

Dive into the spirituality of Indian Classical Dance





As you know, The Villages Association is a common interest development (CID) subject to California Civil Code Sections 4000-6150 (also known as the Davis-Stirling Act). Civil Code Section 4041(a) requires all CID owners to annually and in writing provide the HOA

(The Villages Association), their contact information for sending HOA notices, and to inform the association whether the residence is owner-occupied or rented.

Associations are required to solicit these notices at least 30 days prior to the annual association disclosures. For The Villages Association, that is the Annual Budget Report and Annual Policy Statement that is distributed in May. If an owner does not annually provide this notification, the association must deem the last address provided in writing by the owner, or if none, the property address, shall be deemed to be the address to which notices are delivered.

To inform the Association of changes to preferred delivery method for receiving notices from the Association, please complete the form below and

return it to the Association no later than Friday, May 10, 2024. Completing this form will not discontinue electronic distribution of Association documents if you have signed up for that program.



Withholding tax from your SS benefits

Some Villagers have complained they owe taxes on their 2023 return because more of their Social Security was taxable.

Beginning in 1984, if your total income is more than \$25,000 (Single) or \$32,000 (Joint), part of your SS benefits will be taxable. The most that will be taxed is 85 percent. This threshold of \$25,000 or \$32,000 is set by law and has not changed since 1984. Unlike many tax statutes, it is not inflation indexed.

Income for this law is defined as your adjusted gross income, nontaxable interest, and half of your SS benefits. Because of inflation, more taxpayers are having the full 85 percent of SS taxed.

Perhaps you are relying on withholding, from say a pension or an IRA distribution, to cover your annual income taxes. If you are still short when you file, having taxes withheld from SS benefits can help you avoid a surprise when the next tax season arrives.

To have withholding from your SS payment, complete **IRS Form W-4V**, Voluntary Withholding Request, and submit it by mail to your local SS office at 6140 Cottle Road, San Jose, CA 95123. The form is available at www.irs.gov. Or stop by the SRS office if you would like the form printed for you. You can choose a withholding rate of 7%, 10%, 12%, or 22%.

You can change the percentage or stop withholding by completing and submitting a new W-4V. If you do not want to withhold from your monthly SS benefit, you can make quarterly estimated tax payments to the IRS using Form 1040ES. When paying estimated taxes, you usually make four equal payments and follow the payment schedule on the tax forms.

Good news, California does not tax SS benefits.

The SRS office is in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253 or e-mail SRS at villagessrs@ sbcglobal.net. The website is the villagesgcc.com/srs. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional advisor about your individual situation.

SRS Reminder:

Estimated tax due April 15

We are sure you will remember your tax returns are due Monday, April 15, but don't forget that if you file forms 1040ES and 540ES, the first payment for your 2024 estimated tax is also due April 15. Yes, we agree, it is unfair that you might have two IRS and two FTB payments due the same day.

Rather than mailing a check to the IRS, SRS suggests you use the online Direct Pay Service. Go to www.irs.gov and click on the box labeled "Make a Payment" and then "Pay now with Direct Pay." There is no fee to use the online Direct Pay Service and you select the day you wish your bank account to be debited.

There is also no fee to use the online Web Pay service to pay your Franchise Tax Board California tax. Go to www.ftb.CA.gov and click on "Make a Payment" and then "Bank Account."

Often, the imposters looked and sounded so convincing that it was difficult to tell who was telling the truth. Prize money was awarded to the contestant receiving the most votes. It was a very popular game show that taught viewers not to believe first impressions but to ask the right questions.

These days, individuals are lauded and rewarded for their ability to be deceptive in avoiding the consequences of their actions. On the other hand, God requires us to be truthful and not deceptive because Satan is the father of deception. Millions of lives have been lost forever because of deception.

Sometimes, you may be in a dilemma, wondering if you should tell the truth. You should ask yourself: Will God bless me by being deceitful? Will the Lord who loves the truth bless my kind deeds to withhold the truth because it may hurt? Ask yourself prayerfully, "What would Jesus do?" Just think: If we lived in a world where truth was spoken and received, would there be less corruption?

The sad reality is that every child born is prone to lying and deceiving because of the thought of unfavorable actions by those in authority. If the consequences of being deceptive and lying prohibit a person from going to Heaven, pray tell... then let us always speak the truth in love! It may hurt a person's pride at first, but in the long term, it will be their saving grace from greater devastation. There are times your silence can be golden.

'Things Seen and Unseen'

The victorious season of Easter begins in mystery—with an unexpectedly empty tomb, comes into focus in various accounts of the resurrected Jesus, and ends with Jesus ascending to heaven. The unseen Lord is seen, only to return again to the unseeable state wherein Christians (mostly) encounter him, even now. What gives with this annual game of post-Easter hide and seek?

Then again, our Jewish antecedents (including Jesus himself) have known about this all along. When the prophet Elijah was on the run, God came to him not in the cataclysms of wind or earthquake or fire, but in the sound of sheer silence (1 Kings 19:11-13). And with just this kind of small revelation of God's presence (sometimes called a theophany) the prophets and their followers did courageous things. What small revelation of God might you have experienced recently? How did it encourage you, or set you on a new path?

Hide and seek may be a peculiar metaphor for God's appearing, but it's not entirely wrong. I don't think that God is actually ever hiding from us (after all, every sunrise is a cause to remember our creator), but it is our job to keep seeking God. The more we seek, the more of God we will find. In the sunrises, yes, but also in the shady places of shame and loss. Easter reminds us that God came to dwell among the least, the last and the lost... and teaches that God doesn't give up on them, or on us.



Tips from the Pro-Experimentation Leads to Results

Unlike other sports, golfers often practice on driving ranges and practice greens that are different from courses. This creates a gap. So, it's crucial to experiment in practice. For example, try hitting low shots with a 4-iron or chipping from deep rough. This boosts your adaptability. Skilled golfers overcome on-course challenges. So, embracing experimentation can significantly improve your game. Get creative in practice to better handle real-game situations. Strategies for Practice:

- Low Punches: With a 4-iron, simulate escaping from beneath tree branches.
- Hooks and Slices: Use a 6-iron to practice curving shots around obstacles.
- · High Shots: Use a 9-iron to practice clearing obstructions.
- Rough Recovery: Practice chipping from the deepest rough near the green.
- Bunker Challenges: Learn to escape bunkers by practicing shots from steep angles.
- Single Ball Putting: Focus on precision by putting with only one ball. Adapting techniques for difficult situations, learned through experimentation, is invaluable. Golf's practice conditions don't replicate the course. But, this creative approach bridges the gap and improves on-course performance.
