On **Tuesday, March 5**, the Villages Men's Fun Social Club will host a presentation by Holly Comer and Michael Chen on the Wildlife Center of Silicon Valley.

Social Club members should make lunch reservations a week in advance on the computer website referenced in the monthly Social Club newsletter. Non-member Esocial Club guests are invited to attend the presentation and should arrive at the Clubhouse by 12:30 p.m.



For 30 years, the Wildlife Center of Silicon Valley (WCSV) has been a local leader in providing sick, injured, and orphaned wildlife with exceptional care rehabilitation and the opportunity for release. It also educates the public about coexisting peacefully with wildlife. The Center provides compassionate care for a variety of animals including birds, squirrels, raccoons, deer, coyotes, foxes, bats, rabbits, snakes, turtles and even the occasional mountain lion or bear cub. The mission is to rehabilitate and release these animals back to their natural habitats whenever possible.



The Wildlife Center hosts various events and programs to engage the public and raise awareness about wildlife conservation. They also encourage volunteering that can play a crucial role in the animal care and rehabilitation.

Just this January, the Wildlife Center merged with the Peninsula Humane Society. This collaboration allows both organizations to combine their expertise and resources in caring for local wildlife. This year the new Larry Ellison Conservation Center for Wildlife Care (LECCWC) will be opened in Saratoga to provide state of the art care for the sick,

On **Saturday morning, April 20**, between 9 a.m. and 11:15 a.m., a professional shredding truck will be available in the Cribari East parking lot. Instead of tossing your papers into the trash, where they might be seen by prying eyes, bring them to the EVF event. You can witness their secure shredding, leaving you confident that your sensitive information is thoroughly destroyed.

The donation for this service is \$10 per box or bag (approximately 20 pounds), payable on the spot in cash or by check only. Please make sure to exclude color paper, folders, and other heavy materials.



Additionally, if you have any flags you'd like to retire, you can drop them off. They will be disposed of during the Villages Veterans Club's annual July 4 event at Gazebo Park.

THE VILLAGES ASSOCIATION ELECTIONS RULES

ARTICLE 3: Candidates for the Board and Nomination Procedures

3.1 Qualification of Candidates.

Candidates for the Board must be Members at the time of their nomination and (i) must meet any other qualifications or restrictions set forth in these Election Rules and (ii) must meet any other qualifications or restrictions set forth in the Bylaws so long as they do not conflict with these Election Rules. In the case of a Member that is not a natural person (such as a corporation or other entity), the entity Member shall have the power to appoint a natural person as the "Member" for purposes of director elections. The Association shall disqualify a nominee for the Board for any of the following reasons:

- 3.1.1 The nominee is not a Member.
- 3.1.2 The nominee does not reside within The Villages condominium project.
- 3.1.3 If the nominee, if elected, would be serving on the Board at the same time as serving on the Board of The Villages Golf and Country Club.
- 3.1.4 If the nominee, if elected, would be serving on the Board at the same time as another owner of the same separate interest and the other person is either properly nominated for the current election or is an incumbent director.
- 3.1.5 If the nominee, at the time of nomination, is delinquent in the payment of regular and/or special assessments. A nominee shall not be considered "delinguent" if the delinguency relates to the payment of fines, fines renamed as assessments, collection charges, late charges, or costs levied by a third party and/

- or if the nominee: (a) has paid the regular or special assessment under protest; (b) has entered into a payment plan for repayment of the delinquent assessments and is not delinquent in payments due under the plan; or (c) the nominee has requested and has not been provide an opportunity to engage in internal dispute resolution.
- 3.1.6 If the nominee has been a member of the Association for less than one year.
- 3.1.7 If the nominee discloses, or if the Association is aware or becomes aware of, a past criminal conviction that would, if the Member was elected, either prevent the Association from purchasing the fidelity bond coverage required by Civil Code section 5806 or terminate the Association's existing fidelity bond coverage.

3.2 Nominations.

- 3.2.1 Solicitation of Candidates. At least thirty (30) days before the deadline for submitting a nomination, the Association shall provide general notice of the procedure and deadline for submitting a nomination for the Board. Any Member who satisfies the qualifications and is not otherwise prohibited from running for the Board may place their name in nomination for the Board by submitting the nomination before the published deadline for receiving nominations. In addition, the Board may recruit qualified candidates and/or may appoint a nominating committee to nominate qualified candidates.
- 3.2.2 No Write-Ins. No "write-in" candidates shall be permitted on the ballots in the election of directors.



SRS SENIOR RESOURCE SERVICES

Sites for free tax preparation for seniors

On Friday mornings there is an AARP/IRS sponsored site for free income tax preparation at The Villages. Fridays might not be a convenient day for you, or perhaps there might not be an open appointment on the day you can come.

Good news. There are other AARP/IRS sites in the valley. These sites vary in services available. First, understand your preparation service choices and then search for a location that can provide that service to you. Below is a description of four types of available service.

In-Person: Tax preparation is completed on-site in one visit by a tax volunteer and reviewed by a supervisor. The Federal and California returns are electronically filed, and you are given a printed copy of your returns.

One Visit Scan: You visit a preparation site, where a digital copy of your tax documents is created and stored in the IRS-provided software used to prepare your return. Volunteers then prepare and review your return remotely. You work with a volunteer online to finalize the returns, file them, and have the returns sent to you using a secure transmission. Note for this service internet access is required.

Two Visit Scan: You visit a preparation site, where a digital copy of your tax documents is created and stored in the IRS-provided software used to prepare your return. Volunteers then prepare and review your returns remotely. During a second visit, you work with a volunteer to finalize your return, have it electronically filed, and receive a printed copy.

Drop-off: You visit a preparation site and leave your tax documents with an IRS-certified volunteer. Your return is prepared by a tax volunteer working remotely. During a second visit, you work with a volunteer to finalize your return and file it. You leave with a printed copy of your returns and your original documents.

No Site Visit: You create digital copies of your tax documents and upload them to the IRS-provided software used to prepare your return. Tax-Aide volunteers prepare your return remotely. You work with a volunteer using an online video system (similar to Zoom) to finalize the returns, file them, and have the return sent to you using a secure transmission. Note for this service **internet access is required.**

To find these additional sites go online to aarp.org and enter Tax Aid Locations in the search box. Put in our zip code and the sites will be listed by distance from The Villages. Senior Resource Services has a handout listing the 9 closest sites. Stop by the SRS office for a copy or call 408-239-5253 and SRS can email you the handout.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253 or e-mail SRS at villagessrs@ sbcglobal.net. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional advisor about your individual situation.

SRS Recommendation:

Get your tax refund ASAP

If you are receiving a refund on your income tax return, the safest, most accurate and fastest way to get your refund is to electronically file your return and choose direct deposit of your refund. Most people receive their refund within 21 days.

Expect an additional 60 to 90 days to receive your refund if you ask for a paper check.

Direct deposit means any tax refund is electronically deposited for free into your checking or savings account. This is the same electronic transfer system used to deposit nearly 98 percent of all Social Security and Veterans Affairs benefits into millions of accounts. You trust it for your Social Security, why not trust it for your tax refund?




A lot of history lies behind the innocent-looking bowl of granulated white sugar on your table. Indeed, our love of sugar

Learn about Máyyan 'Ooyákma—newest Open Space Preserve

The Hiking Club's speaker on February 26 is Andrea Mackenzie, General Manager of the Santa



Clara Valley Open Space Authority. Since 1993, the Open Space Authority has protected over 30,000 acres of open space and agricultural land across the Santa Clara Valley for the benefit of people and nature. The Open Space Authority operates a network of public open space preserves and multiuse trails that are open to the public free of charge, 365 days a year—Coyote Valley, Máyyan 'Ooyákma Coyote Ridge, Rancho Cañada del Oro and Sierra Vista Open Space Preserves, with more on the way. Andrea will focus on the Authority's newest open

space preserve—Máyyan 'Ooyákma Coyote Ridge which opened to the public in Summer 2023, and is located near The Villages, just east of the Hwy 101 and Bailey Road interchange. Máyyan 'Ooyákma consists of 1,859 acres, has 5 miles of trails with outstanding views of the Santa Clara Valley and surrounding mountain ranges. It was established to protect rare serpentine grasslands, and is critically important to the survival of the endangered Bay checkerspot butterfly population. Andrea will also talk about why the conservation and restoration of nature in the Diablo Range, Santa Cruz Mountains and Coyote Valley is so important to our own future.

When the truth is revealed about what happened and the part the town's white establishment played in it, McBride shows us that even in dark times, it is love and community that sustain us. "Silver Nitrate" by Silvia Moreno-Garcia. Montserrat has always been overlooked. She's a talented sound editor, but she's left out of the boys' club running the film industry in '90s Mexico City. And she's all but invisible to her best friend, Tristán, though she's been in love with him since childhood. Then Tristán meets the cult horror director Abel Urueta, who wants them to break a curse by finishing his film about a Nazi occultist imbuing magic into highly volatile silver nitrate stock. Then Montserrat notices a dark presence following her, and Tristán sees the ghost of his ex-girlfriend. They may find that sorcerers and magic are not only the stuff of movies. "Suddenly a Murder" by Lauren Munoz. To celebrate

the end of high school, Izzy Morales joins her ride-or-die Kassidy and five friends on a 1920s-themed getaway at the glamorous Ashwood Manor. There, Izzy and her friends party in vintage dresses and expensive diamonds-until Kassidy's boyfriend turns up murdered. Now every party guest is a suspect. There's the girlfriend, in love. The other girl, in despair. The old friend, forlorn. The new friend, distressed. The brooding enigma. And then, there's Izzy-the girl who brought the knife. To find the killer, everyone must undergo a grueling interrogation, all while locked in an estate where, suddenly, the greatest luxury is innocence. Mystery, 2023.





Instead of needlessly filling our landfills, please consider donating them to those in need instead!

USGA Golf Rules You Should Know—When playing Hole #9 and Hole #18 it is very important that you understand how to proceed if your ball enters the stream in front of the green which is marked and defined as a Yellow Penalty Area.

Rule 17 – Page 146 in Your Rules of Golf Book — Yellow Penalty Area Options. You may play from within the Penalty Area if you so choose with no penalty stroke. Or you may Take Relief for a Ball in Penalty Area defined as such...

If a player's ball is in a penalty area, including when it is known or virtually certain to be in a penalty area even though not found, the player has these relief options, each for **one penalty stroke:**

(1) Stroke-and-Distance Relief. The player may play the original ball or another ball from where the previous stroke was made (see Rule 14.6).

(2) Back-on-the-Line Relief. The player may drop the original ball or another ball (see Rule 14.3) outside the penalty area, keeping the estimated point where the original ball last crossed the edge of the penalty area between the hole and the spot where the ball is dropped (with no limit as to how far back the ball may be dropped).

You may never drop your ball on the green side of the stream!

Winter Weather & Daily Golf Course Conditions—Remember that at this time of year, weather becomes a daily factor and the resultant golf course conditions can affect play. Some things to be aware of are potential frost delays if it's cold, potential cart paths only status if conditions are wet and rainy, and in extreme weather or wind conditions course closure if a storm creates an unsafe atmosphere to play in (rare but not impossible). Please call the Maintenance Hotline at 408.223.4663 each day for an update on golf course conditions. And remember that the flag at the driving range will indicate the golf course status for the day: Green Flag = Open for Play / Yellow Flag = Frost Delay / Red Flag = Carts on Paths Only / Black Flag = Golf & Practice Facilities Closed

Tips from the Pro-I got Rhythm...who could ask for anything more?

Whenever we ask a golfer what their good shots "feel" like, they all say the same thing..."it felt easy and effortless." Everyone thinks this is tempo related, but I do not think this boils down to tempo. Tempo is an individual characteristic... think of Nick Price or Lanny Watkins versus Freddie Couples or Ernie Els...definitely different tempos. But what all good players do is swing in synch with good rhythm; they match their arm speed and body speed. Tempo is much less important than rhythm and synchronization. So the feeling of "easy and effortless" that everyone expresses after a good shot is more a result of the individual swinging with good rhythm, balance and keeping their arms and body in synch. It's very simple...if your arms and body are out of synch, you need to either speed up or slow down to synchronize. I suggest using a training tool like an Orange Whip or you can use a Driver with a donut weight on it...swing back and through for 10-12 swings without stopping and let the club-weight take over and your inherent feedback will allow you to adjust; and you will naturally start synchronizing your arms and body to feel balance and rhythm. EPISCOPAL

George Herbert

His life may have been short (1593-1633) but his impact has been long and profound. This week the Episcopal Church remembers the life of George Herbert, poet and priest in the Church of England. And—may I say—a personal muse? Herbert came late to ordained ministry after already distinguishing himself as a prolific writer, orator, and musician. In fact, more than 90 of Herbert's poems have been set for singing

over the centuries. Some 40 were adapted for the Methodist hymnal published by the Wesley brothers, among them "Teach me my God and King", which found its place—in one version or another—in 223 hymnals. Another poem, "Let all the world in every corner sing", was published in 103 hymnals. His work has been translated for musical settings in French, Spanish, Catalan and German.

And yet, despite his literary and musical influence, Herbert's greatest joy was in the life of a rural parish priest. His one extended prose publication, commonly known as "The Country Parson" published in 1652, was a manual of spiritual advice for pastors. He taught that God was always revealing himself in the everyday, and that "things of ordinary use" (such as ploughs, leaven, or dances) could be made to "serve for lights even of Heavenly Truths." Indeed, George Herbert taught as he lived, and sang as he preached: "Teach me, my God and King/In all things Thee to see/And what I do in anything/To do it as for Thee."
