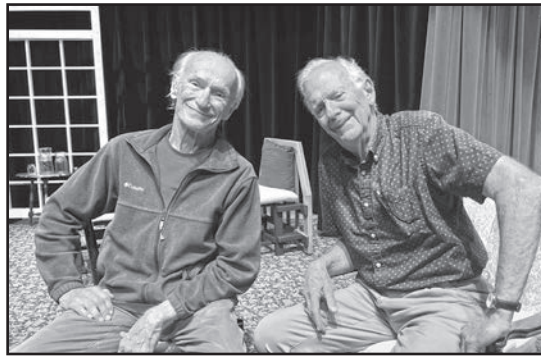
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'The Sunshine Boys' opens Friday evening

A peek at just a few of the music selections shows that we can look forward to music from "The Temptations On Stage." This American vocal group originated in Detroit, Michigan and released a series of successful singles and albums with Motown Records during the 1960s to early 1970s - their five-part harmony is timeless!

If a march gets your toes tapping, you will be sure to appreciate the band's performance of John Philip Sousa's "The Gladiator." This epic march from 1886 was written as a tribute to Charles B. Towle, a journalist at the Boston Traveler, when Sousa was leader of the US Marine Band.

We will hear Billy Joel's "Root Beer Rag" - a composition from Billy Joel's 1974 album "Streetlife Serenade" and is an instrumental track in a very fast ragtime style. In a musical lecture Joel once said "I got my first Moog Synthesizer. This was in the mid-70s and I got my first Moog and I put it on every record. I said 'I have to write an instrumental where I can use this Moog Synthesizer.' It kinda turned me off the synthesizers forever after. That's why I wrote that song. Just purely out of stupid self-indulgence."

As rehearsals go on and the spirit grows, we can expect to enjoy a few more selections, and we do hope you will come for the show. To quote another conductor, "Without you it's just another rehearsal!"

'Ask the CBOD' Response – October 20, 2023

Margaret Lam, writes:

With the summer heat wave this year, we have been using the swimming pools more frequently. Since the COVID restrictions have been lifted, we would like to know when the "indoor showers" at the pools would be open?

CBOD Response:

Thank you for writing to the Club Board on the matter of the "indoor showers." This topic has recently been brought to our attention by other Villagers. The Club Board and Villages Management are planning to address this activity in the preparatory work being performed right now ahead of the upcoming budgeting season.

In specific, the Club Board has recently formed a Facility Work Group that is performing a comprehensive assessment of requirements for all Club amenities, including the indoor showers at each swimming pool facility. The action steps for this property-wide assessment activity are:

1. Club Board—Facility Working Group will conduct a thorough review of and document the findings regarding all Club facilities and amenities.

2. This findings report will be presented to the entire Club Board for consideration and prioritization as part of the upcoming planning process for the FY24/25 budget year.

3. The final prioritized list of prioritized work will then be communicated to the Villages staff, who will proceed to establish a scope of work for each amenity/project and allocate the necessary funds, whether for maintenance, repairs, or capital improvements, to bring the component or amenity up to the standard for Villagers to access and enjoy.

It should be noted that, right now, the priority of indoor shower repairs and maintenance, as well as the associated costs and any potential capital investments resulting from the Club Board—Facilities Working Group's review, findings, determinations, and prioritization, are still undetermined. Today, this work is not a planned nor budgeted activity.

Recognizing it's been over three years since the indoor showers have been open. It's important to understand that the process of reopening them is not as straightforward as merely attaching a shower head and restoring the water supply. Several factors must be considered, such as:

Plumbing Inspection and Repairs

a. Requires a thorough inspection of all plumbing components, which include pipes, valves, faucets, and fittings, to detect any indications of corrosion, leaks, or damage.

b. Resolution of any plumbing problems that are identified during the inspection, such as leaks, clogs, or deteriorated materials, by conducting essential repairs or replacements.

Accessibility and Safety

a. Verify that indoor shower areas adhere to current accessibility standards, ensuring proper spacing, installation of grab bars, and the presence of slip-resistant flooring.

b. Conduct safety assessments of the electrical systems within the shower areas to mitigate potential hazards and ensure compliance with safety protocols.

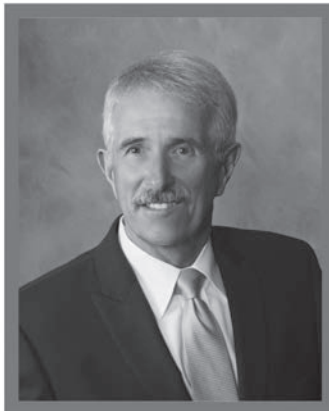

(SRS) SENIOR RESOURCE SERVICES

Don't be on auto-renewal with your Medicare Part D drug plan!

Read on, this could save you money.

If you are the age to have Medicare and you have a Medigap health insurance plan to supplement Medicare Parts A and B, you likely also have a Part D Prescription Drug Plan. Typically, your present Part D prescription plan will automatically roll over and renew for the next year. If you take no action.

Life changes. Drug plans change. You may be on different medications than you were when you first chose your Plan D. Or the plan you originally chose may have changed its formulary and it no longer offers the same drugs. The Medicare Annual Enrollment Period (AEP) is now upon us, running between October 15 through December 7. Each year the AEP provides an opportunity for you to ensure that you have the most appropriate prescription drug plan for your needs. The counselors at Health Insurance Counseling and Advocacy Program (HICAP) are on call during AEP to help you figure out the best plan for your needs.

The tool that HICAP uses is called **Plan Finder** located online at Medicare.gov. If you wish some guidance, you may contact the HICAP counselor for The Villages, Doug Campbell, by email or phone. Doug will schedule an appointment with you to run your medications through Plan Finder and at the same time he will instruct you how to potentially do it on your own for subsequent years. We highly recommend doing an end of year evaluation to be sure you are in the most economical D plan for your needs.

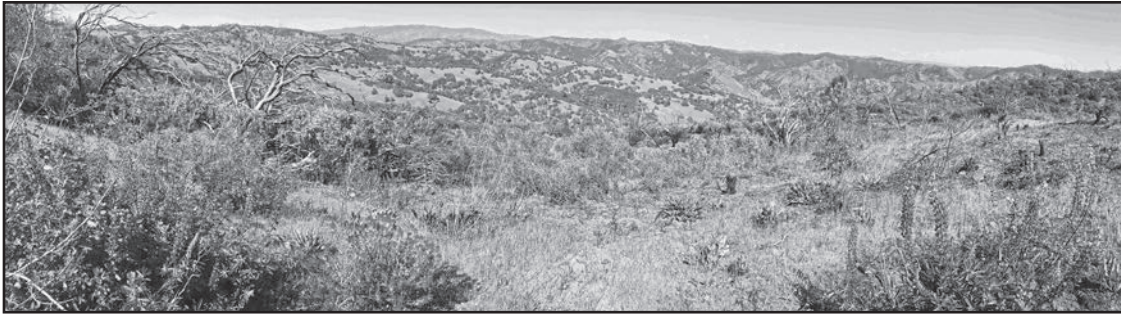

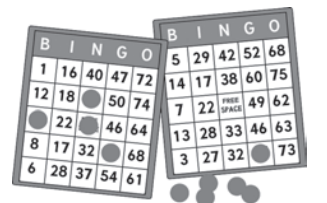

"On the Line" by Fern Michaels. Mateo Castillo is a rising star chef on the verge of breaking out in Manhattan's cutthroat celebrity cooking scene – until a mysterious illness sends him to the ER. Their journey first to Mexico and then the United States is filled with danger and uncertainty, but eventually they're able to make a home and a family. Now, Mateo's strange illness threatens to uncover a dark secret that even he could never have guessed, exposing his family to dangers from the past—while clouding the investigation into who is trying to hurt Mateo in the present. Fiction, 2023.

"The Only Survivors" by Megan Miranda. A decade ago, two vans filled with high school seniors on a school service trip crashed into a Tennessee ravine—a tragedy that claimed the lives of multiple classmates and teachers. The nine students who managed to escape the river that night were irrevocably changed. A year later, after one of the survivors dies by suicide on the anniversary of the crash, the rest of them make a pact: to come together each year to commemorate that terrible night. To keep one another safe. To hold one another accountable. Or both. Their annual meeting place, a house on the Outer Banks, has long been a refuge. But by the 10th anniversary, Cassidy Bent has worked to distance herself from the tragedy and from the other survivors. She's changed her mobile number. She's blocked the others' email addresses. This year, she is determined to finally break ties once and for all. But on the day of the reunion, she receives a text with an obituary attached: another survivor is gone. Now they are seven—and Cassidy finds herself hurling back toward the group, wild with grief—and suspicion. Almost immediately, something feels off this year. Cassidy is the first to notice when Amaya, the annual organizer, slips away, overwhelmed. This wouldn't raise alarm except for the impending storm. Suddenly, they're facing the threat of closed roads and surging waters...again. Then Amaya stops responding to her phone. After all they've been through, she wouldn't willfully make them worry. Would she? And—as they promised long ago—each survivor will do whatever he or she can do to save one another. Won't they? Mystery, 2023.

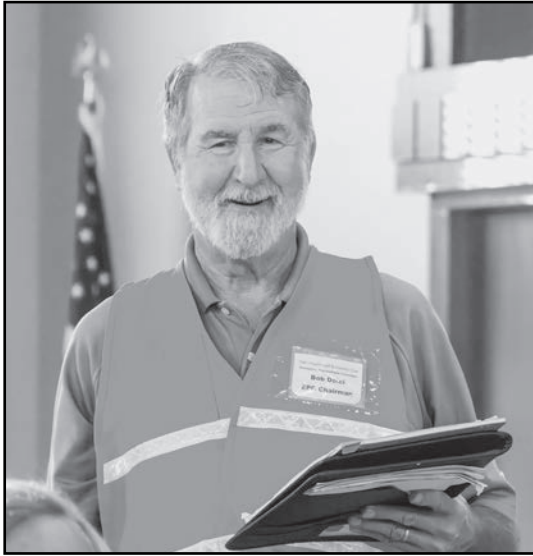

The idea that witches flew on brooms was a myth perpetuated during the witch hunts of the Middle Ages, originating from pagan rituals where a broom was used to sweep an area clean before a ceremony. What you will need to make your treat bags:

- Brown paper lunch bags (2 for each treat bag)
- Scissors
- Small branches (1 per treat bag)
- Candy
- Twine

Instructions:

- 1) Open a bag and cut it into narrow strips, starting at the upper edge and stopping just before the base.
- 2) Open a second bag and cut it into narrow strips, starting at the upper edge and stopping after 1 or 2 inches.
- 3) Place the second bag inside the first bag and fill the inner bag with candy.
- 4) Insert a branch into the bag and gather the upper edges of the bags around it to create the broom shape. Wrap the twine about 1-2 inches from top and knot it to hold everything in place.

More homes for sale enter the market in the Villages. It is mid-October and there are approximately 30 homes on the market and half as many are pending. The quantity of homes entering the market tends to slow down after mid-November. We shall see what happens this year.

How can buyers avoid 7% plus mortgage interest rates? The average interest rate for 30-year fixed-rate mortgages with conforming loan balances (\$726,200 or less) increased to 7.67% from 7.53% this last week. At the same time, the average mortgage interest rate for 5/1 ARM (5 year fixed then goes to a 1-year adjustable rate mortgage) decreased to 6.33% from 6.49%. Home buyers are now choosing to use the less expensive short-term fix rate loans to buy homes. The level of ARM type loans applications increased by 15% over the last week. They cost less than the 30-year fixed now, but after 5 years, the fixed rate turns into a 1-year adjustable rate loan. It's a gamble.

'Render unto Caesar'

For churches that use the Revised Common Lectionary (a three-year cycle of Biblical readings curated for reading in church on Sundays), we're in the midst of a season of teachings about stewardship of property. Over the past several weeks, the Gospel of Matthew has given us a whole series of parables about wealth and work, poverty and pettiness. In characteristic rabbinic style, the stories in the 21st and 22nd chapters of Matthew lend themselves to multiple interpretations, but—in general—they call the wealthy to account. That's scripturally consistent: pretty much the entire sweep of Biblical history advocates for care for the poor and fair distribution of God's resources. But then comes the unexpected teaching of Matthew 22:21, which many of us will hear this Sunday: "Give therefore to the emperor the things that are the emperor's, and to God the things that are God's."

Is this a teaching about the importance of tax-paying, intended for faithful people at all times and circumstances? Given the oppressive circumstances of Roman occupation in Jesus' day—and Matthew's own status as a former tax-collector—probably not. Rather, it is a specific response to a question that was intended to trap Jesus into choosing among loyalties, any one of which might get him killed. His savvy answer avoids the trap, but also points to a deeper choice we all must make. What is a "coin" of our ultimate loyalty? The money with which we engage in commerce and taxation, or the unlimited currency of God's love?

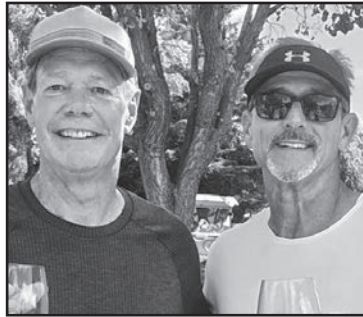

FROM THE PRO

Golf Hours of Operation—As we move into Fall, the daylight hours become more constricted, and the days are much shorter. Due to this the golf hours of operation will be adjusted accordingly.

The Pro Shop will close at 5:30 p.m. in early October, and at 5 p.m. in late October.

The last tee time will be 5:30 p.m. in early October, and 5 p.m. in late October.

The first tee time of the day will be just after sunrise, so it will move to after 7 a.m. as October progresses.

Daylight Savings Time - Winter Golf Hours November 7 – February 2024

DST ends Sunday, November 5 – Winter Schedule Starts Sunday, November 5

Pro Shop Hours – Sunrise to 5 p.m. (4:30pm in the later Winter Months) – 3 p.m. on Mondays

Golf Course Hours – Sunrise to 4:30 p.m. – Last available tee time is 4:30 p.m. daily-4 p.m. in the later winter months

Monday Golf – 12 p.m. Shotgun – Driving Range Closes at 2 p.m. for weekly maintenance

Pedestrians on Monday will be limited to before 12 p.m. during non-DST months

Winter Rules—From now until further notice we will be playing Winter Rules defined as 6-inch relief, through the green (includes the rough), no nearer the hole, pick-clean-and place, no penalty.

Fall Aeration Interseeding Schedule continues

Tees aeration and greens aeration have been successfully completed.

Monday, October 9 through end of month—Fairways aeration 18-Hole and Par-3 Course (weekdays only)

Interseeding will commence—Starting in November, we will start Inter-Seeding the fairways with Rye Grass. This practice will require additional irrigation to help the seed germinate. We do this to help create a uniform turf condition in our fairways and to fill in continual bare spots on the fairways.

Villages Golfers – Be a part of our “Culture of Care”—We can all participate in keeping our golf course beautiful by observing these **simple acts of care:**

1. Follow the 90-degree rule (longer hitters) or the Entrance gates (shorter hitters) when entering the fairway
2. Avoid driving on the mounds surrounding our greens
3. Respect any roping and cart directional signs and please *exit* every hole through the *Exit Gates*
4. Park your golf carts behind the Yellow Lines 30-feet in front of each green
5. Repair your pitch marks on the greens
6. Fill your fairway divots with our sand mix provided on Hoe #1, #10, #6, #15
7. Smooth out the sand in the bunkers with the rake and knock the sand off your shoes before walking on the green
8. Do not drive on or too close to the #2 & #1 forward tees

Driving your golf carts properly helps to create consistent and predictable wear patterns making things easier to maintain. Driving carts on the greenside mounds breaks down the rough turf in these important areas that we chip from. Not fixing ball marks on the greens leaves a divot, which when mowed the next day causes scalping and a scar on the green. Not filling your divots or raking the bunkers leaves divots and footprints affecting the conditions for following golfers. Let's all make it a goal to leave our golf course in better shape than we found it, every time we play...Thank you!

Tips from the Pro – Lamb in the Woods

We all do it (some more than others). Hit a drive into the woods and end up with no option but to punch out and try to recover. Try these four tips to help you save those strokes when punching out...

Complete your pre-shot routine. Don't get

lazy...stick with your routine...If your brain isn't focused on hitting a quality shot you can easily put yourself in more trouble than where you began. Stand behind your ball and focus on an exit window, set the clubface 1st aimed at that window, build your stance and grip around the clubface, double check your clubface alignment, waggle and go.

Take dead aim. Picking a specific target where you want your ball to end up might seem like a waste of time on a punch shot, but if you don't do it you are leaving your score to chance. You must select a specific target and ensure that you are confident in how you are going to get the ball there if you want to execute a quality punch-out. Think one shot ahead...where do you want to hit your next shot from, and then get it there.

Use the right club. Lower is better than higher for most punch shots, so use your 3-iron, 4-iron or 5-iron and stay away from those hybrids or lofted irons as they have a lower center of gravity and want to go high.

Keep it under control. Many amateur golfers make the mistake of swinging too hard on their punch-out shots sending their ball flying across the fairway and into the trees on the other side. Make a confident but relaxed swing and don't take the club back any further than half way when you're punching out. Also remember that the lower the swing speed, the less spin we impart, and the lower it goes. So stay cool when in the trees (the shade will help) and think your way out. **Let us know if these tips help. To sign up for a lesson with me, email ssteele@the-villages.com**

3. Service Box warm up with partner – Two Touch – bump ball and send (important! Both players to count each touch this is to help focus and readiness)

4. Rally short court 10-15 reps

5. Rally – Volley 10-15 times! (1 Up 1 Back Alternate Baseline player to feed some overheads)

6. Rally Both back –half court – Cross Court 10 –15 times each

7. Serve and Return (Serve + 1) both players are to practice serve and recover with return 3 shots this will prevent - **Serve and Observe!**

• Pack your Bag with towels, grips, sunscreen

WHAT TO EXPECT:

Please be advised that ASI Asphalt Solutions, acting as the contractor for The Villages Golf and Country Club, will be performing work on your streets to maintain the road surface.

Temporary traffic delays and on-street parking restrictions will occur during the work. Other streets in your neighborhood may be scheduled for this work on other days. Villages-wide Biennial Age Certification Survey and Association Annual Statements of Compliance

Arriving in October will be the biennial age certification for all residents of The Villages encompassing both The Villages Association (condos) and also The Villages Homeowners' Corporation (single-family homes). For residents of The Villages Association (condos), the annual Association Smoke, CO Detectors and Insurance Statements of Compliance will also be arriving.

Age Survey: To continue our community's status as a senior community, The Villages must comply with the state and federal laws that govern senior housing developments. **The Villages Association and Homeowners' Corporation** must conduct periodic surveys (every other year) to verify and document that the community is in compliance. Failure to satisfy the legal requirements may result in a determination that our community is not a lawful senior community and therefore mean that we must allow persons of all ages to live here.

In order to fulfill the requirements imposed upon the Corporations, one resident of your condominium or single-family home must complete, sign and return the Age Certification (under penalty of perjury). Please note that if you are an offsite owner, you must have one of the tenant(s)/resident(s) complete and sign the Certification. Offsite owners are responsible for ensuring completion and return of the Certification by one of their tenant(s)/resident(s).

Association (Condos Only) Smoke, CO Detectors, and Insurance Statements of Compliance: In order to fulfill the requirements of The Villages Association Policies APo 408 Smoke Detectors Installation, Maintenance, Repair and Replacement, and APo 410 Carbon Monoxide (CO) Detectors, each owner is required to inspect (or have inspected by a third party) his/her villa on an annual basis to ensure their detector(s) are in working order and in addition, all Association residents (renters and owners) must provide a certification of insurance that complies with the Association CC&Rs and Association Policy APo 409 Home Owner & Resident Insurance Requirements and Verification.

State and local laws require a smoke detector in each sleeping room and in the hallway and a carbon monoxide detector be installed outside of each separate dwelling unit sleeping area. Per the policies, the replacement of smoke detectors is required every ten years and replacement of CO detectors is required every five years. In addition, a statement of compliance shall be demonstrated annually.

All Association condo owners must maintain property and liability coverage (commonly referred to as HO6) plus loss assessment coverage. Renters must maintain liability coverage (commonly referred to as HO4 and property coverage in an amount deemed appropriate by the renter. Both parties are required to provide a certificate of insurance that complies with the CC&Rs.
