Notice of New Association Architectural Committee Volunteers needed! (AC) Rule D-32 Area Projects in Common Area

At the October 31, 2023, board meeting, the Association Board approved new AC Rule D-32 Area Projects in Common Areas and to publish proposed new rule for the required member comment prior to formal approval consideration at the January 30, 2023, board meeting.

The purpose of the proposed rule is to provide a process for the request of Area Projects that do not fall under exiting Association Architectural Committee (AC) rules which are to be constructed or installed on Association Common Areas and are not in conflict with Association Rules.

Response to the proposed new rule may be made by one or more of the following methods: 1) Participation in the discussion of the proposed new rule at the Association Board of Directors December 12, 2023, and January 30, 2023, board meetings, 2) via written comments delivered to the Board through Maria Hernandez in the General Manager's office at mehernandez@thevillages.com.

D-32 Common Area Projects - Draft F

Projects proposed for construction or installation in Association Common Areas that do not align with the existing guidelines set by the Association's Architectural Committee (AC) must receive approval from both the AC and the Association Board of Directors (ABOD). These projects are unique in nature, and their review by the AC and ABOD is essential to ensure they align with the orderly maintenance, preservation, and enjoyment of Common Areas and do not jeopardize the health, safety, convenience, or welfare of all residents (Villagers).

Application Procedure:

A. Project Request Submission

 Start by submitting a "Project Requirements Form" to the AC. This document should include the following details: project description and purpose, project location, any necessary alterations to common areas, potential impacts on existing common area elements (like trees, landscaping, hardscape), possible effects on surrounding Villas, and any other relevant information.

B. AC Meeting Attendance

 Attend the regular monthly AC meeting to review the "Project Requirements Form" and receive feedback from the committee. If the project is substantial, the AC will provide a list of specific items required for the formal Project Application package.

C. Common Area Alteration Agreement

 Prepare a "COMMON AREA ALTERATION AGREEMENT" application, signed by the applicant(s), which is similar to an Owner Alteration Agreement. Include comprehensive plans and specifications. All applicants must be Association members residing in the affected District(s). In some cases, a District Advisory Committee (DAC) may also apply. Plans should be drawn to scale on substantial paper, providing clarity regarding the project's location, nature, extent of work, and maintenance responsibilities. Ensure that the project adheres to this rule's requirements.

D. Document Submission

· Submit all necessary documents, including estimated costs, to the AC by the monthly submittal deadline, as published in The Villager.

E. Approval Process

• The AC will determine a renewal period, and after each period, project compliance will be reviewed by staff. Upon AC approval, with possible conditions, the maintenance and landscape departments must also review and approve the project.

F. ABOD Approval and Member Advisory Vote

 Following AC and staff approval, the proposal will be presented to the Association Board of Directors (ABOD). If approved by ABOD, a confidential member advisory (non-binding) vote will be conducted by the Association Inspectors of Elections. Ballots will be distributed to all members in the affected District(s). These ballots will be color-coded to distinguish between members within 100 feet of or having a line of sight with the project and other members. The results will be counted and reported at the next regular ABOD meeting by the Inspectors of Elections. Owner comments and the outcome of the advisory vote will be carefully considered by the ABOD when deciding whether to approve the project.

G. Ongoing Monitoring

· After approval and project construction, the AC and staff will continue to monitor the project at the end of each renewal period to ensure compliance with initial requirements and any new safety or building code requirements in effect. If the project is not in compliance, the AC may recommend remediation or removal to the ABOD.

An increase in coyote aggression and incidents with deer

have created problems with small dogs, especially those that are unleashed.

Please always leash your pets. And keep leashes short the Division of Wildlife recommends a leash no longer than 6 feet.



Furthermore, accompany your leashed pet at all times while outside. Do not let go of the leash or tie your animal to trees or other objects. An unattended leash not only attracts the attention of coyotes, but is also a tripping hazard to other walkers.

More COMMUNITY NOTICES (SRS) SENIOR RESOURCE SERVICES Is it time to do a wallet audit?

It's possible someday your wallet might be lost or stolen. If stolen, an overstuffed wallet can provide crooks with information and tools that may lead to theft that spreads far beyond the cash your wallet contains. Here are some steps to reduce your risk.

Prune your cash. There is rarely a reason to carry large amounts anymore. Think through your actual cash needs, plus an appropriate cushion of emergency cash and carry just that much. Replenish as needed.

You usually don't need to carry your Medicare card unless you are headed to an appointment with a new doctor. In the wrong hands, your Medicare number may be used for a variety of scams, including filling for false claims and reimbursement.

Copy the front and back of the health cards you have chosen to carry and store the copies at home. If these cards are lost or stolen it will be easier to report the loss and replace the cards if you have the patient number and phone numbers to report the loss.

Never carry a blank check in your wallet. The days when you might need one for a purchase are in the past.

Carry only one credit card and one debit card you wish to use the most. Leave the others at home. Multiple credit cards are a gold mine for criminals, who can easily charge items online or send runners to different stores. As above, copy the front and back of the credit card and the debit card.

Carry your AAA card or other emergency auto service card.

Do not carry a house key in your wallet. Assume crooks will find your address from your wallet contents and quickly show up there before you make it home. Yes, they might figure out a way to talk their way through the gate.

What's left in your wallet? One credit card, one debit card, your driver's license or CA ID, health insurance cards (other than Medicare), AAA card, a modest amount of cash, and not much more!

Of course, if you are cell phone savvy, you can take pictures of your credit cards, Medicare card, passport, etc. But very sure you use a strong lock on your phone.

Accessing Table Tennis using your Villages ID

The Montgomery Multi-Purpose room is accessible during table tennis/ping pong play hours by residents who have met the following requirements: 1) attended a Table Tennis Group membership orientation, and 2) read and signed the release waiver to use this space. If the light does not turn green it could be because:

a) You have not completed both requirements listed above. Please contact the Table Tennis Group to set up a membership orientation; their contact information is available when logged onto the Resident Portal or by calling the Community Resource Center (CRC) in Building B at 408-754-1336. The club will provide a copy of the waiver to you.

b) You have met the requirements previously but moved out of The Villages and have since moved back in. You will need to re-establish your membership in the Table Tennis Group and sign a new release waiver.

c) The microchip in your card has been damaged in some way and your card must be replaced. Please contact the Public Safety Administration office at 408-239-5246, Option 2 for assistance.

'Compassionate Challenge'

I am a city girl and I know very little about sheep or goats, but those that do say that sheep are herd animals depending on and trusting their shepherd while goats are headstrong and disobedient. They are just smart enough to get into trouble!

In Palestine 2000 years ago sheep and goats were part of everyday life. Jesus' using them in his analogy made sense to the people he was addressing. Here in San Jose 2000 years later it doesn't quite fit, but we can relate to good guys and bad guys.

In the Gospel passage this week, Matthew gives us an image of the Last Judgment. There will be two groups of people present, represented by the sheep and goats. Jesus seated on his throne, will, as shepherd and judge separate those who have earned a place in his Kingdom and those who will be banished forever. The sheep will be sent to the right having earned a place in the Kingdom and the goats sent to the left and banished.

It is obvious that both groups that Jesus is addressing are surprised at the criteria presented. The sheep ask a question because they don't remember doing any of the things mentioned by Jesus, yet clearly they must have done some of them.

It seems that Matthew thought that the words of Jesus' proclamation so important that he includes them four times. He wants to get our attention. Listen to these words. They are the key to eternal life and the Kingdom of God.

We are given a challenge! A challenge to think about we treat our brothers and sisters. Do we clothe them, feed them, help them when they are sick, visit them if in prison and do we welcome the stranger we meet? Are we loving and compassionate? Do we help our neighbors even when it is difficult and perhaps not appreciated?

None of the things Jesus says is of a religious nature. There is no mention of observing or breaking Commandments. People are condemned, not for acting immorally, but for not doing anything at all.

For us this is a call to action. When it is time for us to meet

'Giving Thanks'

"Thank you!" What a lovely thing to be able to say—to God, to our friends and family, to those we meet in ordinary life—which become extraordinary encounters through our practice of thanks-giving. And of course, practicing gratitude is baked into our lives as people of faith. Our scriptures are full of reminders to give thanks to God, and the central ritual of liturgical Christians—the Holy Eucharist—actually means "thanksgiving" in the Greek.

As is so often the case, contemporary mental health research echoes what religious people have known for millennia. Gratitude is good for our bodies and minds, as well as our souls. When we express gratitude, our brains release dopamine and serotonin, neurotransmitters that regulate our moods and emotions. These chemicals can help us feel happier, more content, and less stressed. In addition, intentionally giving thanks increases our self-esteem and resilience, and improves sleep. A study by the University of Manchester found that participants who wrote down things they were grateful for before going to bed slept longer and reported better sleep quality than those who did not.

I like to think of this nightly journaling of gratitude as something akin to a harvest feast: that is, gathering up the blessings of the day, savoring them, and returning thanks for them. Something as simple as recording a few sentences of thanks every evening can send us off to sleep feeling fully nourished, so that we wake up with renewed hope for the day to come.

There are few people living today who can recall a one-room school. The closest a one-room classroom could possibly resemble is homeschooling. The teacher would have to instruct several different age groups, giving them her personal attention. The older children would also help the younger students.

In very poor communities the one-room schoolhouse was also used as the meeting place where the church service was held on Sunday Mornings. Over time, small towns developed into communities and schools were built to meet the needs of a growing population. Students would shuffle off to different classrooms at the sound of a bell to be instructed by a different teacher for the fundamentals.

I recall my very early days of school and for several weeks the teachers would call the roll/take attendance. You would answer "present" or "here" with a raised hand, until they learned your name. Then they would assign each student a seat in class, to easily take attendance, and if you caused problems, you would be required to sit in the front. Yes, I once had to sit up front in my sophomore biology class with Miss Wallace. She was short in stature with thick horn-rimmed glasses and squeaky black shoes. In her class you could hear a pin drop; she would give you instructions, only once. Her throne was made of iron and she ruled well! I was never late to her class.

Many of us today have benefited from the discipline that we received from loving parents and inspiring teachers...along life's journey. Some of you have been blessed to have traveled around the world. As people talk about their amazing experiences in life, you may respond by saying, "I've been there!" The memory of that experience left an indelible imprint on your soul with every detail you recall. Whenever you are feeling a little down and reflective in life, you seek to recapture that moment of euphoria and better days.

All the countries and places that we have visited, with all their beauty which captured our hearts,

God face to face, we will be judged by how well we listened and acted on the words of this parable.

How will we answer the question? What did you do for your brother and sister?







Winter Rules—From now until further notice we will be playing Winter Rules defined as 6-inch relief, through the green (incudes the rough), no nearer the hole, pick-clean-and place, no penalty.

Interseeding Schedule continues — We are inter-seeding the fairways with Rye Grass. This practice will require additional irrigation to help the seed germinate. We do this to help create a uniform turf condition in our fairways and to fill in continual bare spots on the fairways.

Fairway Top-Dressing—We are top-dressing the fairways with a layer of sand and then the sand will be dragged in to help it settle into the top layer of the turf. This new practice will in the long term create a more porous top layer of turf to allow for better permeation of water, air and nutrients to the roots. This will ultimately boost the health and consistency of the fairway turf. A Gypsum application will follow top-dressing to aid in turf growth and seed germination.

Winter Weather and Daily Golf Course Conditions – Remember that at this time of year, weather becomes a daily factor and the resultant golf course conditions can affect play. Some things to be aware of are potential frost delays if it's cold, potential cart paths only status if conditions are wet and rainy, and in extreme weather or wind conditions course closure if a storm creates an unsafe atmosphere to play in (rare but not impossible). Please call the Maintenance Hotline at 408-223-4663 each day for an update on golf course conditions. And remember that the flag at the driving range will indicate the golf course status for the day: Green Flag = Open for Play / Yellow Flag = Frost Delay / Red Flag = Carts on Paths Only / Black Flag = Golf & Practice Facilities Closed

Tips from the Pro-Uneven Lies; Ball Below your Feet

If golf courses were perfectly flat the game would be much easier. We wouldn't have to worry about putts breaking, we wouldn't have to worry about elevation changes, and we wouldn't have to worry about those uncomfortable side hill lies. But alas, the reality is that uneven lies are part of the game. One type of uneven lie that gives us post 50-year-old golfers trouble is when the ball is below our feet. Staying down becomes more difficult because the ball is further from your hands. This can occur on Villages holes like Hole #7, Hole #8, Hole #9, Hole #15, Hole #18. When the ball is below your feet, focus on maintaining your spine angle and your knee bend throughout your swing. Many golfers tend to stand up on their back swing in these types of situations which makes it much more difficult for them to return the club to the ball and make solid contact. I try to feel more knee bend, like sitting in a bar stool. Also try to keep your head still...if you head is still, your body is still, and good contact becomes easier to manage. Take 1 more club for use of the longer shaft and swing easy. Play the ball 1-2 inches further back in your stance. If it is a severe downhill lie, aim a bit left and allow for the ball to move right a bit as the downhill lie causes the heel of the club to contact the ground first which opens the clubface. Yes, this is a relatively long checklist of things to do, but once you have mastered these tips, the ball below your feet scenario will be a piece of cake. Let us know if these tips help. 
