Association/Homeowners documents available via email

Per an amendment to California Civil Code, homeowner associations are permitted, with owner's written consent, to distribute annual disclosures, (like the pro forma budget summary) and other specified association documents to owners via electronic mail, facsimile, or other electronic means (such as posting on the association's website) instead of sending those documents out by regular mail or personal delivery. This has the potential to provide cost savings to The Villages. Delivery and postage costs for the Villages' annual distribution of the pro forma budget summary alone are close to \$1,000, not to mention the paper and printing costs.

In order to transmit association documents via e-mail or by posting on the homeowners association's website, 1) the homeowners association must first receive the owner's written consent, and 2) the homeowners association sends a separate notice to the owner that the documents have been posted and are available for viewing.

Consent forms for owners to request delivery of documents have been developed for both The Villages Association and Homeowners Corporations. These forms provide an owner's consent to electronic delivery of documents that are capable, under current laws, of being distributed electronically. Owners have the right to revoke this request and receive "hard copies" of the documents by sending a written revocation signed by the owner, to the applicable corporation.

THE GENERAL MANAGER'S CORNER

Revisiting the Future of Capital Funding at The Villages

Dear Villagers,

The Club Board of Directors (CBOD) faces the challenge of "Planning for the Future" to modernize and improve our facilities. There is, however, a policy gap we must bridge. The Capital Fund balance is limited to \$1.2 million, restrained by the conservative growth tied to a national inflation index. This 18-year-old constraint no longer serves our growing needs, the sum is insufficient for the improvements The Villages needs.

In 2006, the amended bylaws included Section 8.3.4 Annual Contributions to Capital Improvement Fund, which limited and capped annual contributions to, and maximum balance of, the Capital Improvement Fund. The Villages must now manage the financial burden to prepare for the refurbishment of our aging facilities and amenities and replacing the aged underground infrastructure that supports our operations. By updating the Club bylaws and policies this year we will provide the Club Board with the ability to construct strategic plans for our future.



Regrettably, there was not the foresight to implement a savings plan or create a capital replacement fund, essential for financing these now costly updates. To address the community's needs, the Club Board of

Directors is considering a dependable funding mechanism that will minimize the financial impact on current residents.

A potential solution is the introduction of a "membership initiation fee" for new owners. This fee would serve to fairly distribute the cost of existing and future facilities and amenities among new and future residents. As your General Manager, I share the Club Board's vision of the Villages and I carry the responsibility to nurture that growth.

To implement these changes and ensure a sustainable future for The Villages, CBOD will seek member approval for new fiscal strategies, moving beyond the limitations of the past and toward a vibrant, well-funded community. Together, I believe we can build a bright future and increase the value of our homes.

'Dear IRS: Where is my refund?'

Recent improvements to "Where's My Refund?" on IRS.gov now provide you with more information and remains the best way to check the status of your refund. You will find this tool on the home page under the "Get Your Refund Status" tab.

The "Where's My Refund?" tool provides taxpayers with three key pieces of information: IRS confirmation of receiving your tax return, approval of your tax refund, and the issuing date of the approved tax refund.

During this busy part of filing season, millions of taxpayers are anticipating refunds. The IRS website can help taxpayers quickly get the information they need without calling the IRS.

According to the IRS, "Where's My Refund?" enhancements include: 1) Messages with detailed refund status in plain language. 2) Seamless access on mobile devices and with the IRS2Go app. 3) Notifications indicating whether the IRS needs additional information.

To use "Where's My Refund?", taxpayers must enter their SS number, filing status and the exact whole dollar amount of their expected refund from the original 2023 tax return.

Once the IRS acknowledges receipt of a return, refund status information is typically available within 24 hours after receipt of a taxpayer's e-filed 2023 return or four weeks after mailing a paper return.

Taxpayers should note that the IRS updates the refund tool once a day, usually overnight, so there's no need to check more often. The IRS reminds taxpayers that the fastest way to get a refund is by filing electronically and using direct deposit.

Many different factors may affect the timing of refund delivery. Most frequently if there is a delay the tax return has obvious errors, requires additional review or is incomplete.

The IRS will contact taxpayers by mail if more information is needed to process a return. IRS phone and walk-in representatives can only research the status of a refund if: 1) 21 days or more have passed since a return was filed electronically, 2) six weeks or more have passed since a return was mailed, or 3) "Where's My Refund?" tells the taxpayer to contact the IRS.

The California Franchise Tax Board has a similar program. Go to www.ftb.ca.gov. On the Home page use the tab "Check Your Refund Status" and then "Where's My Refund?" California wants to know your Social Security number, the numbers in your mail address, your zip code and the exact amount of the tax refund claimed on your State return. California's estimate for electronically filed returns is 21 days like the IRS. However, for mailed returns be patient for up to three months.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253 or e-mail SRS at villagessrs@ sbcglobal.net. The web site is www.thevillagesgcc.com/srs. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional advisor about your individual situation.

SRS Reminder:

IRA contributions at any age

Before you file your tax returns, remember a taxpayer may make an IRA contribution at any age. Of course, contributions are limited to the lesser of your earned income or the contribution limits to qualified plans.

A taxpayer who files a joint return can contribute to an IRA even if they don't have earned income as long as their spouse has sufficient earned income.


Sign up for Intermediate Watercolor

Today at this writing, there are still only 15 active listings and now 12 pending sales. The market has been pretty steady-eddy now. 
Villager Bill DeVincenzi appointed to city and county environmental commissions

'Martyrium'

This Sunday, you'll find people dressed in the red color of martyrdom, parading around in public waving palms. You might recognize it as the traditional Procession of the Palms, dramatizing Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem in the final days before his crucifixion. It was a poignant moment of triumph,

obviously, as his temporal "kingship" was brief. But it was a necessary stepscripturally-speaking-on his way to an eternal sovereignty.

That was more than two millennia ago. But less than 50 years ago, another faithful man lived a brief moment of (ecclesial) power before entering into the eternity in which we remember him. Oscar Romero,

a saint of both the Roman Catholic and Episcopal Church, did not set out to be a martyr for human rights. By all accounts his theology was conservative, focused on interior conversion. But the violent reality of the Salvadoran Civil War, within which he ministered a priest, bishop and archbishop, changed his mind. He spoke out against the death squads, making him a hero of the people and a target of the government. He was shot while celebrating Mass in San Salvador on March 24, 1980. In 2010, the United Nations General Assembly proclaimed 24 March as the "International Day for the Right to the Truth Concerning Gross Human Rights Violations and for the Dignity of Victims" in recognition of Romero's role in defense of human rights. Romero's assailant—never identified or prosecuted—arrived and departed in a car painted red.

A retired Tennis club owner/operator as well as a court builder, he was well aware of this strange and rapidly growing game called pickleball. Don applied his knowledge and experience to convince The Villages the value of pickleball as well as the importance of dedicated and properly designed courts in an active senior community. Of course, as with

anything, courts cost money so Don initiated and championed serious fundraising. This took tireless phone calls, much research, many meetings and hordes of emails. Based on his research, Don assessed: the number of courts recommended for a community of our size, the best surface for the courts, available contractors and potential cost. When the Villages Club Board of Directors (CBOD) was willing to listen. Don was ready with all the necessary information to demonstrate that this small but passionate group of "Pickleballers" were serious and ready to "rumble."

In August 2015 Don worked to start a program accepting pledges for dedicated pickleball courts through the Evergreen Villages Foundation (EVF). He helped convince EVF to match pledges up to \$25,000. Don also proposed selling engraved bricks as a way of raising money for the courts.

Once the CBOD gave the nod for a proposal, Don became a member of the research study team to build dedicated courts. Now the question became where should these courts be built, and many said "not in my backyard" for fear of noise pollution. Creating a small team, they evaluated proposed sites throughout The Villages and presented them to the community.

According to Garry Gray, Don served as a team catalyst, enhancing the team's performance. He is passionate about getting the job done, and that passion is infectious. He managed to infect this writer with his suggestion that "it may be time for a long range pickleball planning committee." Anyone up for the challenge?

A man of courage in many ways, he is always looking for ways to help. Don is yet another individual that demonstrates the importance of contributing and volunteering to create a better life for all in The Villages. When you see Don walking around, remember to shake his hand, give him a hug and say "Thank you."

Tips from the Pro—Here today...Gone tomorrow

I had a member ask me other day, "Scott, why do I hit it great one day, and the very next day I cannot hit the broad side of a barn?" Well, we all know the only consistency in golf is that it is inherently inconsistent. What I told him was that from my experience, the swing "template" for anyone does not change from day to day. What tends to change is the person's tempo and grip pressure. The small muscles can either be passive or aggressive and this is the biggest variable. So if you find yourself struggling with feel and balance; relax your grip pressure and waggle the club a bit to enhance your feel; and make sure your tempo is smooth, especially the first 2 feet of the backswing just off the ball. A good tempo tip is to visualize a syrupy swing like Freddy Couples, Ernie Els, Louis Oosthuizen or Lydia Ko and try to mimic that tempo. THE VILLAGES ASSOCIATION ELECTIONS RULES

ARTICLE 3: Candidates for the Board and Nomination Procedures

3.1 Qualification of Candidates.

Candidates for the Board must be Members at the time of their nomination and (i) must meet any other qualifications or restrictions set forth in these Election Rules and (ii) must meet any other qualifications or restrictions set forth in the Bylaws so long as they do not conflict with these Election Rules. In the case of a Member that is not a natural person (such as a corporation or other entity), the entity Member shall have the power to appoint a natural person as the "Member" for purposes of director elections. The Association shall disqualify a nominee for the Board for any of the following reasons:

- 3.1.1 The nominee is not a Member.
- $3.1.2\ {
 m The\ nominee}\ does\ not\ reside\ within\ {
 m The\ Villages\ condominium\ project.}$
- 3.1.3 If the nominee, if elected, would be serving on the Board at the same time as serving on the Board of The Villages Golf and Country Club.
- 3.1.4 If the nominee, if elected, would be serving on the Board at the same time as another owner of the same separate interest and the other person is either properly nominated for the current election or is an incumbent director.
- 3.1.5 If the nominee, at the time of nomination, is delinquent in the payment of regular and/or special assessments. A nominee shall not be considered "delinquent" if the delinquency relates to the payment of fines, fines renamed as assessments, collection charges, late charges, or costs levied by a third party and/or if the nominee: (a) has paid the regular or special assessment under protest; (b) has entered into a payment plan for repayment of the delinquent assessments and is not delinquent in payments due under the plan; or (c) the nominee has requested and has not been provide an opportunity to engage in internal dispute resolution.
 - 3.1.6 If the nominee has been a member of the Association for less than one year.
- 3.1.7 If the nominee discloses, or if the Association is aware or becomes aware of, a past criminal conviction that would, if the Member was elected, either prevent the Association from purchasing the fidelity bond coverage required by Civil Code section 5806 or terminate the Association's existing fidelity bond coverage.

3.2 Nominations.

3.2.1 Solicitation of Candidates. At least thirty (30) days before the deadline for submitting a nomination, the Association shall provide general notice of the procedure and deadline for submitting a nomination for the Board. Any Member who satisfies the qualifications and is not otherwise prohibited from running for the Board may place their name in nomination for the Board by submitting the nomination before the published deadline for receiving nominations. In addition, the Board may recruit qualified candidates and/or may appoint a nominating committee to nominate qualified candidates.

3.2.2 No Write-Ins. No "write-in" candidates shall be permitted on the ballots in the election of directors.

If the food isn't found, the animal can become agitated and aggressively approach the person standing nearby. If we get hurt, it's possible that the animal will be put down. Two, food that's not part of their natural diet can cause illnesses, even death. As much as we're tempted, it's best to let our fury and feathered friends fend for themselves.

For these reasons (to name two), our **Club Rule 1.51.4** states: "Feeding of waterfowl and other wild animals on a routine basis is prohibited for the protection of both residents and the animals.' Thank you for helping keep our wonderful ecosystem healthy and thriving—naturally!

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


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
