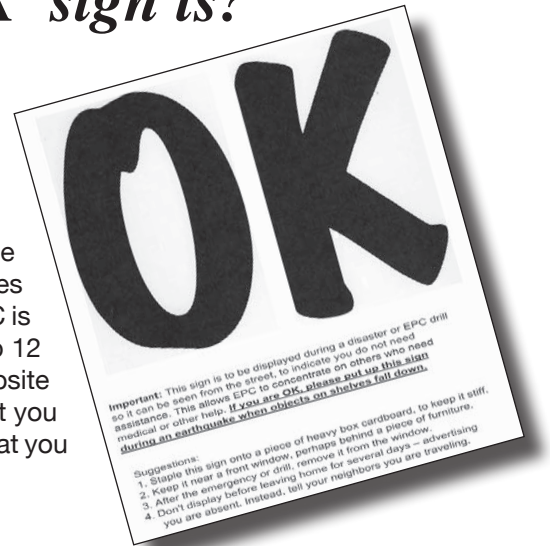
Do you know where your 'OK' sign is?

We hope this email finds you well. We are writing to address the intermittent service issues Villagers in certain neighborhoods recently experienced. We apologize for the inconvenience this certainly caused for those who were impacted and appreciate the grace and patience we received from residents, the board, and staff while we worked to resolve this. After becoming aware of these issues, we started a process of elimination by replacing field equipment to minimize the impact of service issues while trouble shooting. We moved impacted neighborhoods to a new fiber line completing this work the morning of August 31 resulting in resolution of this issue.

We are currently working to find the underlying cause to the original fiber link and have a real time device monitor on the original fiber and plan to run specific tests during the times where our customers had experienced the most issues. We understand the importance of uninterrupted service and are committed providing the best quality of service.

Club President's Message—September 26, 2023

Hello, Villagers! We've gratefully transitioned to the Fall season and I know I'm thankful for the cooler weather. Fall is my favorite season, and I'm sure it is for many Villagers. Evidence of Villagers enjoying the Fall season are the record number of golf rounds, the vigorous tournament play at the Bocce courts, continued excitement at the Pickleball courts, high levels of use at all four swimming pools, the fitness center, the tennis courts, and the hotel rooms. Let's not forget the wonderful opportunity to enjoy our beautiful Hill Lands and hiking trails. Villagers are busy with exercise classes, special interest clubs, arts and crafts, theater productions, various card games, Mahjongg, table tennis, and much, much more! The Villages is always striving to deliver on its Mission to provide a safe, attractive community that offers an enriching and active lifestyle for its residents.

Focusing on the business activities taking place to run The Villages, we've continued our review and discussion of how to better address the challenging property insurance conundrum we face, plus we've received a preliminary review of this year's financial audit. Both items will have a direct impact on next year's budgeting process as well as serving to improve many back-office business operations of The Villages. We are also looking forward to the selection and implementation of a new Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) system that will provide a dramatically improved set of financial systems to run the business operations of The Villages, and hopefully will also be ready in time to support the upcoming budgeting season. Another exciting and critical business activity occurring in October is a three Board Strategic Planning session, where we'll develop 3-, 5-, and 7-year strategic plans for The Villages. Our General Manager has engaged the McMahon Group to facilitate this session. Stay tuned for more information on the outcomes from this work.

We've made great progress on the landscaping plans for the non-residential Club property and will soon have visual representations of what's being planned. The Club Board has provided direction and feedback to the contract landscaping consultants and will move quickly to implementation as soon as the plans and designs are reviewed and approved. More information on this over the next couple of months.

This is also the time of year for our annual asphalt repairs, and we are so pleased to have work in progress in Montgomery, Highland, and Glen Arden districts. As a reminder, the Club Board owns the responsibility to maintain the streets inside The Villages, working in cooperation with the Association and Homeowners' Corporation Boards. Maintaining our streets helps to maintain the value of The Villages property and supports strong home values. The asphalt work will continue into early November, according to approved plans. Please pay close attention to all information that is posted in The Villager newspaper, the FastLane, and individual flyers that have been delivered to your tubes or doorsteps.

It's also the time of year to kick off the Club Nominating Committee, to begin the search for interested and qualified candidates for the Club Board. The upcoming election will have four open Director positions for the Club Board. If you are interested in participating in the Nominating Committee, please contact me right away. If you are interested in running for election for the Club Board, please also contact me and I'll set you on the path to achieving that dream.

As a reminder, I plan to create a Leadership Development Committee which will focus on developing the next set of knowledgeable leaders for all three Boards.

ABOD President's Message—September 26, 2023

As many of you know, I was a school teacher and administrator before retiring in 2016. My sisters are accountants and I was often jealous of their ability to fix errors with little or no human consequences. They could do a journal correction or move money into another account. I, on the other hand, had to deal with sobbing children, striking teachers and furious parents. Common sense could be staring me in the face but I had instead to follow state laws that occasionally made a situation worse! I agonized over many decisions, seeking advice from wise mentors and experts, and the responsibility was frequently daunting.

Serving on the ABOD reminds me of those days. Our decisions affect friends and neighbors financially, socially and, occasionally, emotionally. We deal with laws that sometimes make no sense or make a situation worse! We consult with experts and thoughtfully move forward even during daunting times.

Such is the agenda this month. We are grappling with fire safety and fire regulations for outdoor modifications, turf reduction and the look of our neighborhoods, rising insurance and construction costs, resident safety in Cribari with sidewalks and hand rails, and so goes a list of 16 items in one month. Please be assured we put the residents' needs at the center of every decision, considering the long and short term effects of whatever we decide.

Two items on the agenda are linked; whether or not to move to hybrid ABOD meetings and altering our meeting agendas to have items for discussion and items for a vote. We want our meetings to be efficient, effective and serve the needs of the ABOD, residents and staff.

I am delighted to announce that both Senator Dave Cortese and Councilman Domingo Candelas will be joining us at the Fire Safety Town Hall meeting on Thursday, September 28. Our agenda will include fire safety in our homes, the coordination of various fire agencies like San Jose Fire Department and CAL Fire, and a brief discussion on the Fire Reports each Village has received from Bay Area Fire Expert, Carol Rice. We hope all of you will join us in the Clubhouse for these lively topics.

Also coming soon are DAC meetings on Reserves and Roofing. It is important that DAC members understand how our Reserve Budgets are created, how we determine how much money we need to save and how those Reserves Budgets are annually adjusted for changing times or conditions. Our inhouse Reserves and construction expert, Ryan Bell, will be leading those meetings for each district advisory committee.

We will be voting on extending the CC&R timeline. Some folks claim it is "not what Villagers want" but we have not found that to be the case. A huge challenge for every HOA in America is apathy. People just can't be bothered, even when the changes are of direct benefit to them. I want to particularly thank Ken Brady, Deb Gordon, Julia Meadows and our staff for going above and beyond to try to get people to vote. We will be sending new ballots to all who have not yet voted in the hope that we will get to the 1,500 needed ballots. Only then will any ballots be opened. If you get a new ballot in the mail, please vote.

Finally, we are glad to be reviewing our annual goals today but next month we will be joining the Club Board, the Homeowners Board and our senior staff to look at strategic goals for the entire Villages for next three years, five years and beyond.

Our next two meetings will be October 31, Happy Halloween and November 14. They are moved closer together to allow all of us a holiday break. I will be traveling with my husband so I will leave those meetings in the capable hands of ABOD vice president, Mike Schwerin.

Association Operating Statement Review

For the month of August 2023

Revenue was (\$66) unfavorable to the budget of \$1,131,000.

- No major concerns to report at this time as we remain ahead of the budget by \$103 YTD.

Expenses for the month were \$205,000, favorable to the budget of \$1,288,000.

- July/August water bill coming in lower than the July accrual which resulted in a favorable variance to budget of \$252,000.

- Insurance expenses continue to be unfavorable to the budget as reported last month at \$44,000.

Notable unfavorable to budget expense categories for the month were the following:

- Insurance Expenses, (\$43,945) (13.36 percent) unfavorable to budget (actual \$372,791 vs. budget of \$328,846) due to impact of 2023 property insurance renewal effective May 30, 2023

The YTD net favorable operating budget variance for the month of August was \$205,497. See table below.

Completing the first two months of FY 2024 we can continue to see an unfavorable variance in Insurance Expense for the year total projected unfavorable variance (\$515k), based on when the budget was ratified and when the Insurance Renewal occurred. Better planning and estimates will be used as the budget process begins for FY 2025. YTD Water Budget favorable to budget by \$254,000, a review of the water budget versus current actual lead to believe we will continue to see favorable variances in our water usage since water restrictions continue. No other major variances to report.

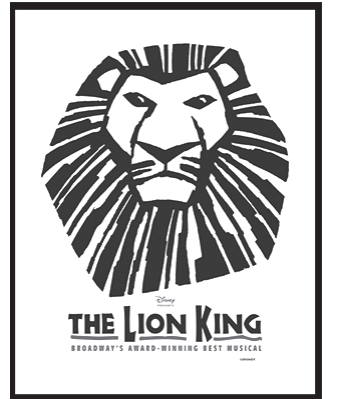

Villages-wide Biennial Age Certification Survey and Association Annual Statements of Compliance

Arriving in October will be the biennial age certification for all residents of The Villages encompassing both The Villages Association (condos) and also The Villages Homeowners' Corporation (single-family homes). For residents of The Villages Association (condos), the annual Association Smoke, CO Detectors and Insurance Statements of Compliance will also be arriving.

Age Survey: To continue our community's status as a senior community, The Villages must comply with the state and federal laws that govern senior housing developments. **The Villages Association and Homeowners' Corporation** must conduct periodic surveys (every other year) to verify and document that the community is in compliance. Failure to satisfy the legal requirements may result in a determination that our community is not a lawful senior community and therefore mean that we must allow persons of all ages to live here.

In order to fulfill the requirements imposed upon the Corporations, one resident of your condominium or single-family home must complete, sign and return the Age Certification (under penalty of perjury). Please note that if you are an offsite owner, you must have one of the tenant(s)/resident(s) complete and sign the Certification. Offsite owners are responsible for ensuring completion and return of the Certification by one of their tenant(s)/resident(s).

Association (Condos Only) Smoke, CO Detectors, and Insurance Statements of Compliance: In order to fulfill the requirements of The Villages Association Policies APo 408 Smoke Detectors Installation, Maintenance, Repair and Replacement, and APo 410 Carbon Monoxide (CO) Detectors, each owner is required to inspect (or have inspected by a third party) his/her villa on an annual basis to ensure their detector(s) are in working order and in addition, all Association residents (renters and owners) must provide a certification of insurance that complies with the Association CC&Rs and Association Policy APo 409 Home Owner & Resident Insurance Requirements and Verification.

State and local laws require a smoke detector in each sleeping room and in the hallway and a carbon monoxide detector be installed outside of each separate dwelling unit sleeping area. Per the policies, the replacement of smoke detectors

is required every ten years and replacement of CO detectors is required every five years. In addition, a statement of compliance shall be demonstrated annually.

All Association condo owners must maintain property and liability coverage (commonly referred to as HO6) plus loss assessment coverage. Renters must maintain liability coverage (commonly referred to as HO4 and property coverage in an amount deemed appropriate by the renter. Both parties are required to provide a certificate of insurance that complies with the CC&Rs.

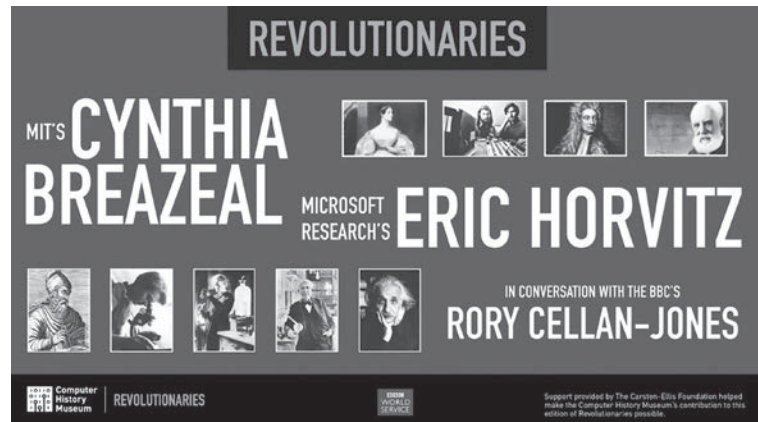

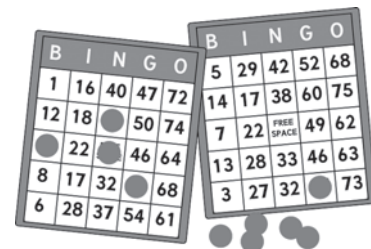

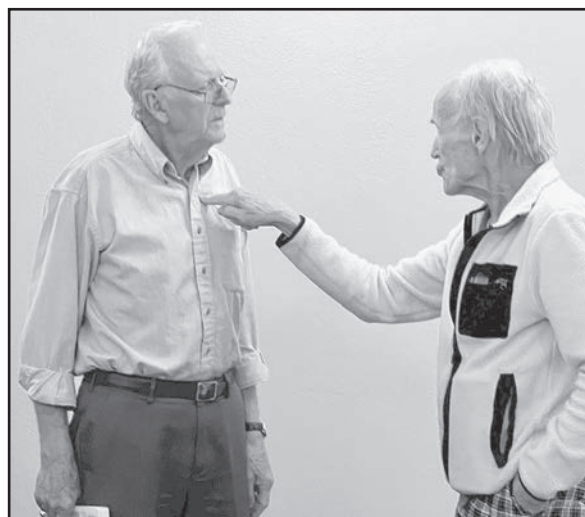

Prices are staying pretty neutral outside the Villages. Prices of homes in San Jose and surrounding cities (not including SF) are holding their value. The quantity of sales are way done year over year, but due to the inventory being so low, prices are not falling. Supply and demand at its best.

This may sound like deja'vu from my previous articles, but again, there are still too many Cribari homes waiting for new owners. My beautiful Cribari listing went into contract last week and so did one other, but we still have 13 more to go. The overall days on the market has increase from a typical 30 days or so, to about 40-50 days. Some are on the market a short time, if priced correctly or are lucky enough to be "that perfect home". But with less buyers out there, I find homes that are less remodeled or with an inferior location are staying on the market longer or even worse, having to lower their price.

"I'm not giving up my 30 year fixed mortgage at 3.00% interest rate!" Sellers have to confront the fact that if they sell their home to purchase another, they will be trading their 3.00% mortgage interest rate for more than double their current interest rate. So what we have is homeowners not willing to sell their homes. They are staying put and remodeling their home instead of moving. This is the main reason for the lack of inventory of homes for sale outside the Villages.

Then we have the buyers dealing with the high interest rates. The result: A slower real estate sales market, but a busy market for contractors. It can be difficult to get a good contractor out to work on a remodel and since they are very busy, they can charge higher rates. This is the nature of supply and demand. I have the system for prepping a property quickly and affordably. A win for all my clients.

‘Doing is more important than Believing’

In one of his posts, Fr. Richard Rohr wrote that one of the things he most appreciated about his Franciscan heritage is its emphasis on *orthopraxy* or what Buddhists call “right action.” Franciscans believe that lifestyle and practice are much more important than mere verbal orthodoxy. While orthodoxy is about correct beliefs, *orthopraxy* is about right practice. St. Thomas Aquinas, the famous Dominican Doctor of the Church, may have been influenced by St. Francis when he wrote, “Life is more important than doctrine.”

All too often Christianity has lost sight of that in spite of Jesus’ teaching and example. We think, “I’m a good Christian. I go to church on Sunday. I read the Bible. I love Jesus.” When we think we’re there, there’s nothing to learn. Jesus was clearly more concerned with right action, than with right saying or right thinking. You can hear this message very clearly in his parable of the two sons in this Sunday’s gospel. One son says he won’t work in the vineyard, but then does, while the other says he will go, but in fact doesn’t. Jesus told his listeners that he preferred the one who actually goes, although saying the wrong words, over the one who says the right words but does not act. He reminds us of something we often forget, that words can be meaningless. Promises are empty if not followed by action. After all is said and done, *doing* is more important than *believing*.

‘Angels Among Us’

You could say that angels are having a moment! According to a recent Associated Press poll, almost 69 percent of adults in America believe in angels, more than believe in Satan (56 percent). On a week when the Episcopal Church commemorates the Feast of St. Michael and All Angels, I find myself pondering the role of angels in our lives of Christian faith.

Despite the contemporary representation of angels as figures of comfort, the Bible typically represents them otherwise. The first appearance of angels in the Bible is in Genesis 3:24, when Adam and Eve were expelled from the Garden of Eden. God placed cherubim to block the entrance with a flaming sword. They are guardians of the holy, and bearers of news that is mission critical for God’s purposes—think of the threat to Sodom and Gomorrah or the annunciation to Mary, mother of Jesus—but also news that portends risk or danger. Most often, Biblical angels strike fear in those they visit, although “angel choirs” (think Luke 2:13) can evoke awe and worship. Not of the angels themselves, but of the holy God who sends them as messengers.

Do angels visit us still? As a Biblically-grounded pastor, I am convinced that they do. Not so much because I have experienced their fierce ministry of truth-telling (although I think that I have), but because I know that God longs to communicate with us... by all means possible!

But why the sand? It's really not to just annoy us. I've read that the sanding of the greens helps to smooth out the turf, improves airflow and drainage while helping the greens to heal more rapidly from the punched holes. This intensive aerification process helps to keep the greens here at VGCC in their optimal conditions so that we, the golfers, have the best playing conditions. And it will only be sandy for a few days.

Last Tuesday, the 19th, one of our Shonis had a beautiful 50-foot chip in on Hole #2 for a fantastic birdie. And she took home a three-week birdie pot. While out on the practice putting green, our pre-game Putting for Pesos putting winners added some Dinero to their sweeps envelopes. 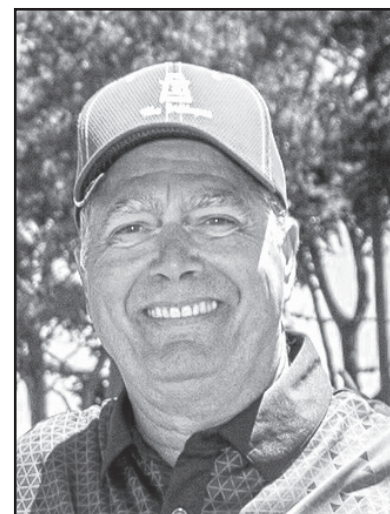

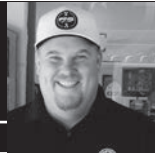

1. Follow the 90-degree rule (longer hitters) or the Entrance gates (shorter hitters) when entering the fairway
2. Avoid driving on the mounds surrounding our greens
3. Respect any roping and cart directional signs and please *exit* every hole through the *Exit Gates*
4. Park your golf carts behind the Yellow Lines 30-feet in front of each green
5. Repair your pitch marks on the greens
6. Fill your fairway divots with our sand mix provided on Hoe #1, #10, #6, #15
7. Smooth out the sand in the bunkers with the rake and knock the sand off your shoes before walking on the green
8. Do not drive on or too close to the #2 & #1 forward tees

Driving your golf carts properly helps to create consistent and predictable wear patterns making things easier to maintain. Driving carts on the greenside mounds breaks down the rough turf in these important areas that we chip from. Not fixing ball marks on the greens leaves a divot, which when mowed the next day causes scalping and a scar on the green. Not filling your divots or raking the bunkers leaves divots and footprints affecting the conditions for following golfers. Let’s all make it a goal to leave our golf course in better shape than we found it, *every time we play...Thank you!*

Tips from the Pro – More Bounce to the Ounce

Take a look at your sand wedge compared to all of your other clubs. You will see that it looks different in several ways...

1. It’s shorter than all of your other clubs – Why? Because it’s designed to play shorter shots – also a shorter shaft brings your hands closer to the clubhead making it easier to control the clubface
2. It has much more loft than all of your other clubs – Why? Because it’s designed to get the ball in the air quickly – also added loft allows the golfer to swing hard and excavate the ball from deep rough and bad lies without the ball going too far
3. The sole of the sand wedge is much wider and has more bounce than all of your other clubs – Why? A wide sole and greater bounce allows the club to slide through sand and firm tight lies without digging – to active the sole and bounce spin the clubface clockwise or open the clubface – the clubface will point to the sky – learn to deliver the sand wedge to the ball while maintaining and open clubface through impact and your bunker game and tight lies pitching game will improve – feel like your right hand stays “under” the grip at impact to maintain an open clubface and use the bounce to your advantage. **Let us know if these tips help Let us know if these tips help. 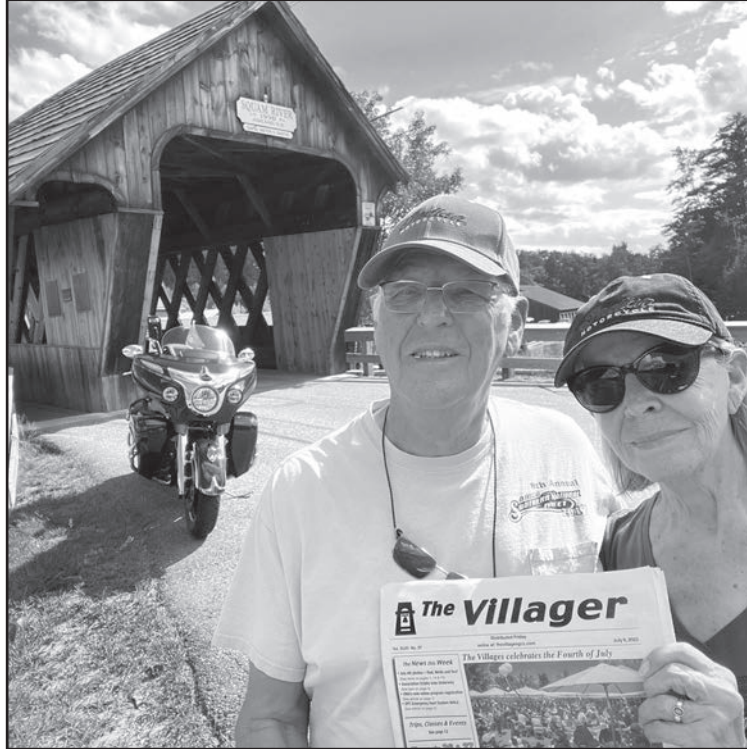

October 16 is the big pay-up day for the IRS and FTB

Because of the severe winter storms, residents of Santa Clara County were given until October 16, 2023, to file their 2022 income tax returns with the IRS and California FTB. And even better, any tax-payment deadline after March 9, 2023, was also postponed until October 16. But now the bad news: in just a little more than two weeks the filing-day and pay-up day arrives.

Your 1040 and 540 returns are due along with any balance owed on the returns. If you have not yet filed, October 16 is your due date. You might have filed your returns, but not yet paid the balance due. The time has come.

If you pay quarterly estimated taxes, you owe the quarterly payments for 2023 that normally would have been due on April 18, June 15, and September 15, 2023. Ouch, this is going to hurt!

Rather than mailing a check to the IRS, you may use the online Direct Pay Service. Go to www.irs.gov and click "Pay" on the top banner" and then "Pay By Bank Account (Direct Pay)". There is no fee to use the online Direct Pay service. Have your check book in front of you for your bank and account numbers.

There is also no fee to use the online Web Pay service to pay your Franchise Tax Board California tax. Go to www.ftb.ca.gov and click "Pay" on the top banner and then click on the "Make a Payment - Bank Account" button.

As you likely know, the IRS and FTB websites have sometimes crashed on big due dates. We recommend you schedule your payment(s) before October 16. When using Web Pay services, you can schedule the date the money is removed from your account. It does not have to be paid by the bank on the date you enter the authorization information.

You may also pay your taxes with a credit or debit card. There will be a fee which will be detailed for you.

Of course, you may always pay your taxes with paper checks. Be sure to put each payment in a separate envelope. Remember, you are dealing with the government. Don't confuse them. Be very sure all your envelopes are postmarked by October 16.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253 or e-mail SRS at villagessrs@sbcglobal.net. The website is thevillagesgcc.com/srs. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional advisor about your individual situation.

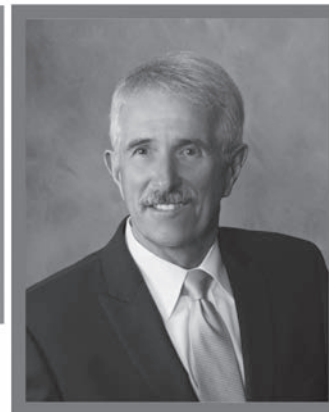

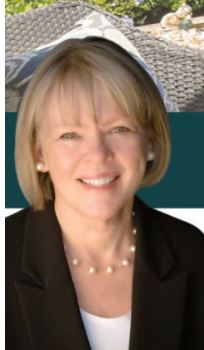
