The Villages Post Office is open Monday to Friday from 9 a.m. to noon in the Cribari Center. The Villages Post Office is a contract station operated by The Villages management, not the United States Postal Service.

Due to our Contract Station status and limited storage capacity, we *do not* provide the following services: Boxes other than Priority Mail boxes, envelopes other than Priority Mail envelopes (however, we do carry Priority supplies which are free to our customers), COD services, Express Mail, overseas parcels requiring a customs declaration, registered mail, and foreign parcel post weighing over 1 pound.

The above services are available at any regular U.S. Post Office. The closest are:





Want to change your Medigap health plan?

This past fall, October 15 through December 7, was the Medicare Annual Enrollment Period (AEP). For Villagers in Traditional Medicare, the important thing to do during AEP is to check through Plan Finder on the Medicare.gov website to be sure that you are in the appropriate Part D drug plan. I talked with many Villagers during AEP in 2023. Many of you switched to D plans that saved significant money on premiums and drug costs.

For a general description of the AEP please visit cahealthadvocates.org/the-basics and click on **Annual Enrollment Period (AEP).**

Persons in Original (also termed Traditional) Medicare usually also sign up for a Medigap supplement plan in addition to a Part D drug plan. The Medigap plans come in 10 different varieties and price range and cover many if not all of the "gaps" that Medicare does not pay.

A frequent question I am asked: "If and when am I able to change my Medigap supplement plan?" In California the time to do that is specified by **The Medigap Birthday Rule.** This rule permits a person to change to any equivalent level or lower level Medigap plan on the day of one's birthday and for the subsequent 60 days. One will not be required to go through health screening in changing plans; you have what is termed **Guaranteed Issue.** So if you are unhappy with your Medigap plan for any reason, for example a steep premium increase, contact us at Sourcewise HICAP and we will send you information and guide you in selecting an appropriate Medigap plan. If you are happy with your Medigap plan, you need to do nothing. The plan will automatically continue as long as you pay the premium each month.

HICAP (Health Insurance Counseling & Advocacy Program) is a non-profit volunteer-based counseling program to help senior citizens needing education and assistance with the complexities of Medicare, supplemental health insurance and Health Maintenance Organizations. HICAP is organized under the County's group called Sourcewise, which provides services for seniors and low-income residents. The HICAP volunteers are overseen by paid County employees.

SRS Reminder:

Get ready for higher RMDs for 2024

Last year's strong market performance means this year's Required Minimum Distributions (RMDs) are likely to rise for many. For some, that's good news. For others, not so much.

RMDs are the amount of money people 73 and older must withdraw from their tax-deferred retirement accounts by year's end. These distributions are calculated by dividing a retirement account's value at the end of 2023 by a factor from an IRS distribution table based on the age of the account holder at the end of 2024.

For Villagers who use their RMDs to help pay for living expenses, this year's increase is a bonus. The higher distribution signifies that your retirement accounts have recovered a good amount of the assets they withdrew the prior year.

But the extra income can also be a problem. It could push you into a higher tax bracket and it might force a surcharge on future Medicare premiums, which are based on past income.



thread a shoelace through the slits before lacing your shoes.





Ways to recycle plastic bottles

In the spirit of best recycling practices with a bit of an additional benefit, you might consider taking your plastic bottles to the local CVS located at San Felipe and Yerba Buena Road. Count the number of plastic bottles and place them in a paper bags. The

manager at CVS says that 50 bottles in a bag is what they usually take. You will be able to get back the CRV redemption amount charged when the items were purchased. Generally you can expect \$1.32 per pound (24.3 bottles).

While most of us are familiar with aluminum can recycling efforts of the VMA here at The Villages, plastic bottles/con-

tainers are currently not part of that effort. Those items should be placed into the recycling bin whose contents are then sorted. While the recycling effort by the City of San Jose attempts to make the best effort, many plastic items

are likely missed amidst the millions of pounds of "our" recycled items each week.

CRV recycling sites may be difficult to come by, so our local CVS is very convenient for Villagers. (Go to the calrecycle.gov web site for more information.)

What is Purim?

The holiday of Purim is a joyous one that celebrates the preservation of the Jewish people in the ancient Persian empire during the 3rd Century BCE. The story of Purim has all the ingredients of a modern day melodrama. There is a villain, Haman, who wants to kill all the Jews in Persia in a single day. A misguided King Ahashuerus who has his Queen Vashti executed for failing to follow his orders. And finally the brave heroine of the story, Esther, who wins a beauty contest to become the next Queen. But she concealed her religious identity leaving the King unaware that she was Jewish.

When Queen Esther heard about Haman's evil plan, she stood up before the King, told him she was Jewish and begged him to spare her and her people. Because King Ahashuerus loved her, he did all she asked.

On Purim we celebrate Esther's bravery with gusto. Many people wear costumes and when the story of Purim is read, Haman is booed and we cheer for Esther. It is traditional to serve the most famous Purim delicacy, the hamantaschen, a three-cornered pastry, shaped like Haman's hat, filled with fruit, chocolate, or poppy seed.

'The Saintly Shamrock'

Julia McCray-Goldsmith, Dean of Trinity Cathedral Perhaps best known in contemporary times as the patron saint of green beer and mid-March revelry, Saint Patrick is also the patron saint of Ireland and its national apostle. Born to a prominent family in Roman Britain in the 5th century, Patrick was reputedly kidnapped by Irish raiders at 16. He escaped captivity in Ireland, but ultimately returned to the site of his enslavement. Where he was credited—apocryphally—with miracles like banishing snakes from the island. And also with bringing Christianity to its people. This claim may too have been exaggerated: a Roman bishop named Palladius was already ministering in Ireland. Nevertheless, Patrick's personal experience of finding freedom in Christ—alongside his knowledge of Ireland's language and customs—facilitated his work in converting and baptizing Druid priests, chieftains and aristocrats by the thousands.

Would that we all brought such joy and authenticity to our work as evangelists! Not to mention creative use of local resources, like Patrick's employment of the three-leaved shamrock to explain the doctrine of the Holy Trinity. Whatever else may be true of the saintly Patrick's history and character, it's certain that he loved the emerald island of his enslavement, and came to understand all of its people and plants as signs and symbols of God's love. Does something growing in your garden tell a story of God? Has something in your past made you stronger for telling God's story of abiding love and freedom? Lift a glass to the saint who showed the way!





Mike Schwerin also won Low Gross with a 29.


Golfer of the Day honors go to Mike Schwerin with low gross, a third place finish, and closest to the flag. Way to go Mike.

Tips from the Pro - Playing Golf vs Practicing Golf

"Why do I do so well when I practice, and then it all falls apart when I play?" Golf is the only sport that you do not practice and play on the same "field."

Practice

- Controlled environment no bad lies usually don't practice in poor weather conditions
- Repetitive a pile of balls
- No repercussions not keeping score focus is quality shots vs score
- Narrow focus alone with your thoughts practice at your own pace
- Minimal distraction you are the only one there

Playing

- Only one try golf is very dynamic and never repetitive
- On "stage" you rarely play alone and everyone in your group is watching you
- Multiple distractions four-some dynamic / rules to follow / other golfers / pace can be slow or fast / etiquette
- Self-imposed pressure emotional reactions / embarrassed / nervous / anxious / score is the basis of success
- Varying conditions bad lies / uneven lies / wet turf / bare turf / slow or fast greens / weather, wind, rain

How to play better golf...play golf like you practice

- Be prepared show up on time, have everything you need
- Have fun! Keep it light stay relaxed
- Play with people that you are comfortable with
- Don't focus on score let it happen then tally score at the end one shot at a time
- Know your game & tendencies play to your strengths and avoid your weaknesses

If you are in a competition that is more serious...Try to re-create the "environment" that allows for your maximum performance that you are able to find when you practice... so, on the golf course create a controlled environment, repetition, focus and freedom. How? Develop a pre-shot routine cadence-rhythm / decision making-strategy / visualize

success / feel the club / relax / execute.

THE VILLAGES ASSOCIATION ELECTIONS RULES

ARTICLE 3: Candidates for the Board and Nomination Procedures

3.1 Qualification of Candidates.

Candidates for the Board must be Members at the time of their nomination and (i) must meet any other qualifications or restrictions set forth in these Election Rules and (ii) must meet any other qualifications or restrictions set forth in the Bylaws so long as they do not conflict with these Election Rules. In the case of a Member that is not a natural person (such as a corporation or other entity), the entity Member shall have the power to appoint a natural person as the "Member" for purposes of director elections. The Association shall disqualify a nominee for the Board for any of the following reasons:

- 3.1.1 The nominee is not a Member.
- 3.1.2 The nominee does not reside within The Villages condominium project.
- 3.1.3 If the nominee, if elected, would be serving on the Board at the same time as serving on the Board of The Villages Golf and Country Club.
- 3.1.4 If the nominee, if elected, would be serving on the Board at the same time as another owner of the same separate interest and the other person is either properly nominated for the current election or is an incumbent director.
- 3.1.5 If the nominee, at the time of nomination, is delinquent in the payment of regular and/or special assessments. A nominee shall not be considered "delinquent" if the delinquency relates to the payment of fines, fines renamed as assessments, collection charges, late charges, or costs levied by a third party and/or if the nominee: (a) has paid the regular or special assessment under protest; (b) has entered into a payment plan for repayment of the delinquent assessments and is not delinquent in payments due under the plan; or (c) the nominee has requested and has not been provide an opportunity to engage in internal dispute resolution.
 - 3.1.6 If the nominee has been a member of the Association for less than one year.
- 3.1.7 If the nominee discloses, or if the Association is aware or becomes aware of, a past criminal conviction that would, if the Member was elected, either prevent the Association from purchasing the fidelity bond coverage required by Civil Code section 5806 or terminate the Association's existing fidelity bond coverage.

3.2 Nominations.

3.2.1 Solicitation of Candidates. At least thirty (30) days before the deadline for submitting a nomination, the Association shall provide general notice of the procedure and deadline for submitting a nomination for the Board. Any Member who satisfies the qualifications and is not otherwise prohibited from running for the Board may place their name in nomination for the Board by submitting the nomination before the published deadline for receiving nominations. In addition, the Board may recruit qualified candidates and/or may appoint a nominating committee to nominate qualified candidates.

3.2.2 No Write-Ins. No "write-in" candidates shall be permitted on the ballots in the election of directors.
