

Enjoy patriotic selections of a 34-voice chorus led by Mark Fish and listen to two contrasting speakers, Lt. Col. Joshua "Sully" Sullivan and Dr. Clyde Horn. Lt. Col. Sullivan, USAF, is a department chair and professor of Aerospace Studies and Commander of ROTC at San Jose State University, University of California at Santa Cruz, Stanford University and the University of Santa Clara. With almost 3,000 hours as a pilot, about 800 of those in combat, Sully is a true "Renaissance man." Accompanying him will be three ROTC cadets from SJSU.

The Villages Music Society (VMS) is delighted to be sponsoring a "toe-tapping" concert performance by the Santa Clara Valley Fiddlers Association (SCVFA) on **Sunday, November 19, from 2:30 to 4 p.m.** in Cribari Auditorium.

This benefit concert will help the VMS to best position itself for sponsoring performances throughout the year.

Open seating tickets will sell for \$20. You may purchase them on Saturday, November 18 from 10 a.m. to noon in the Cribari lobby, or at the door on Sunday, November 19. Cash, checks, and house charges will be accepted.

The image of an old-time fiddler represents the origins of traditional music as played in many parts of rural America. Over the years, SCVFA's members have shared many other traditional genres. Thus, the organization has expanded to include acoustic music from many parts of the country—and the world—all connected through a

shared love of music, unique heritages, and the delight of playing music with others. As the group's founder, Bill Wein, put it, "Music self-played is happiness self-made."

The purpose of this local group is to carry on activities, which revive, study, and perpetuate traditional music. They perform and teach a wide variety of styles, including old-time, country music, bluegrass, western swing, Celtic, Scandinavian, and other traditional styles. Their music is played on acoustic instruments such as fiddles, guitars, banjos, mandolins, string basses, accordions, and harmonicas. The participants range in age from under 8 to over 80, and currently there are nearly 160 members from the greater San Francisco Bay Area.



As you can imagine, making jewelry encompasses many delicate materials, from beads to wire, gemstones to precious metals. Tere shops at different gem shows and bead shops to get ideas and materials to make her jewelry. She incorporates her different talents of identifying



Association/Homeowners documents available via e-mail

Per an amendment to California Civil Code, homeowner associations are permitted, with owner's written consent, to distribute annual disclosures, (like the pro forma budget summary) and other specified association documents to owners via electronic mail, facsimile, or other electronic means (such as posting on the association's website) instead of sending those documents out by regular mail or personal delivery. This has the potential to provide cost savings to The Villages. Delivery and postage costs for the Villages' annual distribution of the pro forma budget summary alone are close to \$1,000, not to mention the paper and printing costs.

In order to transmit association documents via e-mail or by posting on the homeowners association's website, 1) the homeowners association must first receive the owner's written consent, and 2) the homeowners association sends a separate notice to the owner that the documents have been posted and are available for viewing.

Consent forms for owners to request delivery of documents have been developed for both The Villages Association and Homeowners Corporations. These forms provide an owner's consent to electronic delivery of documents that are capable, under current laws, of being distributed electronically. Owners have the right to revoke this request and receive "hard copies" of the documents by sending a written revocation signed by the owner, to the applicable corporation.

Forms of owner's written consent are available in Business Administration Buildings A and B, and on The Villages web site, http://www.thevillagesgcc.com (Click on *Resident Info* and then Click on *Resource Files*.)

Coyote reminder and tips

Coyotes may try to escort walkers out of an area to protect their pups or food sources when encountered on a trail or street. Humans may perceive this behavior as stalking, which is usually not the case. They may also view your pet as prey. To allow coyotes to be wild while keeping yourself and pets safe, please follow these pointers:

• Never feed coyotes—it is illegal to feed coyotes in most places. Feeding endangers your family and neighbors because it lures coyotes into neighborhoods.

• Keep unattended cats and dogs indoors or in completely enclosed runs, especially at night, and do not assume that a fence will keep a coyote out of your backyard.

• Accompany your leashed pet outside. Make sure you turn on lights if it is dark to check your backyard for unexpected wildlife.

• Keep dogs on short leashes while walking outside; the Division of Wildlife recommends a leash no longer than 6 feet.

• Keep noisemakers on hand to scare away coyotes that may enter your yard. Some examples of noise makers are whistles, horns or metal cans with small rocks or coins that rattle.

- Never run away or turn your back on a coyote.
- Do not allow a coyote to get between you and your pet or child—keep children close to you.

• Yell, clap hands, blow a whistle or rattle a can and try to make yourself look larger if you have a close encounter with a coyote.

An empty soda can with pennies sealed with duct tape makes a very good noise maker when shaken.
 Reminder to all small pet owners: A recent rise in coyote aggression has been seen with small dogs, most unleashed. *Please always leash your pets. Keep leashes short.* Coyotes will try to get between you and your pet if the leash is extended far enough. Coyotes are known to attack leashed dogs when the owner gets distracted. Please stay cautious and aware of your surroundings when cleaning up after your pet, talking to a neighbor, checking the mail, etc. Coyotes are opportunists and may make their attacks when you are not paying attention.

Carry a noise maker and always be alert. Use caution when walking past wooded areas, hiding spots between homes, and the golf course. They are widespread in The Villages and can truly be anywhere.

There is no way to completely eliminate coyotes from The Villages, so always use caution when walking, especially with pets. Also, coyotes tend to be most active around sunrise and sunset. Pick different times for walks.

Senior Adults Legal Assistance (SALA) is a valuable resource available to seniors. Established in 1973, SALA provides free legal services and community education for residents in Santa Clara County who are age 60 or older. There is no low-income requirement to use SALA's services.

SALA's attorney staff provides a range of legal services from simple advice to referrals to occasional comprehensive legal representation. SALA's caseload consists of legal matters that private attorneys typically do not handle and that have a great impact on the seniors most in need. SALA specializes in legal matters dealing with:

- · Elder Abuse: Restraining or protective orders; domestic violence restraining orders; revocation of Powers of Attorneys (for financial abuse).
- Public Benefits: Social Security & SSI (except disability cases); Medicare and Medi-Cal; and In-Home Supportive Services
- Long-Term Care: Nursing Home & Residential Care issues
- Housing: Landlord-tenant problems
- · Incapacity Planning: Advance Health Care Directives; Powers of Attorney
- Probate alternatives: Death of Joint Tenant Affidavits; Small Estate Affidavits (valued at \$166,250 or less)

SALA offers "self-help" packets to clients in the following areas:

- Lodger Statute Eviction
- Affidavit Death of Joint Tenant
- Small Estate Affidavit (for estates valued at \$166,250 or less)
- Uniform Statutory Form Power of Attorney
- Revocation of Power of Attorney
- Holographic Will
- Statutory Will (for elders with very modest estates)

Clients wishing to obtain a self-help packet must go through the regular appointment process so that an attorney can assess whether the packet is appropriate for their particular case.

SALA services are available, usually one day monthly, by appointment at nearby senior centers. The closest center to The Villages is Southside Center, 408-629-3435, located at 5585 Cottle Road.

Urgent legal assistance is available by calling SALA's hot line at 408-295-5991. SALA uses guidelines to determine if your problem qualifies as an emergency. Currently, elder abuse, termination of Public Benefits and Sheriff's evictions may be considered urgent depending on the circumstances. Be sure to have complete information and the person's name and telephone number to report an emergency.

SRS has a flyer listing fourteen community centers which SALA visits. Stop by the SRS office if you would like a copy or leave a message at 408-239-5253. You may also obtain more information at sala.org.

The Villages salutes the men and women who Honoring our Veterans: A Commitment Beyond Veterans Day

Today, we pay tribute to the brave men and women who have dedicated their lives to service. To our fallen heroes, our veterans, active-duty service members, guardsmen, and reservists, your patriotism, courage and sacrifice deserve not only recognition, but a commitment that must extend far beyond Veterans Day.

We've taken strides in the right direction to serve our veterans, like the "All the Way Home" campaign that I co-launched, which, since its inception in 2015, has transitioned more than 2,200 veterans from the streets into safe housing. We also opened the Veteran's Housing Facility in San Jose that provides shelter and essential services to 130 homeless veterans. Our concerted efforts have resulted in a nearly 10 percent reduction in the homeless veteran population in Santa Clara County.

This year, the State Legislature achieved significant milestones with new laws like AB 531 and SB 82.

AB 531 is a monumental \$6.38 billion general obligation bond that will facilitate the construction of 11,150 new mental health treatment beds and supportive housing units, expanding outpatient capacity to serve tens of thousands of individuals annually. This historic investment will create dedicated housing for those experiencing behavioral health conditions, including a specific allocation of \$1 billion for veterans' housing. It is the largest expansion of California's behavioral health treatment and residential settings to date.

SB 82 addresses the Disabled Veterans Property Tax Exemption, streamlining the application process to ensure a fair and uniform process for veterans who have served honorably and are disabled due to service-related injuries or diseases.

Let us continue to honor, protect, and care for those who have sacrificed so much for our nation and, today, as we salute our veterans, let us remember that our gratitude must translate beyond Veterans Day.

Senator Dave Cortese represents District 15 which encompasses much of Santa Clara County in the heart of Silicon Valley. Along with his accomplished career as an attorney and business owner, the Senator previously served on the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors, the San Jose City Council, and the East Side Union High School District Board.



Jerry Kleinberg



The players will plant their flags next to the ball whenever their score reaches NET 72 + their Handicap. For example, a player with a 10 handicap would plant his flag where his 82nd shot comes to rest. Players whose last shot comes to rest on any green, or in the hole before their score

reaches NET 72, will place their flags to the right of the green in the fringe area. Players who shoot NET 72, or less on their final hole will place their flags in the circle at the back of the green and will receive a \$15 Sweeps Credit.

'Gifts of the Scots'

As someone of Scottish heritage myself, I am keenly aware of the spiritual debt of gratitude I owe to my forebears for what is now the Episcopal Church. Not that Queen Margaret of Scotland (b.1045) was Episcopalian—in pre-Reformation Europe, she could only be Catholic. Nor even was Samuel Seabury (b. 1729) an Episcopalian, when a secret meeting of post-revolutionary Anglican clergymen sent him to Scotland in 1873 to be consecrated Bishop for a newly independent American church. And yet, they both embodied the distinct piety and fierce independence of leaders forged in the rugged Scottish landscape.

Separated by gender, status, and almost 700 years, Queen Margaret and Samuel Seabury could dly have been more different. Margaret strove to unite Christians in the Kingdom of Scotland to the rest of Catholic Europe, while Samuel's purposes were schismatic. The Anglican church in America could not continue without a bishop, and Anglican bishops were vowed to serve the King of England. So Samuel went to Scotland to be consecrated by bishops who had made no such oath of loyalty. This allowed him to return to America to continue the apostolic succession for an American Episcopal Church. It might be fair to say, however, that both Margaret and Samuel were blessed by (and blessed) the spirit of the Scots. Transplants, both of them, they brought a distinct commitment to the mission of Jesus and a respect for the particularity of the Scottish history and landscape as a catalyst for grace and continuity.

Interseeding Schedule

Interseeding Fairways

Through November, we will start Interseeding the fairways with rye grass. This practice will require additional irrigation to help the seed germinate. We do this to help create a uniform turf condition in our fairways and to fill in continual bare spots on the fairways.

Fairway Topdressing

Through November we will be Topdressing the fairways with a layer of sand, and the sand will be dragged in to help it settle into the top layer of the turf. This new practice will, in the long term, create a more porous top layer of turf to allow for better permeation of water, air and nutrients to the roots. This will ultimately boost the health and consistency of the fairway turf. A gypsum application will follow Topdressing to aid in turf growth and seed germination.

Tips From The Pro – PGA Director of Golf Scott Steele Lighter is Better

Do you know how much your driver shaft weighs? If you don't know, you should. One of the most common requests we receive when we are giving golf lessons or providing club fittings is, "How can I hit it farther with my driver?"

It's really a simple equation, a faster club speed equals a longer drive. Statistics show on average, every mile per hour gained in club speed can garner an additional 3 to 5 yards in total distance. That is significant. So how do you increase your club speed without a drastic change in your swing? Go lighter. The lighter the shaft, the more speed you can generate, it's basic physics. The modern era of golf has maximized how much COR a driver can produce, so what's next? The shaft. Lightweight shafts are the new craze in golf, and for our demographic at The Villages, lightweight shafts are something everyone should try. Of course, the results may vary depending on how the impact condition (center face contact) varies and how much spin is produced (more spin equals less distance). But if you do not try a lighter weight golf shaft, you are doing yourself a dis-service. So come to the Pro Shop and try something new, instead of the old 70-gram-80-gram shaft, try a 35-gram-40-gram shaft and see if you can hit it farther-after all, that's what we all want.
