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New Bocce Court Groundbreaking Ceremony takes place

Last Friday afternoon, January 5, the Bocce Club hosted a groundbreaking ceremony in anticipation of The Villages new third Bocce court coming in 2024. Club president, Jana King was joined front stage by Club Board Vice President, Judy Owen, and Assistant General Manager-Public Works, Ryan Bell. Three community teams, three shovels and three commemorative etches in the ground bring the much-anticipated court closer to reality. Almost 100 attended the groundbreaking, with many staying afterward to enjoy complimentary hot cider, coffee, and refreshments.

An Opportunity to Donate

The event offered residents an opportunity to donate to our Evergreen Villages Foundation (EVF) — partnering with the Club to raise extra funds for additional Bocce accoutrements. Under Reserve and Capital funds, the Club Board has approved approximately \$300K for Bocce essentials, with Gazebo Park enhancements planned for approval at CBOD's February and May 2024 scheduled meetings. Donations in check form will continue to be accepted by EVF. EVF is a tax-exempt, 501(c)(3) non-profit, charitable organization which means donations may qualify as charitable contributions (please check with your tax planner/adviser). Notice of Proposed Revisions to New Association Architectural Committee (AC) Rule D-32 Area Projects in Common Area

At the October 31, 2023, board meeting, the Association Board approved new AC Rule D-32 Area Projects in Common Areas and to publish proposed new rule for the required member comment prior to formal approval consideration at the January 30, 2023 board meeting.

The purpose of the proposed rule is to provide a process for the request of Area Projects that do not fall under existing Association Architectural Committee (AC) rules which are to be constructed or installed on Association Common Areas and are not in conflict with Association Rules.

The proposed new rule was published in the November 16, and 23 editions of *The Villager*, and at the December 12, 2023, board meeting the board approved the following revisions with added text <u>underlined</u> and deleted text shown with strike-through text.

AC Rules

D-32 Common Area Projects

Projects proposed for construction or installation in Association Common Areas that do not align with the existing guidelines set by the Association's Architectural Committee (AC) must receive approval from both the AC and the Association Board of Directors (ABOD). These projects are unique in nature, and their review by the AC and ABOD is essential to ensure they align with the orderly maintenance, preservation, and enjoyment of Common Areas and do not jeopardize the health, safety, convenience, or welfare of all residents (Villagers).

Application Procedure:

A. Project Request Submission

1. Start by submitting a Project Requirements Form to the AC. This document should include the following details: project description and purpose, project location, any necessary alterations to common areas, potential impacts on existing common area elements (like trees, landscaping, hardscape), possible effects on surrounding Villas, and any other relevant information.

B. AC Meeting Attendance

1. Attend the regular monthly AC meeting to review the Project Requirements Form and receive feedback from the AC. If the project is substantial, the AC will provide a list of specific items required for the formal Project Application package.

C. Common Area Alteration Agreement

1. Prepare an Owner a Common Area Alteration Request Form VAgreement and reference the Project Requirements Form, signed by the applicant(s). Include comprehensive plans and specifications. All applicants must be Association members residing in the affected District(s). In some cases, a District Advisory Committee (DAC) may also apply. Plans should be drawn to scale on substantial paper, providing clarity regarding the project's location, nature, extent of work, and maintenance responsibilities. Ensure that the project adheres to this rule's requirements.

D. Document Submission

1. Submit all necessary documents, including estimated costs, to the AC by the monthly submittal deadline, as published in The Villager.

E. Approval Process

1. The AC will determine a renewal period (a renewal period defined herein is for all approved D-32 projects.) The AC will determine specific timeframes in a calendar year, which a project's stakeholders evaluate its progress, conditions, modifications and overall success to determine whether to continue or renew the project for another phase or iteration. D-32 approved projects may have a defined lifespan or specific deliverables to correct underperforming standards, and after each period, project compliance will be reviewed by staff. Upon AC approval, with possible conditions, the maintenance and landscape departments must also review and approve the project.

F. ABOD Approval and Member Advisory Vote

1. Following AC and staff approval, the proposal will be presented to the Association Board of Directors (ABOD). If <u>provisionally</u> approved by the ABOD, a confidential member advisory (non-binding) vote will be conducted by the Association Inspectors of Elections. Ballots will be distributed to all members in the affected District(s). These ballots will be color-coded to distinguish between members within 100 feet of or having a line of sight with the project and other members. The results will be counted and reported at the next regular ABOD meeting by the Inspectors of Elections. Owner comments and the outcome of the advisory vote will be carefully considered by the ABOD when deciding whether to approve grant final approval of the project.

G. Ongoing Monitoring

1. After approval and project construction, the staff will continue to monitor the project at the end of each renewal period to ensure compliance with initial requirements and any new safety or building code requirements in effect. The Villages Staff will provide quarterly reports on the projects status and make recommendations to the AC as to the current conditions. If the project is not in compliance, the AC may recommend remediation or removal to the ABOD.

Response to the proposed new rule may be made by one or more of the following methods: 1) Participation in the discussion of the proposed new rule at the Association Board of Directors at the January 30, 2023, board meetings, or 2) via written comments delivered to the Board through Liz Ramos in the General Manager's office at LRamos@the-villages.com.

Association/Homeowners documents available via e-mail

Per an amendment to California Civil Code, homeowner associations are permitted, with owner's written consent, to distribute annual disclosures, (like the pro forma budget summary) and other specified association documents to owners via electronic mail, facsimile, or other electronic means (such as posting on the association's website) instead of sending those documents out by regular mail or personal delivery. This has the potential to provide cost savings to The Villages. Delivery and postage costs for the Villages' annual distribution of the pro forma budget summary alone are close to \$1,000, not to mention the paper and printing costs.

In order to transmit association documents via e-mail or by posting on the homeowners association's website, 1) the homeowners association must first receive the owner's written consent, and 2) the homeowners association sends a separate notice to the owner that the documents have been posted and are available for viewing.

Consent forms for owners to request delivery of documents have been developed for both The Villages Association and Homeowners Corporations. These forms provide an owner's consent to electronic delivery of documents that are capable, under current laws, of being distributed electronically. Owners have the right to revoke this request and receive "hard copies" of the documents by sending a written revocation signed by the owner, to the applicable corporation.

Forms of owner's written consent are available in Business Administration Buildings A and B, and on The Villages web site, http://www.thevillagesgcc.com (Click on Resident Info and then Click on Resource Files.)

Tax appointments for 2023 tax returns

To make an appointment call the Evergreen Community Center at 408-270-2220.

Your appointment will be on a **Friday morning starting February 2** at Foothill Center. Appointments will be at Foothill except February 16 and March 15 will be at Vineyard Center. Appointments made for 9, 10 and 11 a.m. will be for "in person" completion of the tax return. Appointments made for 12-noon will be for "drop off" only, with the completed returns to be picked up the following week.

When you arrive for your appointment, a volunteer will review your documents and help you complete a check-in form, which you will sign. A tax counselor will then complete your returns and a second counselor will conduct a quality review before the returns are printed. A volunteer will give you your completed returns and, if you approve them, you will sign giving us permission to electronically file your returns.

Remember to bring your photo ID and all pertinent tax papers i.e., forms 1099, 1098, W-2, social security income statements, and medical, charitable donations, and other itemized deduction information as well as your 2022 tax returns.

Please note it is the intent of AARP and the IRS to assist seniors and people with basic returns. Villagers with high income or complex returns are encouraged to use a professional service rather than take an appointment which could be used by seniors on lower income. This IRS sponsored program does not allow us to prepare returns with complex sole proprietorships, rentals with depreciation, or returns with alternative minimum tax.

If you are not sure whether your return is classified as complex, call Alan at 408-238-3435. SRS has a list of paid tax preparers. Stop by the SRS office or call for the list to be e-mailed to you.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253 or e-mail SRS at villagessrs@ sbcglobal.net. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional advisor about your individual situation.

If you file forms 1040ES and 540ES, the fourth payment for tax year 2023 estimated tax is due Tuesday, January 16.

Rather than mailing a check to the IRS, you may use the online Direct Pay Service. Go to www. irs.gov and click on the box labeled "Make a Payment." There is no fee to use the online Direct Pay service.

There is also no fee to use the online Web Pay service to pay your Franchise Tax Board California tax. Go to www.ftb.ca.gov. At the top of the screen click on the "Pay" button.

You may also pay your taxes with a credit or debit card. There will be a fee. And of course, you may always pay your tax with a paper check. Just be sure your envelope is postmarked by January 16.

Warning: If you should make estimated tax payments but fail to do so, you will be charged interest on the underpayment. Beginning October 1, 2023, the interest rate changed from 3 percent to 8 percent. In 2022, the IRS assessed more than \$1.8 billion in penalties for under-paying estimated taxes.

Garage doors: Know how to roll 'em

It's the rainy season. The power goes off in your home. You've signed up for the Villages Alert System (NIXLE) and you are advised to evacuate, or you simply must leave your house. But your car is in the garage and without power, the garage door will not open. What do you do? Open it manually. Here's how.

Step 1: Unplug the garage door opener. It may seem unnecessary, but if the power comes on while the garage door is disengaged, it can damage the assembly. To avoid the potential for this

to happen, simply unplug it.

Step 2: Pull the emergency release cord. This cord hangs down from the garage track and has a red handle. Pull straight down until you hear a click.

Step 3: Lift the garage door. Most have a handle inside the door to assist with this task, but if yours does not, lift from the bottom of the door, using your legs instead of your back. If the garage door springs are in good condition, it should roll up easily. If you are unable to lift it, find someone who can help you.

Step 4: Pull the garage door down to close it. Not mandatory, but a good idea. However, the weight of the door will increase as it lowers, so maintain your grip as it lowers.

Step 5: Reconnect the garage door opener when power is restored.

Don't be stuck unnecessarily. Give it a try to avoid finding yourself in a difficult situation. For more great emergency preparation information, visit thevillagesepc.com.




On **January 16**, Arts and Crafts will host our first exhibit of the new year in the Cribari Conference Room.

and corporate presentation development. Barb has published four books on coaching and art. Together they are self-publishing "Art in Retirement," stories about 14 Villagers who found new life in art.



Three New USGA/NCGA World Handicap System Updates Effective January 2024

- 1. The first change is regarding short golf courses. Any 9-Hole course measuring 750 yards or more will be eligible for an official Course Rating & Slope Rating. So our Par-3 Course qualifies and will be assigned an official Course Rating and Slope Rating and will be part of the player handicap matrix going forward. This means that anyone who plays the Par-3 Course will have to officially post their score and that score will be included in their
- ing of 9-hole scores to form and 18-hole score for handicap purposes, the 9-hole score will stand alone as an official score.
- The last change is for incomplete rounds Anyone who plays 10-17 holes and does not finish a complete 18-hole round will be required to post their hole-by-hole scores for each hole played and the un-played holes will be assigned a Score Differential automatically to

Winter Weather and Daily Golf Course Conditions — Remember that at this time of year, weather becomes a daily factor and the resultant golf course conditions can affect play. Some things to be aware of are potential frost delays if it's cold, potential cart paths only status if conditions are wet and rainy, and in extreme weather or wind conditions course closure if a storm creates an unsafe atmosphere to play in (rare but not impossible). Please call the Maintenance Hotline at 408.223.4663 each day for an update on golf course conditions. And remember that the flag at the driving range will indicate the golf course status for the day: Green Flag = Open for Play / Yellow Flag = Frost Delay / Red Flag = Carts on Paths Only

Tips from the Pro-Aim for Success

When you set up, be sure you are properly aligned...Not just for your feet but also knees, hips, shoulders and club face. Most right-handed golfers aim right but this doesn't always mean the ball will go right as their swing will compensate for poor alignment. Check your alignment every practice session for the rest of your life! The best way to do so is to lay down a club (or alignment stick) pointed to the target and another club parallel to the first club at your feet (see image). Make sure your feet, hips and shoulders are all square to the shafts. This is called a "stacked" position when your feet, hips and shoulders are all parallel left of the target line. In today's Gospel from St. John the Evangelist, two disciples of John the Baptist heard a directive from Jesus's cousin, "Behold the Lamb of God." To us, the phrase echoes words heard in Mass. To these seekers, the phrase pointed to the Messiah. John reveals one disciple is named Andrew. The other is unnamed.

How about imagining yourself as the unknown disciple? What are you doing when John the Baptist points to Jesus? How are you dressed? Where are you standing—bewildered in the midst of Lucky? What motivates you to follow this stranger? What is your response when the stranger asks, "What are you looking for?"

'But what do you say?'

The traditions and tales of our forebears have important things to teach us, as do our Sacred Scriptures. 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
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OBITUARY

"The Only One Left" by Riley Sager. Now reduced to a schoolyard chant, the Hope family murders shocked the Maine coast one bloody night in 1929. While most people assume 17-year-old Lenora was responsible, the police were never able to prove it. Other than her denial after the killings, she has never spoken publicly about that night, nor has she set foot outside Hope's End, the cliffside mansion where the massacre occurred. It's now 1983, and home-health aide Kit McDeere arrives at a decaying Hope's End to care for Lenora after her previous nurse fled in the middle of the night. In her 70s and confined to a wheelchair, Lenora was rendered mute by a series of strokes and can only communicate with Kit by tapping out sentences on an old typewriter. One night, Lenora uses it to make a tantalizing offer—I want to tell you everything. As Kit helps Lenora write about the events leading to the Hope family massacre, it becomes clear there's more to the tale than people know. But when new details about her predecessor's departure come to light, Kit starts to suspect Lenora might not be telling the complete truth—and that the seemingly harmless woman in her care could be far more dangerous than she first thought. Mystery, 2023.

"Lady Tan's Circle of Women" by Lisa See. According to Confucius, "an educated woman is a worthless woman," but Tan Yunxian—born into an elite family, yet haunted by death, separations, and loneliness-is being raised by her grandparents to be of use. Her grandmother is one of only a handful of female doctors in China, and she teaches Yunxian the pillars of Chinese medicine, the Four Examinations-looking, listening, touching, and asking-something a man can never do with a female patient. From a young age, Yunxian learns about women's illnesses, many of which relate to childbearing, alongside a young midwife-in-training, Meiling. The two girls find fast friendship and a mutual purpose—despite the prohibition that a doctor should never touch blood while a midwife comes in frequent contact with it—and they vow to be forever friends, sharing in each other's joys and struggles. No mud, no lotus, they tell themselves: from adversity beauty can bloom. But when Yunxian is sent into an arranged marriage, her mother-in-law forbids her from seeing Meiling and from helping the women and girls in the household. Yunxian is to act like a proper wife - embroider bound-foot slippers, pluck instruments, recite poetry, give birth to sons, and stay forever within the walls of the family compound, the Garden of Fragrant Delights. How might a woman like Yunxian break free of these traditions, go on to treat women and girls from every level of society, and lead a life of such importance that many of her remedies are still used five centuries later? How might the power of friendship support or complicate these efforts? Fiction, 2023.

A professor uncovers a shocking secret about the most famous American composer of all time—that his music was stolen from a young Black composer named Josephine Reed. Determined to uncover the truth and right history's wrongs, Bern Hendricks will stop at nothing to finally give Josephine the recognition she deserves. Large Print, Mystery, 2023.
