

2023/2024 Christmas tree pickup schedule

Christmas tree pickup this year will be on the following days:

- · Wednesday, December 27 and Thursday, December 28
- · Wednesday, January 3 and Thursday, January 4.

Place the tree at curbside no more than 24 hours before pickup day and note the following before putting out your tree:

- 1. All tinsel, ornaments, garland, etc. must be removed.
- 2. All metal/plastic stands or buckets must be removed.
- 3. Wood stands are acceptable.
- 4. Trees should be cut to no longer than 5-foot lengths.

BrightView Landscape will recycle all trees, except those that are flocked. Flocked trees cannot be recycled but will be properly disposed of. If you have any questions, you can call Customer Service at 408-223-4670.

Villages-Wide Biennial Age Certification Survey

State and Federal law requires at least 80% of households at The Villages submit an age certification in order for us to retain status as a 55+ senior community. So far only 75% have done so.

To continue our community's status as a senior community, The Villages must comply with the state and federal laws that govern senior housing developments that mandate both The Villages Association, and also The Villages Homeowners' Corporation must conduct periodic surveys (every other year) to verify and document that the community is in compliance. Failure to satisfy the legal requirements may result in a determination that The Villages is not a lawful senior community and therefore mean that we must allow persons of all ages to live here.

In order to fulfill the requirements imposed upon the corporations, one resident of your condominium or home must complete and sign the Age Certification form (under penalty of perjury). In addition, Please note that if you are an offsite owner, you must have one of the tenant(s)/resident(s) complete and sign the Certification. Offsite owners are responsible for ensuring completion and return of the Certification form by one of their tenant(s)/resident(s).

The deadline to complete and return the Age Certification has been extended to **December 31, 2023**. You may either drop it in the deposit box located in the parking lot just outside of Building A or mail the completed document and any attachments back to us at:

Tax preparer handout available

The SRS Tax Preparer handout has been updated for the coming tax preparation season. The list gives contact information for four Enrolled Agents (EA) and two Certified Public Accountants (CPA).

What is the difference between an EA and a CPA?

An Enrolled Agent is a person who is licensed to represent taxpayers before the IRS after passing three proficiency exams in taxation administered by the IRS. EAs are not required to have a college degree or any other specific business-related education. To maintain their license, they must take 72 hours of continuing education every three years.

A Certified Public Accountant is licensed by individual states after passing four national exams administered by the American Institute of CPAs. In California, five years of college units are required to be able to take the examinations. To maintain their license, they must take 80 hours of continuing education every two years.

Both EAs and CPAs are trained to do a professional job with tax return preparation. In general, many people believe EAs are best for routine tax preparation and miscellaneous tax fillings. CPAs are best for complex advanced tax planning and preparation, especially if the planning and compliance involves related business or trust entities. Choosing one or the other depends on your personal situation.

If you would like the Tax Preparer handout, stop by the SRS office. Or you may call the SRS office at 408-239-5253 and have it emailed to you.

SRS also sponsors an AARP Volunteer Tax-Aide Program site. Free tax preparation will be offered by appointment at Foothill Center on Friday mornings during tax season. Volunteers are Villagers trained and tested according to IRS standards. The coordinator is Alan Waltho, 408-238-3435. The appointment process will be announced in January.

SRS Alert:

2024 estate and gift exemption

The IRS has announced the inflation-indexed exemptions for gifts and estates for 2024. The annual exclusion for gifts will increase to \$18,000 for calendar year 2024, up from \$17,000 in 2023. This means a married couple can each give \$18,000 to an individual for a total of \$36,000

in 2024 and not have to file a gift tax return. Estates of decedents who die during 2024 have an exclusion amount of \$13,610,000, up from \$12,920,000 for estates of decedents who died in 2023.

Unless Congress makes the current law permanent, after 2025 the estate exemption will revert back to the 2017 exemption of \$5.49 million (which will be adjusted for inflation from 2017).

On Thursday, February 1, come with us to the Legion of Honor in San Francisco as it hosts its newest exhibit, Botticelli Drawings. We will depart from Cribari East Parking Lot at 8:30 a.m. with an estimated return time of 3 p.m.

Botticelli Drawings is the first exhibition ever dedicated to the drawings of Renaissance artist Sandro Botticelli (ca. 1445 1510). The exhibition traces his artistic journey, from studying under maestro Fra Filippo Lippi (c. 1406 – 1469) to leading his own workshop in Florence. Featuring rarely seen and newly attributed works, the exhibition provides insight into his design practice and offers an intimate look into the making of some of his most memorable masterpieces, including Adoration of the Magi (c. 1500), which will be reunited with its preparatory drawing, surviving only in fragments.







"The Wager: A Tale of Shipwreck, Mutiny and Murder" by David Grann. On January 28, 1742, a ramshackle vessel of patched-together wood and cloth washed up on the coast of Brazil. Inside were thirty emaciated men, barely alive. They were survivors of His Majesty's Ship the Wager, a British vessel that had left England in 1740 on a secret mission during an imperial war with Spain. While the Wager chased a Spanish treasure-filled galleon known as "the prize of all the oceans," it wrecked on a desolate island off the coast of Patagonia. After being marooned for months and facing starvation, they built the flimsy craft and sailed for more than a hundred days, traversing nearly 3,000 miles of storm-wracked seas. They were greeted as heroes. But six months later, another, even more decrepit craft landed on the coast of Chile. This boat contained just three castaways, and they told a very different story. The 30 sailors who landed in Brazil were not heroes—they were mutineers. The first group responded with countercharges of their own, of a tyrannical and murderous senior officer and his henchmen. It became clear that while stranded on the island the crew had fallen into anarchy, with warring factions fighting for dominion over the barren wilderness. As accusations of murder flew, the Admiralty convened a court martial to determine who was telling the truth. The stakes were life-and-death—for whomever the court found guilty could hang. "The Paris Daughter" by Kristin Harmel. Paris, 1939: Young mothers Elise and Juliette become fast friends the day they meet in the beautiful Bois de Boulogne. Though there is a shadow of war creeping across Europe, neither woman suspects that their lives are about to irrevocably change. When Elise becomes a target of the German occupation, she entrusts Juliette with the most precious thing in her life-her young daughter, playmate to Juliette's own little girl. But nowhere is safe in war, not even a quiet little bookshop like Juliette's Librairie des Rêves, and, when a bomb falls on their neighborhood, Juliette's world is destroyed along with it. More than a year later, with the war finally ending, Elise returns to reunite with her daughter, only to find her friend's bookstore reduced to rubble—and Juliette nowhere to be found. What happened to her daughter in those last, terrible moments? Juliette has seemingly vanished without a trace, taking all the answers with her. Elise's desperate search leads her to New York—and to Juliette—one final, fateful time. Fiction, 2023.



Pickleball Rules of Etiquette

Remember when you were told as a child to have good manners like to always say "Please" and "Thank you"? Well, guess

what? Pickleball has rules of Etiquette that our many new members may not be aware of...and we do get complaints at times of rudeness on the courts. So here are a few of our Rules of Etiquette:

Don't give players a lesson on the court, unless they ask you... and don't criticize. Everyone wants everyone else to improve their game. That's a good thing. But be careful not to cross the line by giving lessons, because many are there just for fun and maybe aren't even concerned about improving.

Don't be a hothead. Maintain composure during victory and defeat. Stay calm and be sportsmanlike.

Please, no angry outbursts or loud cursing. Swearing and intimidating behavior makes everyone else uncomfortable.

Don't be a sore loser. We all like to win, but when you lose, do so graciously. Avoid confrontations and arguments. Respectful communication is the key to resolving disputes.

When playing for fun, don't poach (hit a ball intended for your partner).

Don't hit lobs to restricted people. If they walk slowly, was that intentional lob really worth the free point?

Don't avoid hitting to strong players just to win. They want to play, too. Allow your partner their fair share of play.

It can be tempting to hit lobs to players looking directly into the early morning or late afternoon sun, but it is polite not to.

Call out the score loudly.

At the end of the game, meet at the net for the PB high five with your paddles.

Try to be punctual and to turn off your phone ringer during play. Most important rule of Pickleball at The Villages: have fun!

Three New USGA/NCGA World Handicap System Updates Effective January 2024

- 1. The first change is regarding short golf courses. Any 9-Hole course measuring 750 yards or more will be eligible for an official Course Rating & Slope Rating. So our Par-3 Course qualifies and will be assigned an official Course Rating and Slope Rating and will be part of the player handicap matrix going forward. This means that anyone who plays the Par-3 Course will have to officially post their score and that score will be included in their handicap allocation.
- 2. The second change is that 9-Hole Scores will now count as an official score and will immediately be used as part of your handicap calculation. There will be no more combining of 9-hole scores to form and 18-hole score for handicap purposes, the 9-hole score will stand alone as an official score.
- 3. The last change is for incomplete rounds Anyone who plays 10-17 holes and does not finish a complete 18-hole round will be required to post their hole-by-hole scores for each hole played and the un-played holes will be assigned a Score Differential automatically to formulate an 18-hole score for posting and handicap purposes.

Some things to be aware of are potential frost delays if it's cold, potential cart paths only status if conditions are wet and rainy, and in extreme weather or wind conditions course closure if a storm creates an unsafe atmosphere to play in (rare but not impossible). Please call the Maintenance Hotline at 408.223.4663 each day for an update on golf course conditions. And remember that the flag at the driving range will indicate the golf course status for the day: Green Flag = Open for Play / Yellow Flag = Frost Delay / Red Flag = Carts on Paths Only / Black Flag = Golf & Practice Facilities Closed

Tips from the Pro — The Slice...How to save face

The dreaded **slice**. It starts out OK but takes a right turn in midair and flies headlong into

whatever trouble is lurking down the right side, usually a lake or a grove of trees. A slice happens when the clubface at impact is open to the path of the swing. The slice is more about the open clubface than it is about improper path. You can use your wristwatch to eliminate a slice. If you're wearing a watch on your left wrist (right wrist for left-handers), you have the key to squaring the clubface. On the downswing, as your club is approaching the ball, focus on rolling your watch face over or counterclockwise so it's pointing to the ground in the follow-through. Tiger calls this "left knuckles down"... This will get you to rotate your forearms and close the face enough before impact to beat that banana ball slice. Let us know if these tips help. 

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

James Stratton Campbell

James (Jim) Stratton Campbell, 86, passed away on June 7, 2023, due to natural causes. He was an intelligent, well-educated, academic with a sharp wit and a penchant for wry humor. Jim was equally comfortable in his home office writing, reading, and editing documentation of all sorts as he was socializing with friends, neighbors, and relatives. As a caring father, husband, and grandfather, he loved his family, his Giants, his 49ers, and his highly frustrating yet entertaining golf game about which he often mused how confusing it was to him to be so mediocre at something he played for so long.

Jim was born to Joseph and Gladys Campbell in Oakland, California, on April 11, 1939. His family moved to Kansas City when he was ten years old, and he fully enjoyed his mid-west second-

ary education, his diligent work becoming an Eagle Scout, and his love of Chevrolet automobiles in the mid-'50s.

He attended Stanford University and graduated in 1958 with an English degree. Jim married his college sweetheart, Valerie Thias, and then spent two years on active duty as a US Army Signal Corps officer stationed at Fort Huachuca, Arizona, where his first son, Bruce William, was born. He returned to Stanford after his service for a Masters in Mass Communications and his second son, Scott David was born in 1963. The family settled in Sunnyvale where he worked in Technical Publications for Sylvania and spent considerable time in leadership positions with the Cub Scouts and Little League with his boys.


He dabbled in the arts in several ways. He was a DJ at country radio station KCKN, a studio feature producer at KNTV 11 in San Jose, and even an actor and director in amateur theater (then and recently). Jim also became a documentary producer and was also principal cellist for several local orchestras and toured Europe with one of them. Later in life, he won writing awards for published travel articles.

Jim's career in Technical Publications continued with roles at GTE Sylvania, Beckman Instruments, and Atari. He watched with pride as his sons graduated college and developed careers and families of their own.

Hope Sturman Campbell, 83, passed away on July 13, 2023, after a lengthy illness. A two-time breast cancer survivor, Hope never stopped making her positive mental attitude a way of life. She was crazy about her grandkids and family and always had the house full of photos and mementos of her relatives in California and in Utah. She participated in several clubs and groups at the Villages, learned and loved to play golf, and never missed an opportunity to lead, organize and assist those with which she was involved. There was hardly a charity Hope didn't give to in her final years which involved animals, Native Americans, the under-privileged, liberal-minded organizations, and others in need.

Hope was born in Rock Springs, Wyoming on October, 22, 1939. She was literally a coal miner's daughter, living in Stansbury, Wyo-

ming, until the family moved to Provo, Utah, in her early teens and ultimately settled in Provo's sister city, Orem. Today it's hard to find a single remnant of Stansbury, Wyoming.

She excelled in school, and was a talented musician and vocalist. She and her sister, Diana, sang at various engagements when she was only 7 or 8 and once won a talent contest and sang live on the radio. She played percussion in her high school band, and learned how to play guitar as well. She graduated from Orem High School in 1957 and moved to Salt Lake City to attend business school.

In 1963, Hope left Utah and moved to Mountain View, California, where she worked as a typist at Sylvania. She married her first husband, Stu Neisner. Following the merger of Sylvania with GTE, she worked her way up the ladder and became a technical writer and editor, and later a Technical Publications Manager overseeing proposals for multi-million-dollar government defense contracts. While at GTE, she met her true love, James Campbell. They were married in 1977 and Hope was immediately a step-mother to two teenagers (Bruce and Scott, Jim's sons). The boys visited Jim and Hope during the summer months each year.

In addition to her step-mom duties, Hope stayed in close touch with her Utah clan. Family members visited each other frequently. 
