (actual \$290,300 vs. budget of \$252,500) due to impact of 2022 property insurance renewal effective May 30, 2022
- Irrigation Maintenance, \$4,000 (93 percent) more than budget (actual \$8,300 vs. budget of \$4,300)

The net positive operating budget variance for the month of December was \$34,200. See table below.

Year-to-date (six months of operations), total revenue is \$6,085,900, or .01 percent (\$700) more than the budget of \$6,085,200. Year-to-date, operating expenses are \$6,042,300, or 4.5 percent (\$283,600) less than the budget of \$6,325,900. The positive budget variance is attributed to savings in water expense, repair and maintenance and planting expense, offset by more than planned insurance expense and operating supplies. The year-to-date net positive operating budget variance is \$284,300.

December expenses were \$238 favorable to budget, 6 percent less than the budget of \$3,961, due to less than planned legal fees (\$112) and insurance expense (\$126). **The net positive operating budget variance for the month of December was \$236.**

Year-to-date (six months of operations), total revenue is \$23,402, short of budget by \$10 (rounding). Year-to-date, operating expenses total \$22,338, less than budget by \$1,428 (6 percent). The positive budget variance is attributed to savings in insurance expense and legal fees. **The year-to-date net positive operating budget variance is \$1,418.**

Year-to-date (six months of operations), total revenue is \$96,021, higher than budget by \$3 (rounding). Year-to-date, operating expenses total \$90,350, less than budget by \$10,695 (10.6 percent). The positive budget variance is attributed to savings in water and planting expenses. **The year-to-date net positive operating budget variance is \$10,698.**

Combined Financials Audit Note: It has come to our attention that an inadvertent disclosure error was made in Note 9 of the Combined Financial Statements and Independent Auditor's Report for Years Ended June 30, 2022, and 2021. Note 9 is a disclosure statement regarding related parties and concentration of vendors. It is found on page 17 of the most recent audit report (Years Ended June 30, 2022, and 2021) and on page 18 of the prior year's report (Years Ended June 30, 2021, and 2020). The amount reported to have been paid to the landscape maintenance contract vendor for the year ended June 30, 2021, was \$2,444,797, but should have been \$3,453,882. The error does not change the financial statements in any way since the correct number was used in all calculations and the remainder of the report. The Boards believe that disclosure of the error at the monthly Board meetings and in *The Villager* are the most effective and efficient methods to inform the membership.

Is the Restaurant/Bistro service charge subject to Sales Tax?

CBOD Response:

Thank you for your question concerning the Restaurant/Bistro service charges and whether they are subject to sales tax. The quickest and most direct response to your question is “yes,” under California state law, a service charge, when presented to a customer on their bill, is subject to sales tax.

What are the “service charges” included in the amount of the total bill at The Villages Clubhouse? The service charges imposed by The Villages Clubhouse are a mandatory fee to all patrons. Service charges are intended as a guaranteed form of “tip” to our Clubhouse personnel. The aggregate amount of service charges is collected and distributed across several employees, not only your server, and is included in their W-2 taxable wages.

Any “Additional Gratuity” that you add to your bill is held for your specific server and paid to them by The Villages and is also considered taxable wages. Any additional cash gratuity you pay to your server or other Clubhouse employee is theirs to keep and is not collected nor managed by The Villages. The employee is responsible for tax reporting and paying any taxes on cash gratuities.

To be complete, any additional gratuity or tip that you add to your bill is considered an optional payment by you and is not subject to California state sales tax.

At The Villages, the current mandatory service charges are as follows:

For a Curbside order; service charges are 15 percent.

A Restaurant or Bistro order, service charges are 18 percent.

A Villages resident-sponsored banquet event, service charges are 18 percent.

An outside banquet event without a Villages resident sponsor, service charges are 21 percent.

Service charges of 18 percent are the industry norm. Some hotels have service charges of 20 percent to 22 percent for banquets. The Villages has benchmarked our service charges with Silver Creek Country Club and San Jose Country Club, and both organizations have service charges of 18 percent.

Back in 2014, The Villages service charges were 15 percent for Restaurant, Bistro, and To-Go orders. It was 18 percent for banquets. In July 2017, The Villages service charges were increased to 18 percent for Restaurant and Bistro orders to match the service charges assessed by our closest competitors.

In 2018, The Villages Clubhouse began its “Curbside Service,” and lowered those service charges to 10 percent in September 2019. The service charges for Curbside Service were increased to 15 percent in May 2021.

The Villages seeks to provide the highest quality service in all its Clubhouse food and beverage operations. Feedback from Villagers is valued and is used to improve everyone's experience at the Clubhouse. 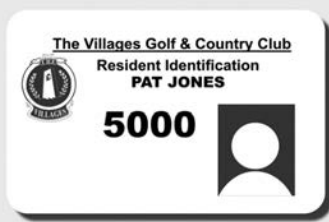

Sign up for trip to see ‘Great Compositions: Beethoven and Steinbeck’

Join us on **Wednesday, March 29** as we visit the Ira F. Brilliant Center for Beethoven Studies and the Martha Heasley Cox Center for Steinbeck Studies, which are part of the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Library’s special collections. The former is an extensive library and museum founded in 1985 and devoted solely to the life, works, and accomplishments of Ludwig van Beethoven (1770-1827). The latter, founded in 1973, is a research center dedicated to the author John Steinbeck (1902-1968) and is now the largest archive committed to his work in the world.

We will depart from Cribari East Parking Lot at 12:30 p.m. with an estimated return time of 4:30 p.m.

Both centers have personal items, historical artifacts, print media and other materials curated from their extensive individual collections on display. In addition to their exhibit the Beethoven Center will provide a demonstration of the historical 18th and 19th century musical instruments— which include a harpsichord, a fortepiano, and a clavichord. Then a member of the Steinbeck Center staff will provide a tour of their exhibit and be available for questions. Materials from other library special collections should be available to view as well.

Activity Level: Light to moderate activity (elevator to exhibits, seating may not be available).

The cost of \$33.50 per person includes round trip transportation and donation to venues. Space is limited, please register early! Donations to both centers are included in the price; additional donations may be made at your discretion. Gratuity for driver is included in price, additional tipping is at your discretion. His impact on the game of baseball was felt worldwide as he mentored players and teams in Canada, Austria, Holland, Italy, Lithuania, and Romania. John was inducted into the ABCA Hall of Fame in 1994, alongside John Madden and Bill Walsh.

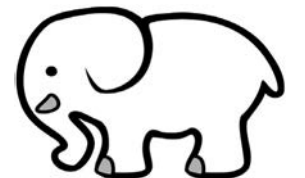

“Our Missing Hearts” by Celeste Ng: Twelve-year-old Bird Gardner lives a quiet existence with his loving but broken father, a former linguist who now shelves books in a university library. Bird knows to not ask too many questions, stand out too much, or stray too far. For a decade, their lives have been governed by laws written to preserve “American culture” in the wake of years of economic instability and violence. To keep the peace, the authorities are now allowed to relocate children of dissidents, especially those of Asian origin, and libraries have been forced to remove books seen as unpatriotic—including the work of Bird’s mother, Margaret, a Chinese American poet who left the family when he was nine years old. Bird has grown up disavowing his mother and her poems; he doesn’t know her work or what happened to her, and he knows he shouldn’t wonder. But when he receives a mysterious letter containing only a cryptic drawing, he is pulled into a quest to find her. Fiction, 2022.

“The Bullet that Missed (Thursday Murder Club #3)” by Richard Osman: It is an ordinary Thursday, and things should finally be returning to normal. Except trouble is never far away where the Thursday Murder Club are concerned. A local news legend is on the hunt for a sensational headline, and soon the gang are hot on the trail of two murders, 10 years apart. To make matters worse, a new nemesis pays Elizabeth a visit, presenting her with a deadly mission: kill or be killed. While Elizabeth grapples with her conscience (and a gun), the gang and their unlikely new friends (including TV stars, money launderers and ex-KGB colonels) unravel a new mystery. But can they catch the culprit and save Elizabeth before the murderer strikes again? Mystery, 2022.

“Blood and Ruins: The Great Imperial War, 1931-1945” by Richard Overy: Blood and Ruins recasts the way in which we view the Second World War. Overy argues that this was the “great imperial war,” a violent end to almost a century of global imperial expansion which reached its peak in the ambitions of Italy, Germany and Japan in the 1930s and early 1940s, before descending into the largest and costliest war in human history and the end, after 1945, of all territorial empires. How war on a huge scale was fought, supplied, paid for, supported by mass mobilization and morally justified forms the heart of this new account. He explains the bitter cost for those involved in fighting, and the exceptional level of crime and atrocity that marked these imperial projects, the war and its aftermath. This war was as deadly for civilians as it was for the military, a war to the death over the future of the global order. 940.53, World War 1939-1945, 2021.

“Mad Honey” by Jodi Picoult and Jennifer Finney Boylan: Olivia McAfee knows what it feels like to start over. Her picture-perfect life—living in Boston, married to a brilliant cardiothoracic surgeon, raising a beautiful son, Asher—was upended. She never imagined she would end up back in her sleepy New Hampshire hometown, living in the house she grew up in. Lily Campanello is familiar with do-overs, too. When she and her mom relocate to Adams, New Hampshire, they both hope it will be a fresh start. And for just a short while, these new beginnings are exactly what Olivia and Lily need. Their paths cross when Asher falls for the new girl in school, and Lily can’t help but fall for him, too. With Ash, she feels happy for the first time. Yet at times, she wonders if she can she trust him completely. Then one day, Olivia receives a phone call: Lily is dead, and Asher is being questioned by the police. Olivia is adamant that her son is innocent. But she would be lying if she didn’t acknowledge the flashes of his father’s temper in him, and she realizes he’s hidden more than he’s shared with her. Fiction, 2022.

SENIOR RESOURCE SERVICES

Do we have to pay income taxes on Middle-Class Tax Credit?

The good news: you received a bank deposit or a debit card from the state of California in 2022. Additional good news is that the money you received from the state is not taxable on your California tax return.

The bad news: at this time the Federal government recognizes the money as federal income to be taxable on your federal return. If your payment was \$600 or more, you will receive a form 1099-MISC from the state of California. It should not be presumed that because you did not get a 1099-MISC, your payment is not subject to federal tax. While your payment of less than \$600 does not require a form 1099-MISC, it is still taxable.

If you gifted your deposit or card to a family member, or decided not to activate the card, you are still responsible for paying taxes on your credit. It was your choice to give your income to someone or to the government.

If you were eligible and have not received your credit by mid-February or believe it was lost or stolen, contact the FTB at 800-240-0223 or Money Network customer service at 800-542-9332. We advise people to call as early as possible. Customer service representatives are available on weekdays from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Wait times are typically the shortest on Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday.

'The Presentation' (Lk 2:22-40)

Editor's note: The Villager printed the incorrect byline for the Catholic Community article in the January 26 edition. The article's correct author was Jean Gillette.

Every year on February 2, Catholics recall how Mary and Joseph brought the child Jesus to the Temple to offer Him to God according to the law of Moses (Ex 13:2). We call this celebration the "Feast of the Presentation." While Jesus, Mary, and Joseph are the central figures in this event, two other participants deserve attention. They were an aged pair named Anna and Simeon.

Anna was the proverbial "church lady," the sort of pious old woman so derisively mocked by modern comics as foolish and useless. God took a different view of her. St. Luke called the 84-year-old widow a "prophetess." In his Gospel, he memorialized her decades of prayer and fasting day and night in the Temple. Luke described how she was drawn by an impulse from the Holy Spirit to witness the Presentation of Jesus, where she loudly praised God on seeing the child. Anna spoke of the infant to everyone within hearing who looked forward to the deliverance of Jerusalem, undoubtedly causing quite a stir!

At the same time, St. Simeon, an upright and devout old man, was also drawn by the Holy Spirit to the Temple. Luke tells us the Holy Spirit had promised Simeon that he wouldn't die until he saw "the Christ of the Lord." When Simeon arrived on the scene and saw the child, he lifted Baby Jesus in his arms and blessed God, then uttered the prayer known by Catholics as the "Nunc Dimittis," or Latin for "Now you may dismiss..." For centuries, Catholics have recited Simeon's prayer during our daily night prayers called "Compline," and depicted this scene in our art (view online).

Mary and Joseph listened in astonishment when Simeon prophesied, "You see this child? He is destined for the fall and for the rise of many in Israel, destined to be a sign that is rejected." To Mary, Simeon delivered this chilling message, "A sword will pierce your soul so the secret thoughts of many will be laid bare." Readers who've seen Spanish art depicting one or more swords plunged into Mary's heart will recognize Simeon's words as the Scriptural source of that symbolic imagery.

Nowadays, seniors all too often wear a metaphorical cloak of invisibility. Their wisdom and foresight go undesired or unheeded. Not so with God. Along with the shepherds, three wise men, and angels, God assigned this elderly pair the task of announcing His Son's arrival into this world. While nearly all of the once powerful and famous of that era go unremembered, the names of Anna and Simeon live on, a vital part of our Catholic heritage. They remind us that sometimes the most significant things we do and say might not come at the prime of life, but its end when least expected.

The ride was rejuvenating, and I was excited to roll up on my new Harley to see my wife and others at the meeting. After parking the bike, removing my helmet, gloves, jacket and goggles I went into an adjoining room for coffee and snacks. I greeted a few people and they inquired about my new bike as I continued to walk around the room. Every now and then I would notice my wife and she would rub her face and point at me but after a while she stopped doing it... so I gave no more thought to it. I continued to converse with others sitting next to me while she sat next to her sister across the room.

I decided to go to the restroom and while washing my hands, I glanced into the mirror and to my surprise, I looked like a raccoon. 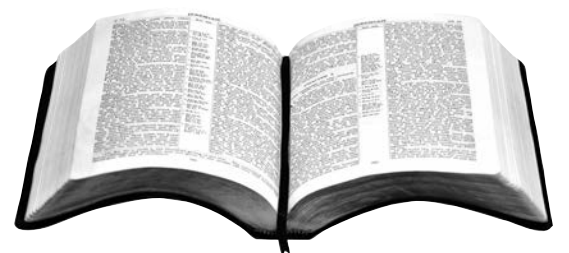

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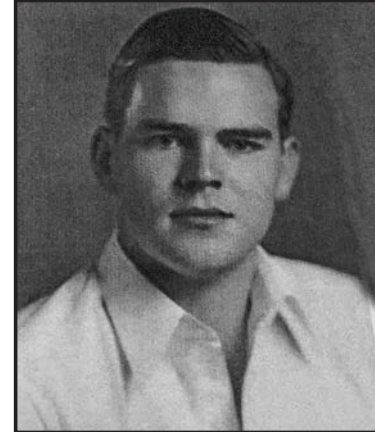


TENNIS TALK

The first Tennis Club tournament of 2023 is the Prescott Tournament in honor of Phil Prescott, the man responsible for the building of our courts 5 and 6 in 1998. Since only a handful of current club members were here when that happened, I felt it appropriate to enlighten the rest of us who were not here in 1998 to know about Phil Prescott. This article is in answer to the question often heard: “Who and what is Prescott?”

Phil Prescott was born in 1914 in Fresno and entered Stanford in 1932. He graduated in 1936 and married Wilma Knapp, a Stanford classmate in 1937. Phil graduated with an engineering degree and spent most of his working years at North American Aviation in southern California. While at Stanford they became friends with David and Lu Packard, the David Packard responsible for the Monterey Aquarium and refurbishing and remodeling San Jose’s California Theater into an opera house and for symphonic orchestras.



Not sure when Phil and Wilma took up tennis, but in 1966 they did a People-to-People tennis tour of Europe. People-to-People tours were started by Dwight Eisenhower to share cultures for better understanding. They played tennis with local clubs all over Europe.

Phil retired in 1975 at age 61 and then moved to The Villages

in 1979 to be close to children, grandchildren and Stanford. Phil was President of the Tennis Club in 1984 and I would like to quote from Phil’s Family History book: “We put on four or five tournaments during the year and had potluck suppers following the tournaments. For the Fourth of July parade, the club took the newly-acquired ball machine, placed it on the back of a truck and added bike wheels to make it look like a cannon. The ball machine spewed tennis balls out to awaiting tennis players. They would in turn hit the balls to other players on each side of the truck who would then catch the balls and feed them back into the ball machine. It was the hit of the parade.”

FROM THE PRO

Hole #8 Turf Reduction Project— You will see that the turf reduction spray out has started around the teeing ground complexes on Hole #8. There is yellow caution tape surrounding the sprayed out turf areas so please do not cross through the caution tape. We have sprayed the turf to ultimately kill the turf around the tee boxes starting the process of installing the drought tolerant landscaping as the initial phase of the turf reduction beta site. All of the tee boxes on Hole #8 will still be open for play as the spray out is occurring around the perimeter of the #5, #4 and #3 tee boxes. Let us know if you have any questions.

Downed Tree Removal—We have started the process of removing the four large Eucalyptus trees that fell as a result of the recent torrential storms that hit us at the beginning of January. We lost one tree on Hole #9, two trees on Hole #11, and one tree on Hole #15. This process will require the use of large equipment and trucks, saws, wood-chippers and stump grinders. Please be safe when playing golf and navigating around the work crews and their equipment. Please avoid these areas and keep a large breadth. Thank you. Let us know if you have any questions.

Golf Rules to be Aware Of – Post Storm Conditions

Due to the recent storms, you might find some unusual circumstances when playing golf.

Temporary Water is defined as a large puddle or an accumulation of water that is not in a penalty area and is apparent before or after the golfer takes his/her stance. If your ball enters such an area, you are entitled to free relief defined as one club-length completely clear of the water, no nearer the hole. The ball may be cleaned and must be dropped. If the temporary water is in a sand bunker, you may take the same relief, and your ball must remain in the bunker.

Large Fallen Limbs – if your ball comes to rest amongst an area of large or accumulated large fallen limbs and debris that is not removable, you may take free relief defined as one club length completely clear of the limbs or debris pile, no nearer the hole. The ball may be cleaned and must be dropped.

Maintenance Hotline and Daily Flag System—It's a good idea to stay informed now that the weather is more unpredictable. The Golf Course Maintenance Hotline and our colored Flag system is available for just that purpose. Each morning golf course maintenance will update the Maintenance Hotline to let you know about course conditions, cart access status and any maintenance going on that day. Please call 408-223-4663 to access the daily Maintenance Hotline. Also, each day the colored flag at the driving range will be updated to reflect each day's course conditions according to the following color codes:

Green Flag – carts are permitted on the golf course as normal

Red Flag – carts are restricted to the cart paths only

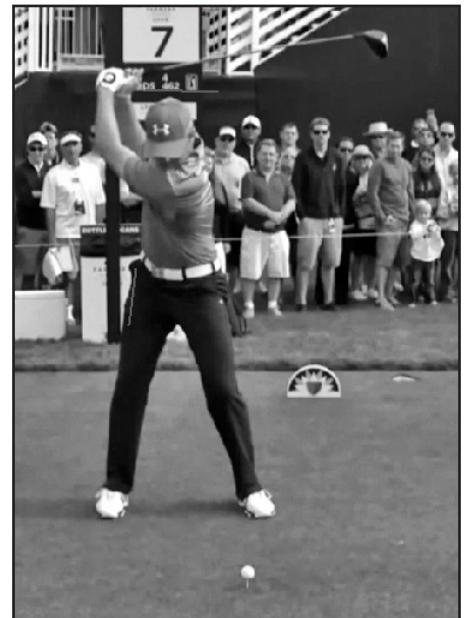
Yellow Flag – frost delay – golf play suspended until further notice

Black Flag – all golf facilities closed due to dangerous conditions

Tips from the Pro— Straight Jacket...Let the left arm bend for more distance

Look at these pictures; what do Kenny Perry and Jordan Spieth all have in common? They all bend their left arm on their backswing. The truth of the matter is that not all of us are flexible enough to make a complete backswing keeping the left arm straight. Some people can, like Rory McIlroy, but for those of us who cannot, go ahead and let that left arm bend. It will help create a longer club-head swing and will allow for more natural momentum generation and club speed. Think of a complete backswing as the longest possible club-head swing...not the biggest turn. There are many ways to generate distance and bending the left arm not only creates a longer club-head swing, it creates a leverage source as on the downswing the arm straightens which creates a "snap" affect at impact. So if you are trying for more distance, instead of thinking more turn, think bend my left elbow and swing the clubhead longer. Let us know

Golf Cart Yellow Lines Initiative

As part of the Villages continuing Culture of Care initiative for our 18-Hole golf course, in January we began the installation of yellow ground paint lines in front of the green complexes to clearly define the 30-foot golf cart restriction area at each green as prescribed in Golf Rule 1.14 Section 8-J:

8-J. Carts are to be kept on the cart path around all green complexes and teeing grounds. Carts must be kept a minimum of 30-feet from the green apron and are not permitted within the perimeter of greenside bunkers.

The yellow lines will take the place of stakes and ropes and serve as a visual reference point defining where golf carts cannot advance any closer to the green apron according to the 30-foot perimeter mandate in Rule 1.14, Section 8-J.

The former use of stakes and ropes for this purpose proved to be a challenge due to the following factors: Visually and aesthetically unappealing - Unsightly

Physical hindrance to golf shots - Formed an obstruction for advancing golf balls
Labor intensive - stakes and ropes were constantly moved, removed, and knocked down
Expense - the cost of attaining enough stakes and rope for each hole is very high

The yellow ground lines will serve as a better option than stakes and roping for the following reasons: Less Obtrusive - yellow ground lines will not create an above ground obstruction to golf shots approaching the green

Aesthetically Subtle - yellow ground lines will be more visually appealing than above ground stakes and roping

Permanence - yellow ground lines cannot be moved, knocked over or completely removed

It is important for the condition of the green complexes and associated turf to keep cart traffic a minimum of 30-feet from each green apron and outside the perimeter of the greenside bunkers. Cart traffic allowed too close to the greens damages turf, creates unsightly tire ruts and results in unfavorable playing conditions as the turf becomes thin, compacted, compressed and, in some cases, permanently damaged.

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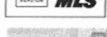

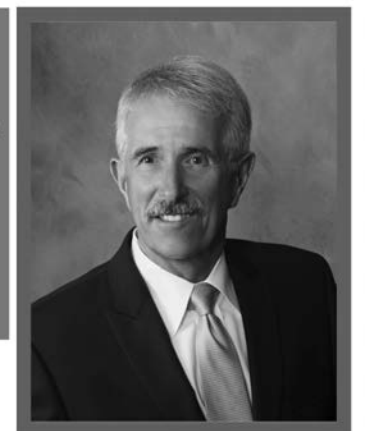

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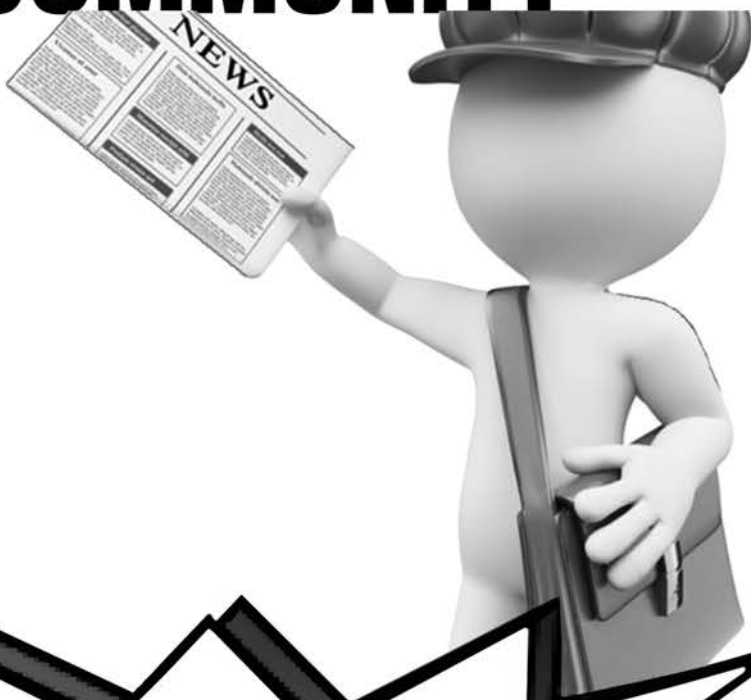

VMA 'Do's and Don'ts' — What to Know!

For medical equipment, rides and general questions please call the Volunteer desk at 408-432-4230.

Rides:

Medical appointments—

1. Schedule rides no earlier than four days in advance and no later than 2 days in advance
2. Rider must not receive sedation at appointment
3. Distance is restricted to no more than a 20-mile radius.
4. Drivers cannot provide riders with physical assistance i.e. help with walkers or wheelchairs
5. Office is closed Fridays, best to schedule a Monday or Tuesday appointment the previous week.
6. Driver will give you a two-hour window, which includes the pick-up/wait/return.
7. 4 rides/month/rider

Shopping (offered once/week)

Driver will take resident to neighborhood stores i.e. Lucky and CVS and will wait for resident. Resident must be able to shop on their own.

Medical Equipment:

VMA offers a variety of walkers, wheelchairs, canes and commodes (no return on commodes) and other equipment, please call the office before you buy!

Volunteers will deliver/pick up the equipment, which is stored in a separate unit. Do not bring items to the VMA office.

Incontinent Supplies:

VMA offers an assortment of items, which are provided by other villagers who have rec'd items in excess.

Sizes and types vary—please do not rip open bags to check on type it is on the package.

VMA does not deliver these items—please come to office to check.

Medications – no longer needed:

Prescriptions and non-prescription medications should be returned only during office hours.

Place in appropriate locked box.

Never place any medications in the mailboxes located across from the VMA office or hang them on the VMA door!

Items happily accepted at the VMA office:

Unopened incontinent supplies, glasses, contacts lenses, hearing aids, cell phones.

Clothing Donations—Call office for information—do not bring items to office.

What are you waiting for? Join NIXLE today

What if you had the opportunity to immediately get notification of an emergency that could affect you? And what if you could sign up to receive those notifications quickly and easily and at no cost to you? Wouldn't you jump at the chance?

Sadly, only about 25 percent of Villagers have enrolled in NIXLE, the Villages-specific communication/information system, since it was launched last year. NIXLE is a very important component of your taking responsibility for emergency response if needed. This information and notification system will be activated for water and power outages, road closures, fire and other more major disasters. Residents will receive alerts by text, voice message to landlines or cell phones or a combination of the two.

It's not too late "opt in." Without doing so, you will not be connected to alerts as they occur. To enroll by text, put 333111 in the "to" line and type "Villages" in the text box. That's it! If you don't use text as a communication tool, you can register on The Villages Resident Portal under Public Safety or at the EPC website, thevillagesepc.com or at nixle.com.

Don't delay. Help protect yourself and your household. Notification of emergencies empowers you. Act today!
