

All Pulse letters that are published are retained by the Communications Advisory Committee (CAC) for a period of 12 months. Pulse letters not meeting Pulse Letter Requirements are not shared with anyone outside the CAC, management or Club Board and staff liaisons for the reason of confidentiality.

I checked my Comcast bill recently and found out they raised my monthly bill \$18.50 starting this January. I called them about it and found out they upgraded my cable and internet package without my knowledge. I started my service with internet speed of 75 Mbps and basic Villages cable service with 125 channels. Now I am on a 200 mbps plan and an enhance cable service with 185 channels. I think I am wasting money with higher speed than 75 mbps because I am not doing multiple live streaming at the same time. 75mbps is more than enough for us Villagers' normal usage. I hardly watch any cable TV and never watched any of the additional channels. I talked to them about it and they agreed to put me back to my original plan and lower my monthly bill from \$106 to \$66. If you have NFL, CBS Sport, NBA channels, then you are on the 180 channel plan which is \$18 additional monthly charge beside The Villages base cable service. I told a few of my fellow villagers about this, they called Comcast and got at least \$25 reduced to their monthly bill.

The Villager builds community, is an amenity like the pools and Fitness Center that are also supported by Member assessments.

BOARDS & COMMITTEES

Association President's Report—January 30,2024

As we close the first month of 2024, I'd like to send my sincerest thanks to all our DAC chairs and DAC members. Your District Advisory Committees (DACs) work daily on behalf of their village/district to gather data about your neighborhoods and your needs. They share that information with both staff and the ABOD. In return, they communicate back to residents the projects and issues facing all of us. They give input on budgets and needed changes. They collect opinions on plant palettes, paint colors and persistent problems. On a lighter side, they are frequently seen putting out holiday decorations or greeting new residents to our community. When you see your DAC chairs and DAC members, please thank them for all their work on YOUR behalf and consider becoming a DAC member in the coming months.

This month all DACs spent a long morning with the ABOD and staff, looking at four major issues; 1) the Carol Rice Fire Safety Surveys, 2) the 2024/25 Budget Timeline, 3) how various DACs handle social and decorating committees, and 4) next steps in our ongoing turf reduction/water conservation landscape modifications for each district. John Epperheimer, chair of the FLaME (Fire, Landscaping, Materials & Environment), reviewed our progress in fire safety and our plans to continue this critical work. The majority of our time was spent with Landscape experts Dave and Sarah, looking at plant palettes and functional turf areas. DACs had a chance to review their maps, which have been modified and refined many times. The first areas scheduled for landscape modifications are the entrances to Del Lago/Sonata and Montgomery plus a portion of Valle Vista where the wild pigs have already impacted the turf.

Thanks also goes to our City Councilman, Domingo Candelas, for the Fire and Police Safety meeting on Friday, January 26. Domingo introduced our local fire and police officials who shared safety information. Of particular interest to me was the update on "side shows," where young people gather at an intersection and spin their cars around at tremendous speed, showing off to their friends. We have all heard the squealing tires and seen the traffic jams caused by this dangerous and highly illegal activity. SJPD shared the increased use of cameras strategically placed in the Evergreen community to aid law enforcement in catching these drivers. Of course the entire meeting was sweetened with the pancake breakfast provided by Councilman Candelas.

From March 1933 to June 1944, US President Franklin Roosevelt addressed the American people in some 30 speeches broadcast via radio, speaking on a variety of topics from banking to unemployment to fighting fascism in Europe.

Hello, Villagers! Happy New Year! It's been seven weeks since the last Club Board Monthly Meeting and so many things are happening! We've also recently welcomed several inches of much needed rain, and even this week, the sun has appeared and everything looks fresh and glorious. With more rain on the way, this week's sunshine will be fleeting. Go outside and get some sun while you can!

The FY25 budget planning season is well underway and we've received input and requests from all Club Board Standing Committees, clubs, and organizations. This valuable input will be evaluated by the Club Board during an upcoming public Study Session. The well-known "Schedule of Fees" is also being reviewed and updated. Please stay tuned for the Study Session where we hope you can attend to learn more about what's being planned for The Villages. Reminder, also, that The Villages Team is also engaged in an exciting technology roll-out and multisystem IT refresh that will revitalize how business operations are managed by the General Manager and her Executive Team. This very exciting and rewarding transformation is underway with a planned go-live date of July 1.

The Policy Committee of the Club Board is working hard to develop a refreshed set of bylaws incorporating several legal changes in California Corporation Code. The Policy Committee is also updating several Club Policies related to the upcoming changes in the bylaws. In specific, several existing policies related to Club Board committees require updates. Seven of those updated policies are included in this month's agenda for the Club Board, and it's likely that additional policy updates will be presented at each monthly Club Board meeting for the remainder of this fiscal year. This type of work by Boards is rarely seen as fun and exciting, yet it's very necessary work to ensure and maintain good governance. Reminder that all policy revisions are published in *The Villager* newspaper for 30 days to allow Villager review, and written comments or feedback.

Following last month's discussion about the future of *The Villager* newspaper, The Club Board received feedback from several Villagers. Villager feedback has been evenly split, half being supportive of retaining the current paper copy with a weekly or twice-monthly delivery model and half for moving to an electronic method of production and distribution. The Club Board addressed a few of the most pressing questions regarding the costs to produce *The Villager* newspaper in an "Ask the CBOD" article published on January 19, 2024. Remember, the transformation of *The Villager* newspaper is only one aspect of how written and published communications are evolving at The Villages. More information will be shared about these communications transformations over the next several months.




The YTD net favorable operating budget variance for December 2023 was \$86,700. This favorable variance is contributed to the favorable water expense of \$341,000. 

Navigating Credit Card Processing Fees

In The Villages, the burden of credit card convenience charges in Food & Beverage and Golf/Pro Shop is currently shared by all residents—Villagers, guests, non-residents, and employees. As the Club Board and General Manager's office stepped through

the last fiscal year's budget process (FY23/24), we discovered convenience charges in FY22/23 totaled, not the approved \$32K, but \$55K, a 70 percent overrun. With this knowledge, the Club Board directed the GM's office to course correct, resulting in an approved mid-year accounting



adjustment to transfer convenience fees directly to the users of credit cards. This adjustment ensures that all Villagers no longer collectively absorb the financial burden. We think this is fair—and we're guessing you do too!

Starting **Thursday, February 1**, The Villages now has a credit card processing fee. This new policy passes along a 3 percent credit card convenience fee to all credit card users. Because debit cards are processed at The Villages the same as credit cards, debit cards will also experience the 3 percent fee. Payments by check are excluded, and cash is not a payment option. For those who may ask why now? We've already incurred more than \$35K in processing fees—only six months into FY23/24. For our mathematicians, by not taking immediate action, this out-of-budget line item is projected to grow to better than \$70K. Big numbers that we can easily balance.

Those who use The Villages online transaction service, Pay-Lease, to pay monthly assessments/dues already understand how transaction fees work. Now the privilege of using credit cards at the Clubhouse, Bistro and our Pro Shop follows the same precedent.

Millions of people found comfort and renewed confidence in these speeches, which became known as the "Fireside Chats." Our General Manager, Theresa Ostrander, is reviving this beloved practice with Fireside Chats of her own, the first one being tomorrow (Wednesday, January 31). For this first chat, attendance is limited to DAC members who have registered in advance. More news on Fireside Chats will be coming in *The Villager* and on FastLane.

The combined ABOD/CBOD/HBOD Insurance Committee continues to explore ways to control the rising cost of insurance. They met last week with Rossmoor to share the challenges facing both communities. While there was no magic bullet, it was helpful to learn what other HOAs are doing to meet insurance needs.

And I'll finish on a bit of wonderful news... the 3,654-acre Richmond Ranch, which borders part of The Villages hill lands, has been purchased by the Conservation Fund, a national environmental nonprofit. This historic family cattle ranch will be converted into a nature preserve that will be open to hikers and serve as a critical link along the enormous Bay Area Ridge Trail. This will be a slow process but it is gratifying to know that our beautiful, rolling hills will remain pristine and open.

What you will need to make your art:

- A square piece of paper (origami paper or other)
 Instructions:
- 1) Fold your paper in half vertically and unfold it. Then fold it horizontally and unfold it. You should have a vertical and horizontal crease.
- 2) Take the bottom edge of the paper and fold it up to the horizontal crease, then flip the paper over.
- 3) Take the bottom left corner and fold it against the vertical crease. Do the same for the bottom right corner; then flip the paper over again so the point is down.
- 4) Take the left vertical edge and fold it against the vertical crease. Do the same for the right edge.



- 5) Take the top left corner and fold it against the vertical crease. Do the same for the top right corner.
- 6) Rotate the paper 180 degrees. Fold the bottom tip to the top tip then unfold it. Tuck the bottom tip into the pocket formed by the top tip. There should be two flaps sticking up at the bottom edge.
- 7) Open the right flap all the way and press it down so it remains flat open. Do the same for the left flap.
 - 8) Fold in the bottom right corner to form a point. Do the

same with the bottom left corner.

9) Fold the points you just made down so the tips are now flat edges. Flip paper over to reveal your heart. Optional: If you have a significant other write their name on your heart to show how you feel. You could also write a romantic phrase like a conversation heart.



How much is the 2023 Standard Deduction?

Each year at tax time, you add up your itemized deductions (Taxes, Medical expenses, Charitable contributions, etc.). Based on your total itemized deductions, you choose to subtract the larger of the two: itemized deductions or the annual Standard Deduction (SD) set by law. The SD is indexed and changes every year. It was increased by 5.4 percent for 2023. The amount of the SD for tax year 2023 is:

101 tax year 2020 is:	
Single or married filing separately	
Under age 65	\$13,850
Age 65 or older	15,700
Married filing jointly	
Under age 65	27,700
One spouse age 65	29,200
Both spouses age 65	. 30,700
Head of household	
Under age 65	20,800
Age 65 or older	. 22,650

If you itemize your deductions, remember your deduction for state and local taxes is limited to \$10,000. Unless you have huge medical expenses or substantial gifts to charity, many Villagers will find the SD to be the larger option. This is especially true with Villagers filing jointly.

However, the State of California income tax return has different SD amounts. For 2023 returns, the SD for a single taxpayer is \$5,363 and a SD of \$10,726 for married filing joint returns. Many Villagers deduct the SD on their Federal return and chose to itemize on their California return. So yes, it might be beneficial to calculate your itemized deductions!

An exciting year of tennis in 2024

Let's start with the Grand Slams, the most coveted titles in the sport. The Australian Open served us well in January; hopefully, you caught some of the excitement on ESPN. The next Grand Slam will be the French Open (Roland Garros) starting May 20, on clay courts, followed by Wimbledon's prestigious grass court tournament in England between July 1-14. The Grand Slam season ends with the US Open on August 26, which wraps up coincidentally on my birthday (September 8)! What better way could there be to celebrate?

The Masters 1000 series is critical for players who want to move up in rank. Across the calendar year, men and women play nine tournaments that can offer significant ranking points and prize money. The games are hosted on various continents, on various court surfaces minus the grass court.

The Association of Tennis Professionals (ATP) Finals bring together the year's top eight men's singles players and doubles teams in a thrilling climax of the season. Known for its high-stakes intensity, this event will determine who will take the coveted number-one ranking for the year. The format has a round-robin play followed by knockout stages. These games are scheduled throughout the year. The ATP 250, ATP 500, ATP Masters 1000, and finally the ATP Finals make tennis a year-round sport.

Similarly, the Women's Tennis Association (WTA) Finals brings together the top female players battling to secure their spots. Mirroring the format of the ATP Finals, the WTA Finals are the grand finale of the women's tennis season.

This year, the Olympic Tennis Tournament will be held on the clay courts at Roland Garros in Paris, beginning with the Paris Olympic Games on the first weekend of the competition. Men's and women's singles preliminary matches start on July 27. The women's singles final is set to be played on August 3, while the men's singles final is set for August 4. Doubles competitions will be held for men, women, and mixed teams between July 27 and August 4. You won't want to miss these final matches that determine who will take home the gold.

Let's not forget the Paralympics Tennis Tournament. Designed to mirror its Olympic counterpart, this tournament brings together athletes with physical impairments or disabilities. Their extraordinary skill and determination result in riveting matches that display triumph over adversity. Wheelchair tennis is played at all four Grand Slam tournaments, including the grass court at Wimbledon.

New Course Ratings for the Par-3 Course

The NCGA has completed establishing the new official Course Rating and Slope Rating for the Par-3 Course. The ratings are active and available for score posting via all of the GHIN products (our posting computer, the GHIN app, ghin.com, etc.). In addition...when posting via GHIN/USGA app and looking up Villages GCC (The), everyone should activate the filter and select CA as their state. There are a lot of courses called The Villages nationwide, especially in Florida, and without filtering to CA, the Par 3 Course comes up at the bottom of a long, long list.

The rating and slope were computed as if it was an 18-hole course with a par of 54...

Women

Course Rating = 52.6 Course Rating = 50.0

Slope Rating = 68.0 Slope Rating = 71.0

Please remember that if you have an official USGA Handicap that you are now required to post your score every time you play the Par-3 Course, and those scores will be used in establishing your current handicap index. . Let us know if you have any questions.

Roped-off areas on golf course-Please remember to avoid driving on the roped off newly seeded areas on the golf course. We had some surplus seed from the fall overseeding process, and while the weather is still cooperative, we are using this surplus seed to fill in some bare areas on the golf course. While the seed is germinating, please keep cart traffic away from these roped-off areas. And please do not remove any ropes or stakes from their position. We appreciate your cooperation!

Tips from the Pro-Putting is a Mind Game

I was recently watching Martin Hall on the Golf Channel and I really enjoyed some of his tips on putting. I like them because he keeps it relatively simple, but also includes drills for practicing his philosophies. Here are a couple of my favorite Martin Hall putting tips:

- 1. Never up, never in, we've all heard that. But here is a great Martin Hall quote about putting speed..."you must be willing to risk 3-putting in order to be a good and effective putter". What does that mean in practice? It means one thing...get it to the hole! 2 Reasons: a short putt never has a chance to go in; and if you pay attention as the ball rolls past the hole you can see the come-back putt's break. A great drill is to put a club down 24-36 inches behind the hole and practice 10-15-20-25-30 foot putts and try to roll the ball between the hole and the club on the ground.
- 2. See a "channel" not a "line". The mind works better if it has a bit of room for error. So when putting, instead of trying to see a perfect line and putting on that line, try instead to see a 6-inch channel, and try to putt through the channel. A great drill for this visual is to pick and relatively straight 10-15 foot putt and lay 2 clubs down on either side of the hole and stroke the putt visualizing the ball rolling through this 6-inch channel instead of on a specific line. Remember that the hole is 2.5 golf balls wide, so we needn't be perfect to make putts.

So the next time you practice putting, think about a more aggressive pace and think about putting through a channel, and see if you don't make more putts. Let us know if these tips help. To sign up for a lesson with me, email ssteele@the-villages.com

'Presentation and Purification'

I've let the Christmas decorations linger this year. It has seemed like a long dark winter, with so much sorrow in the world. So I'll confess that I just need a little more sparkle and light in my home this season; maybe you do too? Many Christmas traditions would have us dismantle the festive adornment on the Feast of the Epiphany-which marks the end of the twelve days of Christmas-but an older tradition takes down the decorations on February 2, the Feast of the Presentation.

This date - forty days after Christmas - commemorates Jesus' ritual presentation in the Jerusalem Temple. His faithful Jewish parents would have brought him there for the rite of Redemption of the Firstborn Son (Luke 2:22-40), and also for the ritual purification of his mother. In our day, it's a rather lovely time to remember the gift of family: the parents and children being reminded of their primary relationship to God. But there's another ancient Christian tradition associated with that date: it's called Candlemas, and it's when the candles needed for the extended darkness of winter would be blessed in church. At Trinity Cathedral, we'll gladly bless anything that bears light on that day: lamps, flashlights, and even your smartphone!

One set of lights will come down by February 2-at least in my house-but Candlemas reminds me that more light is always coming. Such is the gift of the God whose first words were "Let there be light" (Genesis 1:3).

Learn about Tai Chi at The Villages

Tai Chi is an ancient Chinese practice that involves slow, gentle, balance-based movements requiring focused attention. Tai Chi was initially developed as a martial art that followed the principle of "subduing the vigorous by the soft." It eventually absorbed ideas of energy (Chi) harmonization and flow that originated from traditional Daoist thought and which form the basis of many Chinese healing arts. Today Tai Chi is one of the most popular and effective mind-body exercises in the world with numerous health benefits.

The origin of modern-day Tai Chi can be traced to 17th century China. Over the centuries various styles of Tai Chi have evolved. The five most popular styles today are: Chen style – oldest style with strongest martial art influence; Yang style – most popular of the five styles; Woo (also known as Hao) style; Wu style; and Sun style.

Despite variations between the different styles they all share some core principles:

- 1. Mind-body coordination movement that involves blending of conscious intention with muscle memory.
- 2. Relaxation and Centering movements that are rooted in the dantian, the body's energy (Chi) center; proper relaxation harmonizes Chi flow.
 - 3. Continuous flow movements that flow seamlessly.
- 4. Proper balance and erect posture upright posture, open chest, and relaxed shoulders promote coordinated movement, stability, and optimal Chi flow.
 - 5. Roundness and softness Use of circular movements.
 - 6. Breathing coordinated with movement.

The benefit of a consistent, disciplined exercise regimen is a key element to any wellness program. The Villages Tai Chi Club offers members an opportunity to learn the various forms, to take advantage of a practice in a group setting, and to develop an increased awareness of Chi.


Neutral wall colors i.e. whites, creams, and grays can make rooms seem bigger which can help your house sell quicker.
