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Did you do it?

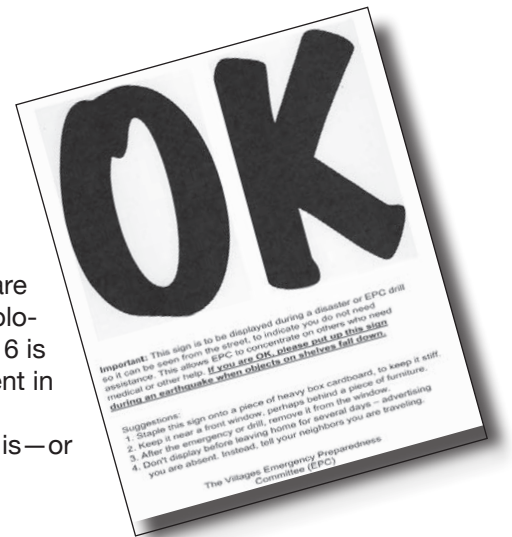

Villages-wide Biennial Age Certification Survey and Association Annual Statements of Compliance

Arriving in October will be the biennial age certification for all residents of The Villages encompassing both The Villages Association (condos) and also The Villages Homeowners' Corporation (single-family homes). For residents of The Villages Association (condos), the annual Association Smoke, CO Detectors and Insurance Statements of Compliance will also be arriving.

Age Survey: To continue our community's status as a senior community, The Villages must comply with the state and federal laws that govern senior housing developments. **The Villages Association and Homeowners' Corporation** must conduct periodic surveys (every other year) to verify and document that the community is in compliance. Failure to satisfy the legal requirements may result in a determination that our community is not a lawful senior community and therefore mean that we must allow persons of all ages to live here.

In order to fulfill the requirements imposed upon the Corporations, one resident of your condominium or single-family home must complete, sign and return the Age Certification (under penalty of perjury). Please note that if you are an offsite owner, you must have one of the tenant(s)/resident(s) complete and sign the Certification. Offsite owners are responsible for ensuring completion and return of the Certification by one of their tenant(s)/resident(s).

Association (Condos Only) Smoke, CO Detectors, and Insurance Statements of Compliance: In order to fulfill the requirements of The Villages Association Policies APo 408 Smoke Detectors Installation, Maintenance, Repair and Replacement, and APo 410 Carbon Monoxide (CO) Detectors, each owner is required to inspect (or have inspected by a third party) his/her villa on an annual basis to ensure their detector(s) are in working order and in addition, all Association residents (renters and owners) must provide a certification of insurance that complies with the Association CC&Rs and Association Policy APo 409 Home Owner & Resident Insurance Requirements and Verification.

State and local laws require a smoke detector in each sleeping room and in the hallway and a carbon monoxide detector be installed outside of each separate dwelling unit sleeping area. Per the policies, the replacement of smoke detectors is required every ten years and replacement of CO detectors is required every five

years. In addition, a statement of compliance shall be demonstrated annually.

All Association condo owners must maintain property and liability coverage (commonly referred to as HO6) plus loss assessment coverage. Renters must maintain liability coverage (commonly referred to as HO4 and property coverage in an amount deemed appropriate by the renter. Both parties are required to provide a certificate of insurance that complies with the CC&Rs.

The deadline to complete and return the Age Certification (all residents) and Smoke, CO Detectors, and Insurance Compliance forms (for condo residents) is on or before Monday, November 6, 2023. A summary of the age survey results (not including names or addresses) will be made available following completion of the survey.

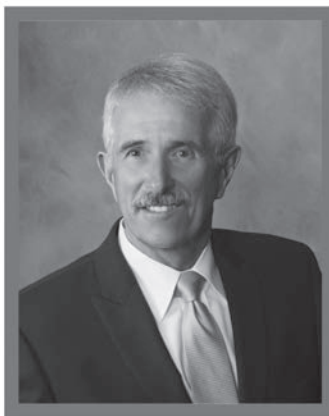

Did you sell your concert tickets for Taylor Swift? The IRS will know about that sale

A Villager wanted to do something special for her two pre-teen granddaughters. She purchased four tickets to one of the Taylor Swift concerts at Levi stadium. Unfortunately, one of the granddaughters caught Covid before they left Montana to fly to San Jose.

Grandmom immediately put the tickets for sale on StubHub and the tickets, which had cost \$360 per ticket, sold for \$1,900 each!

Grandma needs to be aware that the taxman is coming! In January, StubHub (or Ticketmaster or whichever service you used) will send her a form 1099-K (Third Party Network Transactions). The form will show the gross amount of the ticket sales—\$7,600 per the above numbers.

This form 1099-K has been around for a while, but the previous dollar limit was more than \$20,000 in revenue plus more than 200 transactions. Now the threshold is \$600 of revenue irrespective of the number of transactions.

Our Villager will show the \$7,600 of revenue and subtract her cost of the tickets and the fee charged by StubHub. She will pay tax on the net profit.

Ah, but what if this had been a different concert and while the tickets cost \$360, they could only be sold for \$200? Can she deduct her loss? This is one of those coin tosses with the IRS that goes like this: Heads, the IRS wins; Tails, you lose. A gain is taxable; a loss is a personal nondeductible loss.

Where is your Advance Health Care Directive?

You fell last night and are now in the hospital. Does your family have a copy of your Advance Health Care Directive or is it hidden away somewhere in a safe place that your family doesn't know about and can't find?

Oh, good news, the hospital has an electronic copy of your form, so the original doesn't need to be found. There are even two agents listed to serve as your health care power of attorney. Choice #1: your spouse who died seven years ago. Choice #2: your sister who is now in a memory care home.

Now ask yourself where is your form? And, are your health care agents still your correct choices?

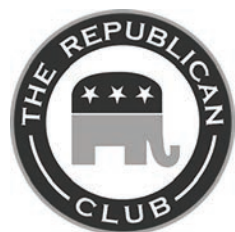

How the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) can help you make energy efficient changes to your home

Want to make changes to your home to make it more energy efficient, save money on your utilities bill, and do your part in reducing emissions that are causing climate change? A good first step would be to visit the nonprofit Rewiring America's website at rewiringamerica.org and clicking on the IRA Savings Calculator. This will take you through a simple form that will show you what discounts and tax credits you might be eligible for. Don't assume you can't afford to make these changes because the lower your income, the more you help you will be eligible for. And there are discounts for higher income folks as well, so check it out. Some examples are:

For **one person homeowner with a \$50,000 income**, the calculator shows: \$14,000 in upfront discounts and \$8250 in tax credits; and you will save an estimated \$1350/year on your utilities bill. The report also shows exactly what credits you would be eligible for, i.e., \$8000 for a Heat Pump Air Conditioner and Heater as well as many other credits/rebates.

For **a two-person homeowner with \$130,000 in income**, the calculator shows upfront discounts of \$14,000 and \$13,100 in tax credits and a yearly savings on your utility bill of \$1350. The report also shows exactly what credits you would be eligible for, i.e., \$8000 for a Heat Pump Air Conditioner and Heater as well as many other credits/rebates. (Note that although these discounts and credits are similar to the single person with a lower income, they actually are given to a two-person household).

As you review the detail on your options, you can click on the More Info button and get a lot of questions answered (like what is a heat pump!) and why would I want one. And when you are ready, proceed on to the tab that assists you to "Make your plan." And you can be off to making changes that will not only make your home more energy efficient (saving you \$ on your utility bill), but will be doing your part in reducing emissions that are causing climate change. 'Fidelity to Christ's New Covenant'

By his passion and death, Jesus established the new covenant which is the foundation of our relationship with him and the Christian Community. The readings for the **27th Sunday of Ordinary Time** challenge us to be faithful to this covenant, unlike the people of Judah during the time of the Prophet Isaiah. That community was unfaithful to the covenant that God established with them and hence Isaiah (5:1-7) said they would be dispersed from their land (8th century B.C.). He used a parable of a vineyard that would come to ruin because of the people's spiritual infidelity to Yahweh.

The evangelist Matthew (21:33-43) used a similar parable of a vineyard to highlight the evil actions of the people of Jesus' time, who disregarded Jesus' teachings and even rejected/killed the vineyard owner's son (Jesus). By this parable, Matthew also pointed out that God will look favorably on/give the Kingdom to those who heed the words of Christ and adhere to the new covenant.

In the second reading, St. Paul urges the people of Phillipi (4:6-9) to keep on following the teaching of Jesus. In doing so, he says, they will experience a peace that only God can give.

Paul's words encourage us to follow his example by living out the virtues associated with the peace of God: truth, honor, justice, purity, beauty, graciousness, and charity. When we do so, we demonstrate our fidelity to the new covenant, we decrease our anxiety, and we will experience God's gift of peace.

'The Courage of His Convictions'

This very week, the Episcopal Church remembers William Tyndale (1494-1536) on our calendar of saints. You won't find him on a Roman Catholic calendar sanctorum, however, because he was a principal architect of the English Protestant Reformation. Tyndale is chiefly known for his English language translation of the Bible, the first to draw upon original language sources and be printed on a press. Hence, it received wide distribution and was profoundly influential across the British empire. Like so many of the brave European reformers, Tyndale received both praise and threats. He was not a fan of papal authority—which pleased King Henry VIII—but nor was he a fan of the king's serial divorces and marriages. Tyndale was ultimately executed for his theological positions, but he kept his own prayer-informed counsel and never wavered from his commitment to making the Bible accessible in common languages.

It's hard to imagine the courage of Tyndale and his Reformation colleagues, as few of us have been (or will be) called on to live out our Christian convictions in this way. But isn't this exactly why we take the time to remember our forebears in faith? They remind us to give thanks for their witness, and also to be faithful in the smaller commitments that we may be called upon to make. Where do we stand our ground for the good news of God, and of equal importance, how might we support each other in the courage of our convictions?

PICKLEBALL

'I really want to improve my game! Help!'

We hear this often, so here are a few friendly suggestions.

Serve Deep. This does two things: 1. It keeps your opponent away from the kitchen line. 2. It makes their return serve shot harder because it's further away.

Return Serves as deep as possible.

Don't Be a Victim of the Pickleball Panics. It's easy to lose control over your body when you play. We've all been there. To help with this, focus on your footwork. When you panic, your feet tend to shut down. Keep your feet relaxed.

Always Be Ready. What do infield baseball players look like when the pitch is being thrown? They're not standing up straight with their hands at their sides! They're crouching slightly with their glove and hands ready. Do the same in Pickleball. It doesn't really matter how you do it, but just getting in your stance is important.

Make Sure You Stretch. It will help you prevent injury and help you on the court.

Unlock Power Shots the Right Way. When a hard hit shot comes over the net, stop the power shot by not swinging at it. Instead, stick your paddle out and just let it collide. It works!

Know The Rules including the non-obvious ones. For example, did you know that touching the net is a fault? Or that it's also a fault if you and your partner disagree on a line call on your side of the court?

If the ball goes out, call it quickly. It's not just common courtesy, but it's a rule as well. When you're judging whether a ball is in or out, you have to make your judgement nearly instantly. (Oops, yours truly is sometimes guilty of not doing this) Make sure you say it *loudly* so all can hear you. "Out!"

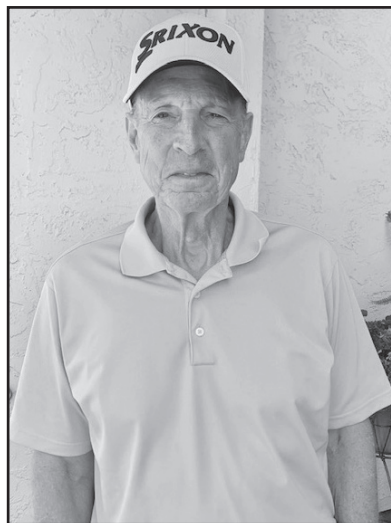

Golf Hours of Operation—As we move into Fall, the daylight hours become more constricted, and the days are much shorter. Due to this the golf hours of operation will be adjusted accordingly.

The Pro Shop will close at 5:30 p.m. in early October, and at 5 p.m. in late October.

The last tee time will be 5:30 p.m. in early October, and 5 p.m. in late October.

The first tee time of the day will be just after sunrise, so it will move to after 7 a.m. as October progresses.

Fall Aeration Interseeding Schedule continues

Tees aeration and greens aeration have been successfully completed.

Monday, October 9 through end of month—Fairways aeration 18-Hole and Par-3 Course (weekdays only)

Rye Grass Interseeding will commence after fairway aeration is completed at the end of October.

We will play winter rules deined a 6-inches lift, clean and place no nearer the hole as we move through fairway aeration and interseeding.

Villages Golfers – Be a part of our “Culture of Care”—We can all participate in keeping our golf course beautiful by observing these **simple acts of care**:

1. Follow the 90-degree rule (longer hitters) or the Entrance gates (shorter hitters) when entering the fairway

2. Avoid driving on the mounds surrounding our greens

3. Respect any roping and cart directional signs and please *exit* every hole through the *Exit Gates*

4. Park your golf carts behind the Yellow Lines 30-feet in front of each green

5. Repair your pitch marks on the greens

6. Fill your fairway divots with our sand mix provided on Hoe #1, #10, #6, #15

7. Smooth out the sand in the bunkers with the rake and knock the sand off your shoes before walking on the green

8. Do not drive on or too close to the #2 & #1 forward tees

Driving your golf carts properly helps to create consistent and predictable wear patterns making things easier to maintain. Driving carts on the greenside mounds breaks down the rough turf in these important areas that we chip from. Not fixing ball marks on the greens leaves a divot, which when mowed the next day causes scalping and a scar on the green. Not filling your divots or raking the bunkers leaves divots and footprints affecting the conditions for following golfers. Let’s all make it a goal to leave our golf course in better shape than we found it, every time we play...Thank you!

Tips from the Pro – Club-face vs Club Path

If you hit a slice to the right or a hook to the left, here are some simple ball flight laws that if you understand, might help you out.

If you hit a **slice** think about this...swing the clubhead more to the right, and keep the club face pointed left, that way you are guaranteed to reduce your slice and hit it straighter or with a slight draw to the left.

If you hit a **hook**, think about this...swing the clubhead more to the left and keep the club face pointed right, you are guaranteed to reduce your hook and hit it straighter or with a slight fade to the right.

It’s simple physics...so think about the above tips, and digest them, and then try it on the range and see if your slice or hook doesn’t go away, I guarantee it will! It’s all about how the clubface relates to the path of the swing. **Let us know if these tips help. To sign up for a lesson with me, email ssteele@the-villages.com**

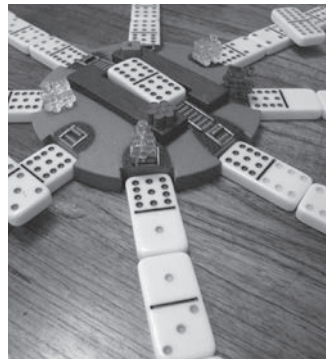

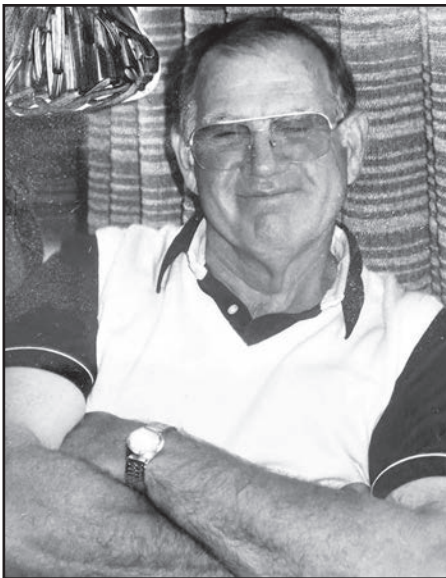

“The Wager: A Tale of Shipwreck, Mutiny, and Murder” by David Grann. On January 28, 1742, a ramshackle vessel of patched-together wood and cloth washed up on the coast of Brazil. Inside were 30 emaciated men, barely alive, and they had an extraordinary tale to tell. They were survivors of His Majesty’s Ship the Wager, a British vessel that had left England in 1740 on a secret mission during an imperial war with Spain. While the Wager had been chasing a Spanish treasure-filled galleon known as “the prize of all the oceans,” it had wrecked on a desolate island off the coast of Patagonia. The men, after being marooned for months and facing starvation, built the flimsy craft and sailed for more than a hundred days, traversing 2500 miles of storm-wracked seas. This boat contained just three castaways, and they told a very different story. The 30 sailors who landed in Brazil were not heroes – they were mutineers. The first group responded with countercharges of their own, of a tyrannical and murderous senior officer and his henchmen. It became clear that while stranded on the island the crew had fallen into anarchy, with warring factions fighting for dominion over the barren wilderness. As accusations of treachery and murder flew, the Admiralty convened a court martial to determine who was telling the truth. When Pippa discovers Gabe knew the victim, the questions spiral...Did the victim jump? Was she pushed? And would Gabe, the love of Pippa’s life, her soulmate...lie? As the perfect facade of their marriage begins to crack, the deepest and darkest secrets begin to unravel. Fiction, 2023.

“The Way of the Bear” (Leaphorn, Chee & Manuelito #8) by Anne Hillerman. An unexpected death on a lonely road outside of Utah’s Bears Ears National Monument raises questions for Navajo Tribal Police officers Jim Chee and Bernadette Manuelito. Why would a seasoned outdoorsman and well-known paleontologist freeze to death within walking distance of his car? A second death brings more turmoil. Who is the unidentified man killed during a home invasion where nothing was taken? The Bears Ears area, at the edge of the Navajo Nation, is celebrated for its abundance of early human habitation sites and the discovery of unique fossils. Chee and Manuelito appreciate the area’s scenery and wealth of human and scientific resources, but their visit to this beautiful place is disrupted by unprecedented violence that sweeps them both into danger.
